Noblesville, county receive permit to construct...

The City of Noblesville and Hamilton County have received a permit from the Indiana Department of Natural Resources to construct the final phases the Riverwalk between Logan and Conner streets and Conner and Maple streets. The area is shown on the map at right.

The project is jointly funded between the city and county and will Federal Transportation funds. While the project is scheduled to bid and start construction this summer, it is necessary to complete clearing of areas affected by the construction prior to April 1 because of the requirements stated by INDR in the permit.

Clearing of the river bank areas advance of final Riverwalk construction phase began Tuesday by Morphey Construction. Bank areas affected will be from Maple to Logan streets along the county parking lot and Judicial Center.

States and Indiana, Hamilton County has seen an upswing in the number of heroin related overdoses and deaths over the past several years. Citing statistics released by the Indiana State Department of Health and the Hamilton County Coroner's Office, Sheriff Bowen explained, "Hamilton County currently ranks 4th in the State in the total number of opioid overdoses, behind Marion, Lake, and St. Joseph counties. Our country has also witnessed a dramatic 45 percent increase in heroin related deaths." According to the Federal Center for Disease Control and Prevention, someone dies every 19 minutes from a drug overdose, and nearly three out of four prescription drug overdoses are caused by prescription pain killers. "This increase in overdose deaths illustrates that addiction to heroin and other opioids, including some prescription Lifeline, the Hamilton County Council on painkillers, represents nothing less than a Alcohol and Drugs, and the Sheriff's Ofpublic health crisis. Patrol Division Captain Dennis Quakenbush, whose deputies deal with overdoses in the community, believes, "If we can save a life and put someone on the path to recovery, the program will be a huge success."

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office has led the way in many lifesaving technologies, including all Patrol Division officers trained and equipped with AED's and Narcan. Funding for the purchase of Narcan was obtained through grants and the project is a collaborative effort involving Riverview Hospital, the Hamilton County Health Department, Overdose serves will be issued Narcan and trained to administration of the medication. Officers in the Jail, Juvenile Service Center, Courthouse, and Community Correction facility will also be trained in the application of Narcan and will have Narcan on site should it be needed. Training is expected to be completed by mid-March.



Tigers start the presses, beat Westfield...

Fishers roars to sectional victory

How did Fishers react to the pressure of being down 11 points in the opening game of the Class 4A Noblesville boys basketball sectional?

By creating some pressure of its own.

The Tigers turned up the defense late in the second quarter, and thus lifted themselves from that big deficit to a 58-53 win over Westfield Tuesday night at The Mill. With the victory, Fishers improved to 11-12 and advanced to Friday's semi-finals, where it will play Guerin Catholic, a newcomer to 4A. The Tigers and the Golden Eagles have never played each other.

In the first half, it looked as if the Shamrocks would be the team advancing. Westfield got off to a nice start, with Jonah Welch scoring the Shamrocks' first four points on two baskets, the second one off a steal. Soon after, Westfield scored seven unanswered points, with Robbie Lynch's 3 sandwiching four points from Charlie Warner. Kyle Nicole had a 3-pointer as well.

Leading 14-8, the 'Rocks went on another 7-0 run to jump ahead 21-8. The run spanned the first and second quarters. Fishers' Zach Eaton ended it with a 3-pointer, but Warner answered that with a '3' of his own - a shot that rolled in after bouncing a couple times, indicative of how well things were going for Westfield.

Fishers was still trailing 25-14 when it called a time-out with 1:50 left in the first half. That's when the Tigers switched to their press.

"We picked up our pressure a little bit," said Fishers coach Joe Leonard. The Tigers were debating whether or not to use their press because Leonard wanted his team to be sound in the half-court.

"So we were 'Should we, or shouldn't we?" said Leonard. But once Fishers fell behind like it did, the coach acknowledged there wasn't much choice.

It worked immediately. Zach Eaton made two steals, and both times that led to baskets. Lance Dollison went first, then Reid Stephens scored with 37.8 seconds left. Stephens made another quick basket right before halftime, but Nicole made two free throws with 0.6 seconds left to make the halftime score 27-20.

The second half started with Fishers cruising on an 11-0 run, giving the Tigers a 31-27 lead. Dollison started the half with a long jump shot. Dollison would later hit a 3; that was after Cameron Wolter added four points to the run.

"So we went with the press, we saw it working," said Leonard. "The boys were upset at halftime. Just kind of turned them loose, and then Lance came out and hit that first one."

Ian Kristensen ended the run with a couple of free throws; his points at the 2:50 mark were Westfield's first points of the third quarter. With Fishers leading 35-32, Warner hit a 3-pointer to tie the game, but Dollison swished his own '3' at the buzzer. The Tigers led 38-35 after three periods, and would not trail again.

The seniors had stepped up big for Fishers in the third quarter, but a freshman led the way in the fourth. Willie Jackson poured in nine points for the Tigers, including a 7-of-8 performance from the free throw line. His foul shots helped Fishers slowly extend its lead in the period, while Wolter added four free throws (in four attempts).

In all, three Tigers reached double figures. Dollison led the way with 16 points, Wolter was next with 15 and Jackson totaled 11. Reid Stephens led the rebounding with

four - there weren't very many rebounds to be had. Both teams shot the ball well, Fishers was 19-of-30 from the field, shooting 63 percent, while Westfield was 15-of-28, making 54 percent. Eaton dished out four assists.

The loss ended the Shamrocks' season at 11-12, still a remarkable turnaround for a team that had won just six games in the past two seasons. Warner scored 23 points, with Kristensen adding 12. Warner also pulled four rebounds.
