



Carmel, Fishers reach championship

Friday's semi-final games at the Noblesville boys basketball sectional were about rivalries, old and new.

In the case of Fishers and Guerin Catholic, the rivalry was brand new. The Tigers and Golden Eagles had never played each other before in boys basketball, and Round 1 went to Fishers by the score of 82-69 in action at The Mill.

"This time last year we had to play Carmel in this game, and we played well and things didn't go our way," said Fishers coach Joe Leonard. He told his team before it took the court that the game it was about to play was the same one as last year - the semi-finals.

"We want to make it to the finals, and see what that feels like," said Leonard. "We're very, very excited with how they played."

Fishers will get to play Carmel again, but this time in the final. The Greyhounds played Hamilton Southeastern, a rivalry that's been stretching back for decades. Carmel was the winner in this edition, making its way back to the final with a 53-42 win over the Royals.

The 'Hounds and the Tigers will play for the championship at 7:30 p.m. tonight. Carmel is trying to defend its sectional title and win a 26th trophy overall. Fishers is going for its second championship, having won its first back in 1922, before anybody who was in The Mill Friday night was born (yes, that includes Dub Clark.)

Both games followed roughly the same pattern: It was close going in the first half, but then the winning team slowly pulled away in the second half.

Guerin got up 4-1 early in the first quarwhich was a harbinger of things to come. Lance Dollison hit two 3-pointers, with Cameron Wolter making a layin. Dollison drained another '3' to put Fishers up 12-7.

The second quarter began with a layin from Wolter that put the Tigers up 18-12. Fishers would enjoy a 24-17 lead before the Golden Eagles made a 7-0 run that got the GC crowd fired up. Rhett Helt started things with a 3-point play, then Matthew Godfrey scored off a steal. Godfrey then tied the game at 24-all with a pair of foul

That would be as close as Guerin Catholic would get, however. Free throws from Willie Jackson and a Reid Stephens layin pushed Fishers back up 28-24, and it held

Fishers asserted itself at the beginning of the third period with a quick 8-2 run to jump ahead 44-34; Wolter and Jackson took turns making layins. Guerin kept fighting, though, and got back to within 48-44 after a Christian Munson layin. Eaton and GC's Cameron Lindley each drained 3s to make the score 51-47 after three quarters.
