New season kicks off at Grand Park

The 2016 tournament season kicks off at Grand Park with two Indiana Fire Juniors Turf Classic events over the next two weekends. The weekend of March 11-13 will feature 100 teams ages U12-U14 (11v11) and March 18-20 will feature 154 teams ages U8-U12 (6v6 and 8v8). The Turf Classic events are sanctioned by US Youth Soccer (Indiana Soccer) and US Club Soccer. "We're looking forward to hosting these Indiana Fire Juniors tournaments at Grand Park again this year," said Westfield Mayor Andy Cook. "It's a winning combination when we have the opportunity to host a large number of local teams and visitors."

While travel tournaments are the primary draw for visitors to Grand Park, a large number of local youth athletes also use the fields on a regular basis. Last year, 1,438 local kids participated in baseball, softball, football and lacrosse through Westfield Youth Sports (WYSI) and 1,100 local kids played soccer at Grand Park through Indiana Fire Juniors. Starting this spring, Westfield Youth Soccer Association (WYSA) will move its recreational soccer program to the newly added recreational fields, which will give an additional 1,500 local youth the opportunity to play at Grand Park.

In 2015, Grand Park hosted 997,990 unique visitors at the park for tournaments and events, which amounted to 1.5 million total visits/impressions. Furthermore, the park was responsible for 61,970 hotel room nights throughout the central Indiana region. The overall economic impact of all events held at Grand Park in 2015 was estimated to be \$147.7 million.



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

When penciling in super stars for the upcoming boys track and field season in Hamilton County don't miss placing Hamilton Heights' Michael DeFoe among the leaders.

DeFoe is off to an excellent start in the early running of qualifying for the Small Schools competition of the Hoosier State Relays. Entering this week of qualification, DeFoe is first in the 60 hurdles, third in the 60 dash and seventh in the long jump.

Qualifying will continue through March 20. Final competition in both the boys and girls small school and large school divisions will be March 26 at Purdue University.

Hamilton Heights and Guerin Catholic have Hamilton County's only teams in the Small School Division.

Along with DeFoe, Hamilton County has another high qualifier with Guerin Catholic's Quinn Gallaher standing in seventh place in the 3200 run. Also, Hamilton Heights ranks sixth in the 4x200 relay and Guerin Catholic ranks sixth in the distance medley relay.

Currently the county's top qualifier in the Girls Small School Division is Guerin Catholic's Megan Slamkowski, fifth in the 3200 run.

Guerin Catholic ranks first in the distance medley relay and third in the 4x800 relay, while Hamilton Heights is fifth in the 4x400 relay and sixth in the 4x200 relay.






Southeastern's Samantha McKenzie commits to Chicago State University

Defending champ Valparaiso, four other teams back...

IHSAA gymnastics state finals are Saturday

Five teams return from last year's field of finalists along with three former individual state champions as the 44th Annual IHSAA Gymnastics State Finals will be contested Saturday at Worthen Arena on the campus of Ball State University in Muncie. Competition will begin at 1 pm ET following the opening ceremonies.

Top-ranked Valparaiso, No. 2 Columbus North and No. 5 Fort Wayne Bishop Dwenger each won their respective regionals last weekend for a return trip to state and are joined by seventh-ranked Owen Valley and No. 15 Homestead, the other holdovers the school's sixth crown and first since from last year.

Valparaiso is the two-time defending state champion and winner in six of the last eight meets. The Vikings have won a record 11 gymnastics titles overall, all under the direction of coach Lorie Cook, also the state's leader.

Columbus North enters Saturday ranked No. 2 for the second year in a row and will make its 10th straight appearance as a team this weekend. The Bull Dogs aim to land their first state title since 1974 two weeks after the girls basketball team finished as the Class 4A state runner-up.

Bishop Dwenger, ranked fifth in the state coaches poll, collected both the Fort Wayne Concordia sectional and Huntington North regional crowns. The Saints have finished second the last two seasons and three of the last five and will attempt to win

Chesterton, Columbus East, Crown Point, Elkhart Central are the other schools who have qualified in the team competition. Elkhart Central is competing for the first time at state while Crown Point is making just its second appearance and first since 2005.


