

Brush pickup to begin next week

brush pickup will begin Monday, March 14 and run the address to the office and a knuckleboom truck will be the same day as residents' regular trash collection day but through October 14. Pick up is made on the street side only with no alley collections. All brush must be placed as close to the curb as possible without going in to the street.

Residents are asked to stack brush in small piles that are no more than four feet in length and eighteen inches in intended for contractor's to utilize when being paid to diameter (4'x18"). The individual limb size should be no more than four inches in diameter. If a resident's brush pile

The Noblesville Street Department has announced that exceeds the listed size, street department crews will report by within a week to pick up the large pile.

"We are pleased to offer this free service to our residents again," Street Commissioner Patty Johnson said. "Brush pickup is meant for homeowner trimmings and not remove residential trees."

The Street Department picks up brush every week on not necessarily the same time. Because of the large number of limbs lost during the winter wind storms, the street department asks residents to be patient with the timeliness of pickup in the initial start.

After October 14, residents must call the Street Department at (317) 776-6348 to arrange for a special brush pickup.

Letter to the Editor

Decision to dissolve Jackson Fire Territory made without facts

I am writing this letter to address a matter of public concern, not as an employee of Jackson Township, but as a concerned

Trustee Christina Miller and the Jackson Township Board (which consists of Jeff Roberts, Glen Schwartz, and Jerry Cook) recently decided to dissolve Jackson Fire Territory, which consists of the Town of Atlanta, the Town of Arcadia, and the unincorporated area of Jackson Township.

I believe the decision to dissolve the Territory was made without the necessary transparency regarding the facts, which the citizens deserve. I also believe the decision to dissolve the Territory was made without consideration for the best interest for the safety of our schools and students, and for the entire community.

The following is a timeline of events (information is from the Board minutes and gateway)-

- Prior to 2012-Talks occur between unincorporated Jackson Township and the Towns of Arcadia and Atlanta regarding forming a Territory. The Towns of Arcadia and Atlanta are told they will keep the COIT money they receive from joining the Territory.
- January 1, 2012-Jackson Fire Territory was formed with the understanding that it was in the best interest of Arcadia, Atlanta, and the unincorporated area of Jackson Township to join together for the safety of everyone in the community. The surrounding communities, including Cicero, also benefit from a strong and self-sufficient department nearby.
- After the Territory is created, Trustee Miller fights to raise taxes to support the Fire Territory. She succeeds in doing so and now everyone who benefits from the Fire Territory pays the same tax rate to support the Fire Territory. The Township has the greatest portion of the population, so more money comes from the Township.
- After the Territory is formed, three full-time paramedics are hired. There is now a minimum of one paramedic staffed every day and staffing overall has increased. The students at Hamilton Heights, and everyone in Arcadia, Atlanta, and the unincorporated area of Jackson Township are more safe, thanks to the Fire Territory.
- **12/16/14**—Trustee Miller was advised by the Financial Advisor to encumber funds to 2015 for medical insurance. The Board motioned to do this. Trustee Miller never encumbered the funds. There was discussion in 2015 regarding where to find the funds for medical insurance in the fire budget.
- Ongoing- Tax-payer money from the citizens of Arcadia, Atlanta, and the unincorporated Jackson Township is used to hire a financial advisor, Jeff Peters, to create a five-year plan as well as yearly fiscal plans. A review of the Township and Fire Territory Board minutes indicate these reports from Jeff Peters have not been seen by anyone but Trustee Miller and possibly members of the Township
- 1/6/15-Trustee Miller stated that \$50,000 was unspent and carried over from the Fire Territory fund in 2014. The Deputy Chief stated the Fire Territory would be able to operate on the 2014 budget for 2015, again, carrying money over at the end of the year.
- 1/6/15- Trustee Miller acknowledged that the financial advisor, Jeff Peters, based the fiscal reports on assumptions which turned out to be inaccurate. She tells the Towns there will not be enough money to sustain the Fire Territory. Trustee Miler stated \$70,000 would need to be used from the EMS fund (money received from ambulance runs) that year. In fact, no money was used out of the EMS fund in 2015 to pay person-
- 1/2015-4/2015 -In these four months alone, Trustee Miller spends \$4,000 for the financial advisor, Jeff Peters, and professional services out of the Fire Territory Fund (which is tax-payer money). This is done without approval by the Fire Territory Board. Jeff Peters and Trustee Miller refuse to provide any documentation or information to the Fire Territory Board regarding why he was paid this money and what was discussed. Maurice St. Louis was appointed the point of contact for the Fire Territory for legal and financial advice moving forward.
- 4/3/15- As a result of the inaccurate assumptions from Jeff Peters, as well as his and Trustee Miller's ongoing refusal to provide other Fire Board members with the prepared financial documents (paid for by your tax dollars out of the Fire Territory fund), the Fire Territory Board votes to no longer use Jeff Peters as the financial advisor.
- The Minutes show ongoing communication issues and lack of transparency. All of this culminates in Trustee

Miller being advised to step down from the Fire Territory Board by a number of local officials prior to the 4/3/15 meeting.

- **5/27/15**-Trustee Miller Township tax-payer money to hire a lawyer to get back on the Fire Territory
- Around this time, at the request of Fire Territory Board President, Maurice St. Louis, a full review of the Fire Territory finances is done by Robyn Cook, the Town of Atlanta clerk, Fire Territory Board member, John Phifer, and the Fire Territory chiefs. It was determined the Fire Territory was able to sustain and there was no financial crisis. This information is shared with everyone.
- 7/8/15- Chief White stated the EMS money would again not need to be used to pay personnel in the 2016 budget.
- 7/29/15- Trustee Miller returns to the Fire Territory Board meetings. Township Board member, Jerry Cook, stated he would "never vote to leave the territory." Everyone agrees to work together. There is discussion regarding EMS revenue anticipated for 2016 and Jeff Roberts says there is enough money in the Fire Territory budget to hire a replacement for an employee that left.
- 10/22/15- President Maurice St. Louis discussed the vision for 2016. He asked if there were any objections to continuing the Fire Territory and noted the towns (Arcadia and Atlanta) felt like the Fire Territory was doing a good job. Jerry Cook (township board member) stated "leaving the territory has not been a topic of discussion."
- 12/15/15 Trustee Miller motioned to pay a grant writer \$500 to write a grant for an exhaust system for Jackson Fire Territory. The motion carried (note-If Jackson Fire Territory is no longer an entity, this grant money will likely not be received).
- Ongoing-Township Board President, Jeff Roberts, offers praise to the Chiefs for carrying money over each year (including again in 2015) and for being fiscally responsible.
- **2015** and **2016**-The Township Board (Jeff Roberts, Glen Schwartz, Jerry Cook, and Trustee Miller) continue to meet monthly and there is nothing in the minutes to indicate any discussion regard-

ing financial concerns and/or a need to leave the Fire Territory.

- 1/13/16- Maurice St. Louis is nominated to be the Fire Territory Board president. Tim Garner is nominated to be the Fire Territory Board attorney. Trustee Miller votes no to both of these things. Trustee Miller does, however, approve the Deputy Chief compensation package and recommends discussing goals for the future. Around this time, she also approves money to be spent to make improvements at the fire station in Arcadia.
- Unknown date (no record in meeting minutes)- Trustee Miller and her Board decide to dissolve Jackson Fire Territory based on advice from Jeff Peters, the same financial advisor who, according to Trustee Miller, provided information based on inaccurate assumptions before. Again, the reports are not seen by the Towns or anyone other than Trustee Miller and perhaps members of her Board.
- 2/10/16-With Trustee Miller's advice and support, The Township Board (which consists of Jeff Roberts, Glen questions. Schwartz, and Jerry Cook) officially votes to dissolve Jackson Fire Territory.
- Miller, new financial reports prove the Township would be better off financially

to leave the Territory. Trustee Miller does not bring these financial reports to the Fire Territory Board meeting to share with the citizens or the representatives from Arcadia and Atlanta. However, she does acknowledge that the financial reports are, again, based on some assump-

I believe this timeline offers evidence that the Jackson Fire Territory was fiscally stable and a benefit to everyone in our community. Without facts, it is unclear if Trustee Miller's current information and assumptions are accurate or not. What is certain is that the potential implications of inaccurate assumptions in this case may be huge and detrimental to our community. It is possible there will not be funding to maintain the staffing and coverage that our community has currently. However, even if staffing is decreased and personnel cuts are needed, the community will continue to pay at the increased tax rate that Trustee Miller pursued in the creation of the Fire Territory.

This all leaves me with a number of Did Christina Miller, Jeff Roberts, Glen Schwartz, and Jerry Cook sit down and consider all the potential costs of - 2/16/16- According to Trustee taking the Territory apart? If so, is there a

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Reminder from Carmel Fire Department...

Change smoke alarm batteries with your clocks

Daylight-saving time starts Sunday, March 13 at 2:00 am. The Carmel Fire Department encourages residents to change the batteries in their own smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors, test the alarms and remind friends, family, neighbors and fellow community members to do the same. With the peak time for home fire fatalities occurring between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m. when most families are sleeping, this simple step can help save their lives and the lives of those around them. A working smoke detector is your first line of defense in a fire.

Tragically, fire can kill selectively. Those most at risk include:

- * Children On average, home fires kill 500 children ages 14 and under each year. Roughly three-quarters of child fire fatalities under age 15 occurred in homes without working smoke alarms.
- * Seniors Adults 75 and older are 2.8 times more likely to die in a home fire.
- * Low-Income Households Many low-income families are unable to afford batteries for their smoke alarms. These same households often rely on poorly installed, maintained or misused portable or area heating equipment a main cause of fatal home fires.

The most commonly cited cause of non-working smoke alarms is worn or missing batteries. Smoke alarm maintenance is a simple, effective way to reduce home fire deaths. Children and senior citizens are most at risk, and a working smoke alarm can give them the extra seconds they need to get out safely.

Changing smoke alarm batteries at least once a year, testing those alarms and reminding others to do the same are some of the simplest, most effective ways to reduce these tragic deaths and injuries. Additionally, the International Association of Fire Chiefs recommends that smoke alarms in homes should be replaced every 10 years and having both ionization and photoelectric smoke alarms are best to alert people to all types of home fires. If both types of smoke alarms or a combination alarm are not available, the Carmel Fire Department recommends photoelectric alarms with a 10-year lithium battery. The battery in this alarm never needs changed and the alarm needs to be replaced every ten years. Likewise, carbon monoxide detectors need to be replaced every seven to eight years. If you need assistance changing or testing your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors, please contact your local fire department.

Twenty-nine years ago, Energizer and the International Association of Fire Chiefs recognized a disturbing trend that many home fire fatalities were taking place in homes without working smoke alarms. Please do your part in checking, changing, and testing your smoke detectors.

list of all the potential costs that they can provide? For example, do they have an estimate for how much the legal fees and financial advisor fees will be due to the dissolution of the Territory? Was FEMA contacted prior to the dissolution decision to make sure there would be no repercussions with the Fire Territory's grants? Was it taken into consideration that more grant monesy for the three full-time paramedics could be pursued this year under the Territory (but not under the Township)? Was there dialog with the DLGF (Department of Local Government Finance) or anyone other than Jeff Peters, to determine that this was indeed the best course of action, both fiscally and for the safety of the community? If so, is the Township Board willing to provide any evidence they considered or did these things? Where are the reports from the financial advisor, Jeff Peters? When was the meeting with Jeff Peters and who attended that meeting? Why have these reports not been provided to the Towns of Arcadia and Atlanta for review? Why were the towns not provided the financial advisor's information before the Territory was dissolved so there could be informed decisions and dialogue? Could things have been different if Christina Miller, Jeff Roberts, Glen Schwartz, and Jerry Cook had been transparent and communicated with others before making such a huge decision with so many implications for our community?

At this point one might ask if any of this matters since the Territory has already been dissolved due to the Township Board and Trustee Miller. I say it does matter. It matters how and why the Territory was dissolved. It matters if the people we elect to represent us are honest, transparent, have integrity, and have the best interest of the people they represent in mind when decisions are made.

All of this now leaves Arcadia and Atlanta with a predicament. The Fire Territory has been dissolved by Trustee Miller, Jeff Roberts, Glen Schwartz, and Jerry Cook. You now must decide if you want to contract with Trustee Miller. At the recent Fire Territory Board meeting, Trustee Miller compared the Fire Territory to a business. The minutes clearly indicate a history of misinformation and a lack of transparency and communication with others. Is this who the Towns want to do "business" with? Is this who the Township wants running their "business"?

The dissolution of the Territory is not just a problem for Arcadia and Atlanta. We all share this community. Our kids all go to the same school. We all travel the roads of Arcadia, Atlanta, and the Township. We shop, dine, and visit our family and friends outside of the towns and Township where we live. This truly impacts the entire community.

Having a Fire Territory Board previously led to a distribution of power amongst representatives of all the communities. With the dissolution of the Fire Territory, there will be no Fire Territory Board and no voice for the Towns. Now Trustee Miller will have ultimate control. She will, for example, be able to determine how much Arcadia and Atlanta will have to pay to contract with her.

I encourage everyone to attend the next Township Board meeting on March 23, 2016 at 3:00pm. I hope Christina Miller, Jeff Roberts, Glen Schwartz, and Jerry Cook will provide the documents and information to reassure the community that the dissolution of the Territory was a decision made with the best interest of the community in mind.

Quick action by NPD officers save lives...

Apartment fire in Noblesville Friday morning

Three Noblesville Police Officers are being called heroes for their actions during an apartment fire in Noblesville early Friday morning.

At approximately 12:21 a.m. the Noblesville Fire Department was dispatched to 1044 Watermead Dr. for a possible apartment fire with an occupant trapped inside. The three officers, identified as Officer April Lantz, Officer Jordan Granger and Officer Corey McGriff, arrived on-scene shortly before the first arriving fire units. Officer Lantz and Officer McGriff attempted to enter the corridor to the apartment, but were unable to due to heavy smoke conditions. Officer Lantz and Officer McGriff were able to break a front window to the apartment. The officers stated they heard the occupant coughing inside the apartment and started yelling for him to follow their voices and lights. At that time, a male occupant was pulled through the front window to safety. During this time, Officer Jordan Granger went to the back of the apartment to alert other occupants of the building. Officer Jordan Granger was able to scale an adjoining second story balcony, where he alerted the neighboring occupants of the fire and moved them to safety.

First arriving Noblesville Fire Department apparatus reported heavy smoke and fire visible from the downstairs apartment. Firefighters made an aggressive interior attack on the fire, where it was quickly determined the fire had spread to a second story apartment. A second fire crew made an aggressive interior attack on the second story apartment, and the two crews continued to work in unison, brought the fire under control

The male occupant of the apartment was treated on-scene for smoke inhalation and transported to St. Vincent Fishers Hospital in good condition. A female victim from another apartment, was treated on-scene and transported to Riverview Health in good condition. The cause of the fire is still under investigation at this time.


