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## **Kenley-supported veterans** bills pass General Assembly

Luke Kenley Noblesville) that would benefit Indiana's veterans passed the Indiana General Assembly this session.

Senate Enrolled 304, which Kenley authored, increases the assessed value limit for property-tax deductions from

\$143,000 to \$175,000 for veterans with at least a 10-percent disability.

Kenley co-authored: • Senate Enrolled Act 145, which allows funeral directors to turn over the unclaimed cremated remains of verified veterans to veterans' service organizations

to be placed in a state or national cemetery; • Senate Enrolled Act 154, which increases the funeral allowance for a member of the Indiana National Guard who dies in the active service of the state from \$4,000 to \$8,800; and

• Senate Enrolled Act 295, which opens the Military Family Relief Fund (MFRF) governor's desk for his consideration.

to any veteran of any national conflict or war who is also an Indiana resident, and a current or honorably discharged member of the armed forces or National Guard. The bill also includes language that would create a place on state income tax forms to enable a taxpayer to donate all or part of their refund to the MFRF.

Kenley also sponsored:

• House Concurrent Resolution 3, which creates a commemorative "Chair of Honor" placed in the Indiana Statehouse to recognize American Prisoners of War and Missing in Action; and

• House Enrolled Act 1187, which would make it a Class A misdemeanor for a person to benefit from fraudulently claiming to be an active member or veteran of the armed forces.

"Supporting our veterans is one of my priorities as a lawmaker," Kenley said. 'These men and women have sacrificed a great deal for the safety of our country, and it is important that the legislature provide them with support that helps them address their unique needs."

Located inside the Heart and Soul Free Clinic, the free dental clinic will begin accepting uninsured and underinsured patients from Hamilton County and the surrounding areas with urgent care dental needs from 8 a.m. until 12 noon on Saturday, April 2. Patients will be seen on a first come, first served basis. The clinic will then be open the first Saturday of every month from 8 a.m. until 12 noon.

By July, the clinic plans to expand its hours and see patients the second Friday of each month by appointment. A hygiene component is also planned for the future. The clinic will be staffed by volunteer dental professionals and front desk volunteers.

Dr. Steven Richwine, DDS, a graduate of the IU School of Dentistry with over 42 years in private practice will serve as the clinic's first volunteer dental director. Dr. Richwine has previous experience volunteering at other free dental clinics in the Indianapolis area as well as volunteering his services at free dental community events.

"There is a great need for dental services in Hamilton County and the surrounding areas," said Dr. Richwine. "Many individuals do not have dental insurance or can't afford dental care. Having a lack of dental care can affect an individual's overall health as well as their self-esteem and ability to work if they are in significant pain."

"The dental clinic has been a work in progress for three years. We are very excit-

INDOT awards \$21 million contract to build...

# 106th Street interchange at I-69

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) has awarded a \$21.7 million contract to Walsh Construction to build a new interchange at Interstate 69 and 106th

Hamilton County and the city of Fishers have partnered to contribute up to \$12 million toward the total cost of construction. The interchange will feature a two-lane, oval-shaped roundabout on 106th Street over I-69 and ramps to and from both directions of the interstate. Two separate twolane bridges will each carry one direction of traffic. The bridge to carry westbound traffic on the north side of 106th Street is also designed to accommodate pedestrians.

The project is intended to reduce congestion at existing I-69 interchanges at 96th and 116th streets, increase traffic safety in the area and provide direct interstate access at 106th Street. Direct access will serve existing residential and commercial destinations and accommodate development and population growth in the area.

The existing 106th Street bridge over I-69 will be removed as part of the project, which will require closing the overpass during construction. Traffic will be detoured to 96th Street via Allisonville and Lantern Roads. Specific construction schedule updates will be announced in the near future. The new 106th Street interchange ramps and access across I-69 are expected to open to traffic before the end of this year.
