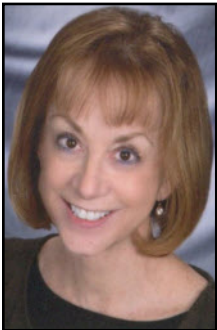

Global software firm adds 70 high-wage jobs...

Blue Horseshoe Solutions expanding Carmel headquarters

Blue Horseshoe Solutions, a global software firm specializing in supply chain and logistics solutions, announced plans today to expand its operations here, moving into a new corporate headquarters along the U.S. 31 corridor and creating up to 70 new high-wage jobs by 2020.

Kenley-supported veterans bills pass General Assembly

Six measures supported by State Sen. Luke Kenley (R-Noblesville) that would benefit Indiana's veterans passed the Indiana General Assembly this session. Senate Enrolled Act 304, which Kenley authored, increases the assessed value limit for property-tax deductions from \$143,000 to \$175,000 for veterans with at least a 10-percent disability.



Kenley

Kenley co-authored:

- Senate Enrolled Act 145, which allows funeral directors to turn over the unclaimed cremated remains of verified veterans to veterans' service organizations to be placed in a state or national cemetery;
- Senate Enrolled Act 154, which increases the funeral allowance for a member of the Indiana National Guard who dies in the active service of the state from \$4,000 to \$8,800; and
- Senate Enrolled Act 295, which opens the Military Family Relief Fund (MFRF)

to any veteran of any national conflict or war who is also an Indiana resident, and a current or honorably discharged member of the armed forces or National Guard. The bill also includes language that would create a place on state income tax forms to enable a taxpayer to donate all or part of their refund to the MFRF.

Kenley also sponsored:

- House Concurrent Resolution 3, which creates a commemorative "Chair of Honor" placed in the Indiana Statehouse to recognize American Prisoners of War and Missing in Action; and
- House Enrolled Act 1187, which would make it a Class A misdemeanor for a person to benefit from fraudulently claiming to be an active member or veteran of the armed forces.

"Supporting our veterans is one of my priorities as a lawmaker," Kenley said. "These men and women have sacrificed a great deal for the safety of our country, and it is important that the legislature provide them with support that helps them address their unique needs."

These bills will now move to the governor's desk for his consideration.

Heart and Soul Free Clinic to open free dental clinic

The Heart and Soul Free Clinic in Westfield announced today that the grand opening of its free dental clinic will take place on Thursday, March 31 with ceremonies beginning at 3:30 p.m.

Located inside the Heart and Soul Free Clinic, the free dental clinic will begin accepting uninsured and underinsured patients from Hamilton County and the surrounding areas with urgent care dental needs from 8 a.m. until 12 noon on Saturday, April 2. Patients will be seen on a first come, first served basis. The clinic will then be open the first Saturday of every month from 8 a.m. until 12 noon.

By July, the clinic plans to expand its hours and see patients the second Friday of each month by appointment. A hygiene component is also planned for the future. The clinic will be staffed by volunteer dental professionals and front desk volunteers.

Dr. Steven Richwine, DDS, a graduate of the IU School of Dentistry with over 42 years in private practice will serve as the clinic's first volunteer dental director. Dr. Richwine has previous experience volunteering at other free dental clinics in the Indianapolis area as well as volunteering his services at free dental community events.

"There is a great need for dental services in Hamilton County and the surrounding areas," said Dr. Richwine. "Many individuals do not have dental insurance or can't afford dental care. Having a lack of dental care can affect an individual's overall health as well as their self-esteem and ability to work if they are in significant pain."

"The dental clinic has been a work in progress for three years. We are very excit-

ed to see the clinic opening and we hope to alleviate much of the pain and suffering found in our community from a lack of dental care due to cost. We look forward to improving the overall health and lives of our patients," said Heather Brownell, executive director of the Heart and Soul Free Clinic.

"Without the financial assistance of our grantors - the Noblesville Housing Authority Community Development Block Grant, the Noblesville Health Department, IU Health, St. Vincent Health and the Legacy Fund Community Foundation, a CICF affiliate, the dental clinic would not possible," said Brownell. "Patterson Dental was also a great partner in helping us put together the clinic. Our donors who participated in the clinic's first annual campaign played a significant role as well for their donations will help to cover the operational costs of the dental clinic this year."

The grand opening which will be sponsored by Kroger, begins at 3:30 p.m. with a ribbon cutting slated for 4 p.m. Tours of the clinic will be available along with hors d'oeuvres and beverages provided by Kroger. INDOT awards \$21 million contract to build...

106th Street interchange at I-69

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) has awarded a \$21.7 million contract to Walsh Construction to build a new interchange at Interstate 69 and 106th Street.

Hamilton County and the city of Fishers have partnered to contribute up to \$12 million toward the total cost of construction. The interchange will feature a two-lane, oval-shaped roundabout on 106th Street over I-69 and ramps to and from both directions of the interstate. Two separate two-lane bridges will each carry one direction of traffic. The bridge to carry westbound traffic on the north side of 106th Street is also designed to accommodate pedestrians.

The project is intended to reduce congestion at existing I-69 interchanges at 96th and 116th streets, increase traffic safety in the area and provide direct interstate access at 106th Street. Direct access will serve existing residential and commercial destinations and accommodate development and population growth in the area.

The existing 106th Street bridge over I-69 will be removed as part of the project, which will require closing the overpass during construction. Traffic will be detoured to 96th Street via Allisonville and Lantern Roads. Specific construction schedule updates will be announced in the near future. The new 106th Street interchange ramps and access across I-69 are expected to open to traffic before the end of this year.

Between Spring Mill and Ditch roads...

Traffic restrictions on 106th Street begin Monday

Beginning Monday, there will be a change in the flow of traffic at 106th Street, between Spring Mill Road and Ditch Road. As part of the multi-use path construction there, 106th will be one way, flowing west only between Spring Mill Road and Ditch Road through early September or until construction is complete.

Signs will be in place along the detour route for eastbound traffic. HIS Constructors will be building the new multi-use path along the south side of 106th Street and it is imperative that we implement these traffic changes for the overall safety of the crews and the motoring public.

In addition to the multiuse path project, the Hamilton County Highway Department will be rebuilding the bridge over Williams Creek, which will require a temporary full closure of this section of 106th Street early this summer. Both projects are anticipated to be complete in early September 2016.

Royal girls win HCC indoor meet

Noblesville's Jalen Garner (center) won the 60 hurdles event at the Hoosier Crossroads Conference indoor track and field meet Saturday at Wabash College.

Hamilton Southeastern's girls track and field team won the Hoosier Crossroads Conference indoor meet Saturday at Wabash College.

The Royals scored 96 team points, comfortably ahead of runner-up Noblesville's 85. Hamilton County swept the top four, as Fishers was third and Westfield placed fourth.

Southeastern picked up victories from Mia Mackenzie in the 60 hurdles, Ashley Perry in the long jump and Natalie McDaniel in the pole vault. All of those performances made history - Mackenzie's time of

9.35, Perry's jump of 17-1.25 and McDaniel's leap of 9-9 placed them all second on the HSE all-time indoor list in their respective events.

Tayah Irvin finished third in the high jump, but set a new school record with her leap of 5-5.

Each school won an event - the Millers triumphed in the 4x400 and distance medley relays, the Tigers' Paris Carver won the 60 dash and the Tigers won the 4x200 relay as well, and the Shamrocks were first in the 4x800 relay.

In the boys' meet, HSE placed a close second to Avon, with the Orioles outscoring the Royals 83-80. Fishers was third, Noblesville fifth and Westfield seventh.

Southeastern placed first in four events. Gabe Fendel won the 3200 run, Chase Maxey was first in the long jump, Justin Hornbuckle won the high jump and the Royals paced the distance medley relay.

The Tigers got a runner-up finish from Noah Rogers in the high jump, as well as the 4x400 relay.

The Millers had two event winners: Jalen Garner was victorious in the 60 hurdles and Eric Ferguson won the shot put.

The Shamrocks' Justin Mamaril was a winner in the pole vault.

Mavericks’ big shots stun ‘Hounds

Saturday's boys basketball regionals featured exciting comebacks, nail-biting drama and clutch shots that won championships all over the state.

But, for every big basket that delivers a win, someone has to be on the other side of that dramatic shot. Unfortunately, one of those teams was Carmel.

The Greyhounds were trying to hold off a McCutcheon comeback in the second semi-final at the Class 4A Logansport regional Saturday, but a last-second basket forced overtime, then another one in the extra period sent Carmel to a tough 56-54 defeat. The Greyhounds ended their season at 17-9, but not before winning a second consecutive sectional.

"We did the things throughout the game that we needed to do to give ourselves a

chance to win," said Carmel coach Scott Heady.

Carmel led 39-28 after three quarters, and was still up by 43-32 with under six minutes left in the fourth. But the Mavericks went on an 8-0 run to cut the lead to 43-40.

The 'Hounds kept themselves ahead by making their free throws, with Garrett Covington and PJ Baron both going 2-for-2 in the final 37 seconds. Baron's foul shots put Carmel up 52-49.

McCutcheon had the ball with 10 seconds left, and Eddy Collins shot the ball with time running out from about 25 feet - and it went in. The Mavericks, after trailing almost the entire game, were back even with the Greyhounds at 52-all.

"Kid hits a tough shot," said Heady. "Hits a tough shot. Twenty-five foot shot that's contested."

Darnell Butler gave McCutcheon its first lead of the entire game with a jumper, putting the Mavs up 54-52. Trenton Richardson answered with a pair of free throws, knotting the score at 54-54 with 2:38 left. McCutcheon called a timeout 12 seconds later.

The Mavericks drained the clock almost all the way down; once it was under 10 seconds, they made their move. It was Butler again - his jumper moved McCutcheon ahead by two. Carmel quickly called timeout; at first it looked like there were 0.4 seconds left, but the officials added time, giving the 'Hounds 2.1 seconds. Plenty of time.

But, it was not meant to be. McCutcheon deflected away Carmel's inbound heave, and that ended the game. The Mavericks advanced to the championship game, where they easily beat Homestead to win the regional plaque.

McCutcheon's comeback erased what had been a great all-around performance by the 'Hounds. Sterling Brown and Preston Flamion opened the game with back-to-back 3-pointers, and another 3 by Flamion got Carmel up 11-3 early. The Mavericks eventually cut Carmel's lead to 13-11, but Flamion's putback at the end of the first gave his team a 15-11 lead.

The Greyhounds maintained their advantage into halftime, leading 25-20 at the break. Brown and Flamion each hit 3's, and Covington's layin helped break up what could've been a significant McCutcheon run.

Carmel continued to roll in the third quarter, absorbing some early Mavs baskets that cut its lead to 28-26. After that, the 'Hounds skipped off on an 11-2 run, scoring the last six points of the period. Britt Beery

made a putback at the buzzer to put Carmel up 39-28.

Flamion led the Greyhounds with 21 points, including three 3-pointers. Brown hit two 3s on his way to 14 points. Covington, who transferred back to Carmel mid-season (his family moved from Carmel earlier), had 10 rebounds to go along with nine points.

"Our effort was unbelievable," said Heady. "I thought we had a great effort. They really were locked in to doing the things that we needed to do to win the game."

Lions finish Nationals 21st in the nation

Noblesville's Northside Lions saved their most exciting game of Nationals week for the last game. The Lions, also playing their final game of the season, finished their week in story book fashion by defeating the San Marcos, Texas Panthers on a last second driving lay-up by Caleb Jones with two seconds to go in the game to win 70-69.

The Lions faced off against the Panthers on Friday in the 3rd place game in the Varsity Small Program D1-Bronze Bracket of the NCHBC HomeSchool National Tournament in Springfield, MO.

Northside was beaten by the Lakeshore Thunder on Thursday for the 3rd time this season and was determined to not end Nationals week with a loss on Friday. San Marcos had the same mindset for their last game as well. This set the stage for what was to be the most electrifying game of the week for the Northsiders and their fans.

The Lions turned the page on their poor shooting night on Thursday by hitting the nets at a 46 percent clip including a 46 percent shooting night from behind the 3-point line. And although their numbers were not readily available at this writing, the Panthers scorched the nets at a blistering pace throughout the game as well.

After the Lions forced a Panther turnover under their own basket, Stephen Schwartz hit 1 of 2 free throws on the other end to push the Lions lead to 63-58 with 4:35 left. The Panthers came right back with a 3-pointer of their own to make it a two point game again 63-61 at the 4:25 mark.

After a Lions miss, San Marcos drove the lane for an old fashion 3 point play with an and-1 to put the Panthers back in the lead 64-63 with 4:07 left in the game. After another Northside miss, San Marcos came back and hit short jumper to extend their lead at 66-63 with 3:31 left. The Lions worked the ball on their next possession and Daniel Abbott hit Aaron Tharp in the corner for another Lions 3-pointer to tie the score at 66-66 with 3:05 left.

The Panthers missed on their next possession and Riley Vitales grabbed the rebound and hit a fast breaking Daniel Abbott as he drove to the basket to give the Lions the lead back at 68-66 with 2:44 left in the game.

Both teams went dry on their next several possessions until San Marcos hit a 3-pointer from the left elbow with 42 seconds to go to give the Panthers the lead 69-68. Down by one, the Lions didn't panic and worked the ball on their next possession. With 16 seconds left, Riley Vitales drove from the left side of the key around to the right and down an empty lane to lay the ball in the basket. But the score didn't count as time out was called by the Lions as Vitales was driving.

On the ensuing inbounds, the Lions turned the ball over and had to foul the Panthers. San Marcos missed the front end of the 1-and-1 and Northside's Vitales grabbed the rebound and brought the ball up with 17 seconds left in the game still down one point 69-68.

Again, the Lions kept their cool and worked the ball around the offense. Vitales got the ball and passed to Caleb Jones on the right elbow. Jones saw an opening to the

basket with :04 seconds left, drove down the open the lane, and hit a swooping underhand floater to give the Lions at 70-69 lead with :02 seconds left in the game. After two Panther timeouts, San Marcos inbounded the ball to a waiting Panther at half court who turned and took a half court desperation shot but misfired and give Northside the one point win, 70-69.

The Lions were 3 points away from having all 6 players that scored in the game in double figures as the Lions offense was very balanced. Daniel Abbott led the way with 16 points including two 3-pointers. Aaron Tharp followed with 14 points and four 3-pointers. Riley Vitales finished with 12 points and one 3-pointer while Stephen Schwartz ended with 11 points. Erik Job finished the game with 9 points and Caleb Jones ended with 8 points including his game winning shot.

Senior Stephen Schwartz ended his night with a double-double performance. Schwartz led the Lions by grabbing 11 rebounds to go with his 11 points. Erik Job and Caleb Jones followed by collecting 6 rebounds each.

Pacers beat Mavs for third straight win

The Indiana Pacers held off a desperate Mavericks team in a Saturday matinee in the 'Big D' to come away with a 112-105 victory. Five days removed from what may have been the Pacers' most impressive win of the season against the Spurs, the Pacers rolled into Dallas and picked up their third straight victory while handing the Mavs their fifth consecutive loss.

The Pacers played well throughout the afternoon, but could not pull away from a resilient Mavericks club. The Pacers led by as many as 11 in the third quarter but Dallas fought back, coming to within one point multiple times in the fourth. George Hill waited to make his impact felt until the Pacers needed it most, cashing in three long range shots in the final period to keep the Mavs at bay.

After the game Coach Vogel stated "They had small lineup out there on both ends, but defensively that's a lineup that we can attack. And there's less size at the rim, so there's more of a need for rotations, and when you move the basketball the way we did we get positive results. George Hill was huge knocking down 3 threes in the fourth."

Monta Ellis made his first return to American Airlines Center since not re-signing with Dallas last offseason.

Ellis endured a brief scare after rolling his ankle early in the third frame, but shook it off to make some key second half plays for the Pacers. Ellis was an effective playmaker all game long, finishing with 17 points, seven assists and five rebounds.

Pacers players C.J. Miles and Myles Turner both grew up in the Dallas area and played this one in front of friends and family. Saturday marked C.J.'s return to action after missing nine games with a strained left calf and Turner's first NBA game in his hometown. Turner showed no signs of nervousness with his contribution of 15 points and seven boards in 19 minutes.

It was a tale of two halves on the boards. The Pacers struggled to keep the Mavs off of the glass in first two quarters, losing the first half rebounding battle 25-19. Indy was able to limit Dallas' bigs, David Lee and Zaza Pachulia, in second half to earn a 23-15 rebounding advantage in the the final two periods.

The Pacers shot poorly from long range in the first half, coming up empty on their first eight attempts, but were aggressive enough against Dallas' zone defense to force several shooting fouls. Indy shined from the free throw line from beginning to end, draining 27 of 29 while the Mavs attempted only 18 shots from the charity stripe.

Paul George struggled with his shot in the first half, but found his touch after the break to lead a balanced scoring effort with a team with 20 points to go along with a game-high 10 rebounds and six assists.

Seven of Indiana's players scored in double figures, including all five starters along with Jordan Hill and Rodney Stuckey, who saw an increase in minutes off of the bench.

Dallas legend Dirk Nowitzki defied father time once again to finish with a game-high 30 points. Wesley Matthews had a solid game for the Mavs with 15 points, six assists and five rebounds.

Newest member of the Blue & Gold Ty Lawson was listed as questionable coming into the contest but sat this one out after spraining his left foot only five minutes into his Pacers debut on Monday night.

The Pacers head to Atlanta to take on the Hawks Sunday night in the second game of a back-to-back as they look to extend their win streak to four games.
