

Road closures across county during the week

The Hamilton County Highway Department announced the following road closures that will take place during the coming

Anthony Road north of 266th Street will be closed to thru traffic on or after Thursday. This closure is expected to last no longer than two calendar days.


On or after Monday, 266th Street east of U.S. 31 will be closed to thru traffic. This closure is expected to last no longer than 10 calendar days.

Also on Monday, the intersection of 96th Street and Cumberland Road / Mud Creek Road will be closed for construction of a roundabout. 96th Street will be closed between Sargent Road and Mollenkopf Road. Cumberland Road will be closed between 106th Street and 96th Street while Mud Creek Road will be closed between 86th Street and 96th Street. Local traffic will have access up to the intersection.

A posted detour route will be in place throughout construction. The intersection is planned to reopen on June 30th.

May 30, 1916 - March 8, 2016

Anne Ida (Timmer) Ramsay died Tuesday, March 8, 2016 in Irvine, CA. She was 99.



Born on May 30, 1916 in Muskegon, Michigan, she was the eldest of four daughters of Gerrit and Jenny (Meyers) Timmer. She grew up in the Dutch community dominate in the area at the time, which imbued her with a strong set of values in her faith, family, and community. She started working at age 16, supporting her family during the Great Depression with a part time job after high school. In 1939 she married Howard B. Ramsay, then of Muskegon, but formerly of Conshohocken, PA. They had two daughters: Beryl Louise and Janice Anne.

In 1951, they moved to Noblesville, Indiana, where Anne first worked as a legal secretary, then became the Clerk of the City Court and, later, in 1959, partnered in founding in Noblesville the Hiatt-Ramsay Real Estate brokerage. She was one of a few women in real estate at that

time. She remained in the business there until 1988 when she and Howard retired to California to be by their daughters. She and Howard were active members of the First Presbyterian Church in Noblesville.

She is survived by her two daughters, Beryl and Janice, both graduates of NHS and by her sister, Edith Potter of Muskegon, Michigan, five grandchildren, and ten greatgrand children, who knew her affectionately as "Grannie Anne." She was preceded in death by her loving husband in 1994; and by two of her sisters - Jean Grinwis and Geraldine Toman, both of Muskegon.

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


Jeremy was preceded in death by his grandparents, Rex





Coach Deke Bullard's first Noblesville team is scheduled to open the season on Tuesday, playing at Western Boone. The Millers' first home game will be the following Friday, March 25, against Guerin Catholic.

Noblesville will be led by six returning starters.

"They bring great leadership and experience to the table," Bullard said.

Noblesville has two pitchers who are among the better hurlers in Hamilton County and in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference.

Junior Brooke Herron, who also will play some in left field, last season led Hamilton County with a 0.92 ERA. Senior Kristin Melloh posted a 1.92 ERA.

Those stats were compiled with a Noblesville team which won the sectional and defeated Kokomo in the regional before falling to Lake Central.

Second baseman/left fielder Karley Blankenship, center fielder Kimi Box, right fielder/first baseman Hayley Lutz and Melloh are seniors who are projected to be in the starting lineup.

"When factoring in the young talent also within the program, myself and my coaching staff are very excited about the upcoming year," Bullard said. "There is a lot of talent in our county and our conference. We are extremely excited for the season to get started, but also know what tough battles are ahead."

Juniors projected in that lineup are Herron, Maddie Moore at third base, and Brooke Rundle behind the plate.

Last season Moore hit .532, the fourth best batting average in the county.

Heights bidding again

Hamilton Heights graduated six seniors last season, five of whom were regular starters on a team which finished 17-10 and won a regional championship.

"Right now we have some big holes to fill, especially in the middle infield," said Coach Landi Lockwood. "We are trying to find girls who can step into those positions and find a few girls to step into the leadership roles."

Heights' pitching looks strong with the return of junior Ashley Roberts, who last season posted an 11-5 record and a 2.31 ERA. She fanned 86 batters in 103 innings. Also expected to see time on the hill are sophomore Emily Wright and freshman Adyson Baber. Last season Roberts hit .427 and knocked home 14 runs.

Sophomore Jessica Kaurich will do most of the catching. She batted .310 and drove 21, Zionsville, 5:30 p.m. home 13 runs as a freshman.

Junior Claire Schildmeier is back at third base and junior Ashton Runner is back in the outfield. Sophomore Taylor Ewing played both infield and outfield last season.

"Our middle infield is up for grabs," said Lockwood. "Right now we are looking at Ewing and possibly juniors Mickey Stupp and Shelby Wills.'

First base also is up for grabs. Roberts 20, at Tipton, 5 p.m. and Wright could play there some when they aren't pitching or senior Jessica Thuer or freshman Lia Williams. Thuer is the only senior listed on the roster.

"We are also still trying to figure out who will be in the outfield with Runner," Lockwood continued. "Baber, Roberts, Stupp, Ewing and sophomore Jaydn Lutz all 5, at Taylor, 5 p.m. have some experience in the grass.

"We have some girls back from a team 10, at Guerin Catholic, 5 p.m. that won regional," said the coach. "I hope 11, at Westfield, 5:30 p.m. they can use that experience to motivate the 14, Hoosier Conference Tourney. other girls to continue towards our post season goals. For us to be successful this season, girls are going to have to learn more 20, Alexandria, 5 p.m. than one position and learn them well. They

are going to have to be team players and understand their roles on any given night. If they can do that, I really believe we could be just as successful, if not more, than we were last season."

The Lady Huskies are scheduled to open on Monday, hosting Zionsville.


Hill provided a major boost off the bench, scoring 10 points in the fourth quarter and finishing the night with 15 points on 7-of-13 shooting.
