Noblesville Common Council receives...

Parking Task Forces' first recommendations

Two short-term solutions to existing conditions identified by the Downtown Parking Task Force were presented to the Noblesville Common Council on March 15. The ordinance changes were introduced to the council and will be eligible for adoption at the March 29 council meeting.

"I appreciate the hard work that the task force's volunteers have given the city in addressing a serious issue within our city. I also am excited to implement many of the suggestions from the task force this year," Mayor John Ditslear said.

The immediate action recommendations presented to council include:

- Revise Ordinance subsection 72.85-72.86 to allow non-residential parking permits purchased by businesses to be transferable for a one-time processing fee of \$20.
- Revise Ordinance 72.90 to reduce the annual fee for permits in Lot 6 on South Eighth Street from the current fee of \$300 to \$150.

Ditslear created the Parking Task Force in order to examine and address concerns

that have been expressed about parking in downtown Noblesville last year. The task force consists of representatives from the City of Noblesville, the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce, Noblesville Main Street, the Noblesville Common Council, and downtown business owners, merchants and residents.

The task force engaged the Noblesville Police Department to review enforcement procedures and the engineering department for analysis on capacity, utilization and patterns.

"Our goal from the outset was to address real and perceived issues related to current parking policies and regulations, as well as capacity and use in the downtown area. We entered the task with no preconceived plan for action and let the data point the way," said Bob DuBois, Noblesville Chamber of Commerce president and task force leader.

City employees are gathering additional information to address long-term recom-

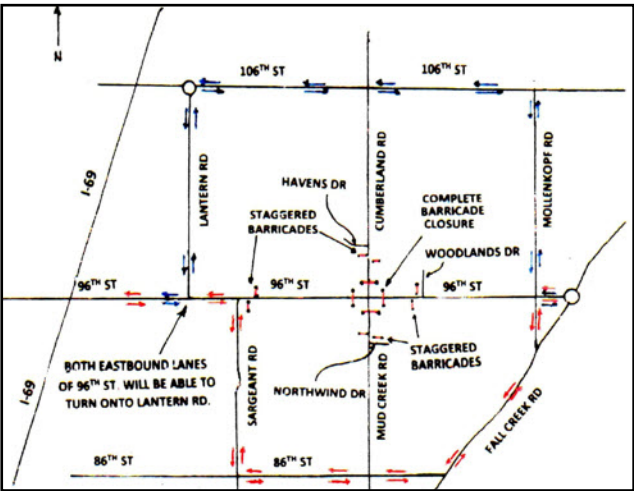

Three-way stop to be installed at 106th and Mollenkopf

Please be advised, effective on or after Monday, March 21, 2016, a three-way stop will be installed at the intersection of 106th Street and Mollenkopf Road. The three-way stop will be a short term measure until a temporary traffic signal can be installed at this location. The temporary traffic signal is being installed to better facilitate the detour traffic from the 96th Street and Cumberland Road closure.

mendations from the task force. Those actions are expected to be presented to the council in the next six to 12 months.

The Noblesville Common Council approved two parking restrictions that were reviewed and recommended by the city’s traffic committee on Tuesday.

The first restriction is for no parking along the north side of Cherry Street for a distance of approximately 70 feet west of 19th Street. The presence of a parked vehicle in this location hinders other motorists from maneuvering the 4-way stop at 19th and Cherry streets.

The second restriction is to establish no parking along both sides of Lafayette Road from Lakeview Drive to State Road 38. The road is too narrow to permit traffic in both directions and on-street parking and also does not have curbs. A high intensity use was recently approved for a parcel of land along the street and it is desirable to restrict any overflow parking from using the roadway.

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Westfield HS earns spot on AP District Honor Roll

In addition to high graduation rates, Westfield High School is making a name for itself in the College Board as well.

Bill Naas, WHS assistant principal, said in the Westfield quarterly magazine that "Westfield Washington Schools is one of thirteen school districts in Indiana (one of only three school districts in the area) being honored by the College Board with placement on the 6th Annual AP® District Honor Roll."

"WWS earned this honor by increasing access to AP course work while simultaneously maintaining or increasing the percentage of students earning scores of 3 or higher on AP Exams," said Naas. "WWS is one of only six school districts in Indiana to receive this honor multiple times. Reaching these goals indicates that WHS is successfully identifying motivated, academically prepared students who are ready for the opportunity of AP."

"AP" stands for Advancement Placement, and is designed to give high school students access to college-level courses. In turn, colleges will give credit if a student earns a high score on an AP exam. Oftentimes schools will give extra weight to a student's grade-point average if he or she takes an AP class. At Westfield High School, students get an extra 1.0 point added to their grade for an AP class for a grade of C- or higher. (That is, if a student gets an "A" in an AP class, he or she would receive 5.0 grade points, as opposed to the regular 4.0.)

Students who take an AP exam are graded from 1 to 5. A score of 3 is referred to as "qualified" by the College Board. "Qualified" means that you have proven yourself capable of doing the work of an introductory-level course in a particular

subject at college," the College Board said on the "About AP Scores" portion of its Web site, which can be accessed at <https://apscore.collegeboard.org/scores/about-ap-scores>.

Westfield has seen steady increases in the number of students taking AP exams, as well as the number of exams taken (students can take more than one AP class) and the pass rate as well. Here's a look at the past three years of AP at Westfield High School.

In 2013, 392 students took 584 AP exams, with a pass rate of 76 percent. Those numbers increased to 486 students taking 791 exams in 2014, with the pass rate rising to 78 percent. In 2015, all three numbers rose dramatically: A total of 612 students took 1178 exams, with a pass rate of 81 percent.

In his article, Naas included the following quote from the College Board: "That the committed teachers and administrators in this district have both expanded AP access and also helped their students achieve high levels of performance on AP Exams shows they're delivering opportunity in their schools and classrooms," said Trevor Packer, the College Board's Senior Vice President of AP and Instruction. "Congratulations to these teachers and administrators, and to their hard-working students."

Naas closed his article by saying, "Helping more students learn at a higher level and earn higher AP scores is an objective of all members of WWS, from teachers to school and district administrators, as we believe the skills learned through rigorous work best prepares students for success after graduation."

Westfield boasts area's highest graduation rate

Even in an area that features high schools with excellent graduation rates, Westfield High School stands out.

In an article in the March 16 WHS quarterly newsletter, assistant principal Kevin Scanlon said that Westfield's "graduation rate was the highest among area schools," with 98.2 percent of the 2015 cohort class receiving their diploma.

"In a culture of high expectations and rigor for all, students and staff have met those challenges head on and have been very successful," said Scanlon. "Westfield High School is very proud of the students and the staff as we reflect upon this accomplishment."

Westfield's 98.2 percent rate compares with schools such as Zionsville (98.1 percent), Avon (97.3 percent) Brownsburg (97.2 percent) and West Lafayette (96.8 percent). As for other Hamilton County schools, they have outstanding graduation rates as well: Carmel's was 96.8 percent, Hamilton Southeastern's was 96.3 percent, Noblesville's rate was 94.3 percent and Fishers had 93.8 percent of students graduate.

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

Fishers looks strong this spring

Aaron Woosley compares this season of Fishers softball to last season as being as different as night and day.

“Coming into this season compared to last season when I had just been hired is like night and day,” said the coach.

“The team has been through an entire season of conditioning and a weight program and we are so much stronger than we were last year,” Woosley explained. “Plus the familiarity with the players and coaching staff has gotten closer. We’ve had time to get to know one another.”

Fishers has one change on its coaching staff, adding Bridget Langan, a teacher at Fishers who played softball at Indiana University. She also was an assistant coach at Bloomington South for three years.

The strength of the team could be its battery, pitchers Gabbi Schnaiter and Stephanie Green and catcher Alyssa Chavez.

“They have been together for two years,” pointed out Woosley. “The three of them have developed some very good chemistry and they work well together.”

Schnaiter, a senior this spring, last season posted a 1.33 ERA, third best in Hamilton County. Green, also a senior, last year had a 2.29 ERA.

“I am very excited to see Briona Rance (a first baseman) in her sophomore season,” Woosley continued. “Last year Rance was just edged out by Chavez for team batting average and I know that the two of them will be competing for that top honor again this year.”

Chavez hit .391. “Our biggest unknown will be our outfield,” said Woosley. “We have three new starters at those positions, junior Aliyah Guillian, junior Janey Schmidt and senior Kylee James. They have some speed, but right now they are untested.

“I am really looking forward to getting the season started and to warmer, drier weather. It will be great to get out of the gym and onto the field. It is going to be an exciting year for the Tigers,” the coach added.

The season will begin on the road next Monday when the Tigers travel to Kokomo. Their home opener will be March 24 against Lawrence Central.

Wood playing for St. Bonaventure

As the nation is gripped by the madness of the college basketball tournaments, attention turns to some of the schools that don't normally get attention.

Yes, you have your Stony Brooks, Northern Iowas, Middle Tennessees and the like. But there are a few Noblesville people paying attention to the St. Bonaventure women's basketball team, mostly because a former Lady Miller is on the roster.

Erin Wood, a 2015 graduate of Noblesville, got to play some minutes as a freshman on the Bonnies' women's basketball team this year. Wood played in nine games, making her debut in St. Bonaventure's second game of the season, a Nov. 15 Pre-season WNIT tournament game to then-No. 22 ranked DePaul.

Wood made an assist in that game, her first official statistic at the college level. She scored her first ever points two weeks later, when the Bonnies defeated Buffalo 59-32. Wood made both of her free throw attempts to get in the book for that game and the season.

In her 10 games, Wood has scored six times, either one or two points. Her total for the season is 10 points, giving her an average of 1.1 points per game. Wood also collected two rebounds in St. Bonaventure's Dec. 23 win over Niagara; she has five boards for the season.

St. Bonaventure, a 10th seed in the NCAA Women's Tournament, beat seventh seed Oklahoma State 65-54 on Friday in its first round game at Corvallis, Ore. Next up for the Bonnies is No. 2 seed Oregon State; that game is scheduled for 9 p.m. Sunday in Corvallis.

Over in the men's tournament, Butler won its first-round game Thursday. The No. 9 seed Bulldogs took care of No. 8 seed Texas Tech 71-61 in Raleigh, N.C. Butler gets the top seed in the Midwest regional, Virginia, in a game that tips at 7:10 p.m. It will be telecast nationally on TBS.

Hamilton Heights fans will remember the man who wears "00" for the Bulldogs: Austin Etherington. An Indiana All-Star for the Huskies, Etherington transferred to Butler starting with the 2014-15 season after three years at Indiana University. His father Brett played for the Bulldogs (1987-91).

Etherington has come off the bench and played well for the Bulldogs, averaging 3.7 points per game. His season high is 18 points in Butler's March 5 win over Marquette; Etherington also dropped 17 points Feb. 16 against Creighton. Against Texas

Tech, Etherington made a free throw, and also had two steals and a rebound.

While the Bulldogs advanced, things weren't as good for Purdue on Thursday. The fifth seeded Boilermakers were upset in overtime by No. 12 University of Arkansas-Little Rock, 85-83.

The loss ended the college career of A.J. Hammons, who played ball for Carmel for two years before transferring to the Oak Hill Prep School. Hammons returned to Indiana to play for the Boilers, and became a star. He was part of the Big Ten's All-Freshman Team in 2012-13 and Second Team All-Big Ten in 2015.

Hammons led Purdue's scoring this season with 15 points per game, and grabbed 8.2 rebounds per game, just behind freshman Caleb Swanigan's 8.3 boards per game. In the Boilermakers' loss, Hammons scored 16 points and pulled 15 rebounds.

While Hammons' Boilermaker career is ending, Ryan Cline's Purdue journey is just beginning. The 2015 Carmel graduate played in all 35 of the Boilers' games, averaging 3.9 points per contest. Cline came out in his very first college game and drained four 3-pointers on his way to 13 points. For the season, Cline nailed 42 3-point baskets. He finished the UALR game with one point, but also had two rebounds and an assist.

Even with Hammons' graduation, the number of Hamilton County players on the court for Purdue will likely be two next season. Grant Weatherford, another Hamilton Heights product, was redshirted this season, and is anticipated to be playing for the 2016-17 campaign.

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
