Atlanta wants an investigation...

Did Jackson Township delete e-mails?

On Wednesday the Hamilton County Reporter published an article regarding a complaint filed with the Indiana Public Access Counselor that alleges members of the Jackson Township Board and Township Trustee Chris Miller violated the Open Door Law and Indiana Public Access Act when making a decision to dissolve the Jackson Fire Territory.

The Indiana Public Access Counselor's Office has now identified the person filing the complaint as Mary Smith, Cicero In.

In the narrative section of the formal complaint, Mary Smith wrote, "Chris and I spoke again around February 25 and she told me Jeff Roberts and Glen Schwartz (board members) told her to delete e-mails that the town of Atlanta lawyer was requesting from her. The e-mails were about their decision behind closed doors to leave the territory. She said she was deleting e-mails."

Atlanta officials confirmed they recently requested Jackson Township release all

e-mails between Jeff Peters (a financial advisor for the township), board members and township Trustee Chris Miller.

As part of the complaint Smith submitted cell phone records of a text message chain. Those records have been obtained by the Hamilton County Reporter.

"The records provided to the Reporter are photocopies of what appears to be a cell phone screen that displays a chain of text messages. Jeff Roberts' name appears at the top of the photocopied screen along with Roberts' cell phone number," stated Hamilton County Reporter Publisher Jeff Jellison.

In the complaint Smith indicated a cell phone was left laying in front of her allowing her to view the text messages.

The photocopies indicate a chain of text messages occurred on Thursday, February 25 beginning at 9:35 a.m. with a text that states, "Robin requesting all emails between peters board members and me." The text message was responded to at 9:36 a.m. by a

person identified as J, "Can you legly give them to her?" That message was followed by the original sender at 9:37 a.m. stating, "I have to. Public request. Jeanette is looking into it. She wants all contracts etc." J responded at 9:38 a.m, "If so, we would like all emails between ATL board and their attorney." The original sender replied at 9:44 a.m. stating, I'm calling u." J responded at 11:58 a.m, "I've been talking to Glen on the phone. May want to delete some emails."

When asked about the text messages following Wednesday's Jackson Township Board meeting Roberts told the Reporter "I don't want to respond to that right now. I don't know what emails I would delete." Roberts followed that statement by saying, "Things were said in private that were meant to be kept in private."

Atlanta Town Board member John Phifer told the Reporter he believes enough information has come forward to justify an investigation concerning the potential of public information being deleted from Jackson Township records.

Indiana statute 5-16-6-8 states:

A public official or other person who recklessly, knowingly, or intentionally destroys or damages any public record commits a Level 6 felony unless: (1) the commission shall have given its approval in writing that the public records may be destroyed; (2) the commission shall have entered its approval for destruction of the public records on its own minutes; or (3) authority for destruction of the records is granted by an approved retention schedule established under this chapter.

Precision Products relocating HQ to Carmel

Precision Products Group announced plans today to grow its operations in Indiana, relocating its College Park, Maryland, headquarters to Carmel and expanding its existing manufacturing operations in Fort Wayne.

The company will also install manufacturing equipment from its Maryland facilities into operations of its Fort Wayne subsidiaries, Paramount Tube and Aardvark Straws, which operate at both 1430 Progress Road and 2701 S. 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Westfield begins spring cleanup effort

Spring is here and the city is launching the Westfield Cleanup Initiative.

“As Westfield continues to grow, we think it’s important to keep that same sense of small town pride in our community,” Mayor Andy Cook said. “Residents and visitors to our community deserve clean roads to drive on, clean neighborhoods to live in and clean parks to play in.”

The city is partnering with Brickman to clean Westfield’s major thoroughfares, totaling 88 miles of roadway. The city will also begin to oversee the

cleanup along U.S. 31 within Westfield’s city limits.

This cleanup will focus on motorists discarding trash from their vehicles, illegal dumping and construction debris.

The city will also host a heavy trash drop-off day on Saturday May 14 from 8 a.m. to Noon at the city services facility located at 2728 E 171st Street. A second heavy trash day will occur in October. More details to come on the drop-off events.

Overnight I-69 lane restrictions to locate utility lines

Milestone Contractors will close one lane of northbound and southbound Interstate 69 in various locations between 106th Street (mile marker 204) and State Road 38 (Exit 219) this week during overnight hours.

Crews will be locating utility lines along I-69 between 9 p.m. and 6 a.m. on Thursday and Friday nights to prepare for construction of a third travel lane from State Road 37 (Exit 205) to north of State Road 38 (Exit 219). Weather permitting, the overnight work will resume next week.

About the project

The Indiana Finance Authority (IFA) and the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) selected a \$92 million proposal from design-build team Milestone Contractors and United Consulting Engineers to add a travel lane to the median in each direction from State Road 37 to north of State

Road 38 and add a southbound lane to the shoulder between the 116th Street entrance ramp and the future 106th Street exit ramp.

In addition, the project will reconfigure the Campus Parkway interchange (Exit 210) into a diverging-diamond design to improve traffic flow, widen the Campus Parkway bridge over I-69, lower the pavement on State Road 13 (Exit 214) under I-69 and replace the Brooks School Road and Madison County Road 650W bridge decks over I-69.

Construction is anticipated to begin this spring and continue through 2017. INDOT, Milestone and United will announce a public meeting in the near future to present a project schedule, construction sequencing and maintenance of traffic plans for what is planned to be a two-year construction project.

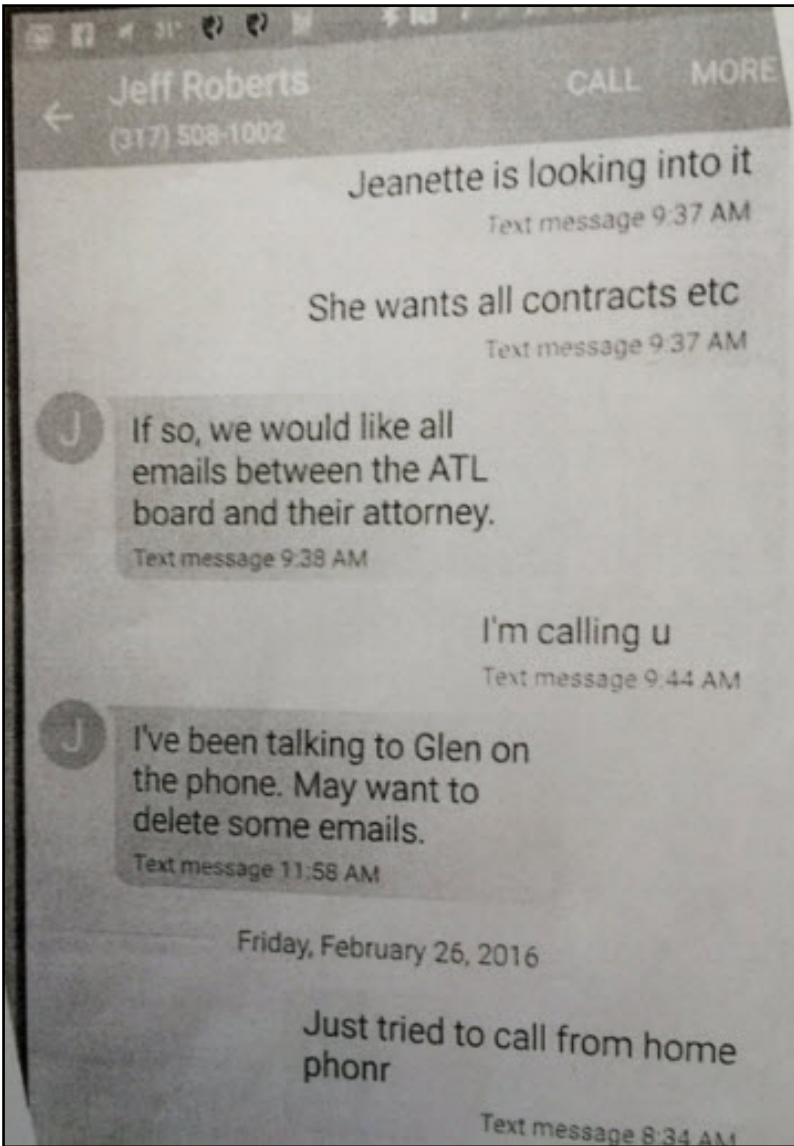
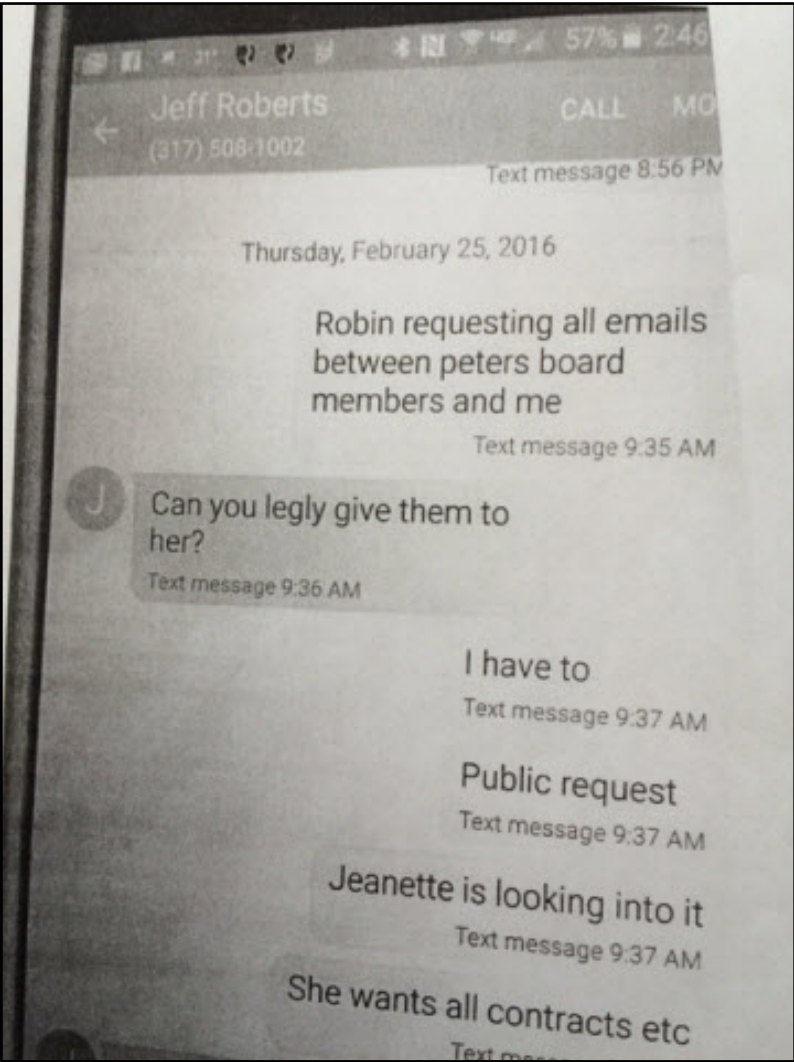

DAR's Horseshoe Prairie Chapter celebrates "Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day"

Last week the Horseshoe Prairie Chapter, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, hosted an open house for Vietnam veterans to celebrate "Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day" the date of the final withdrawal of U.S. troops from Vietnam. The day commemorates the sacrifices of Vietnam veterans and is part of a national effort to recognize the men and women who were denied a proper welcome upon returning home more than 40 years ago. This past year, the Daughters of the American Revolution have commemorated the 50th anniversary of the beginning of the War. It is our intent and privilege to honor these veterans who have spent many years post-war without a show of appreciation by the general population. The Vietnam veterans who attended the open house were thanked personally by members of the local Chapter, were given commemorative lapel pins provided to the Chapter by the U. S. Department of Defense, and enjoyed refreshments while catching up and chatting with other Vietnam veterans. Living United States veterans who served on active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces from November 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975, regardless of location, are eligible to receive one lapel pin. If you are a Vietnam

veteran and would like to receive one of the commemorative lapel pins, contact your local American Legion or VFW Post and we will provide those until we run out - our stock is limited so please contact them soon if you are interested. The attendees of last week's event will also receive a special certificate that is provided only to Vietnam veterans by the DAR.

Several of the veterans attending the event shared their stories with Chapter members as well as with other veterans. In particular I would like to share with the readers that one of the veterans told me that it was suggested that he not wear his uniform upon his arrival back in the United States as harm might come to him due to the controversy of that War and the ensuing protests. He did not change out of uniform, and although no physical harm came to him upon arrival, he endured many negative comments, looks, and general apathy as did many of our service men and women during that period of upheaval in our country. From that time forward, he indicated, he had never been personally thanked for his service until the open house event last week. If you are aware of a Vietnam veteran in your neighborhood, place of worship, or any other opportunity

avails itself, please step forward to thank them. Nearly 60,000 American soldiers lost their lives in Vietnam, and those who returned were often shunned and ignored. These young men, some enlisted and some draftees, were put into harm's way in a brutal and unfamiliar terrain and culture. No longer young men, many still carry physical and emotional injuries from that time long ago. I wish to recognize as well the women who bravely served in Vietnam, many of them serving fellow soldiers in life-saving capacities. Let's make sure we let them know how much we appreciate them, and all of our military service veterans.

The Horseshoe Prairie Chapter works to recognize and thank all service veterans as well as providing education and patriotic projects throughout Hamilton County. Membership in the Daughters of the American Revolution is based upon a woman's direct ancestry to a Patriot who served as a soldier in the Revolutionary War or who served in a civilian capacity to directly aid the Revolutionary War. 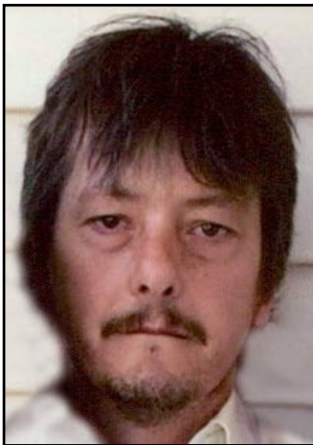

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
