Sheriff Bowen warns county residents of...

Telephone jury duty scam

Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen is once again reminding area residents of a pervasive telephone scam that leaves victims open to theft and identity theft. The jury duty scam, along with the IRS scam, tax warrant scam, relative in need scam, home improvement scam, and others, come and go in cycles but all require potential victims to be aware of the issues. Most recently, the jury duty scam has once again come to the forefront.

The jury duty scam work like this:

The scammer calls claiming to work for the local court of Sheriff's office and informs the victim of a failure to report for jury duty. The victim is told that an arrest warrant

has been issued for failure to report for jury duty. The victim will rightly claim that a jury duty notification was never received. The scammer will then either pressure the victim into sending money by prepaid credit card or wire transfer to take care of the warrant or ask the victim for confidential information to "verify" the warrant. Caller ID may show the call originating from an official number and the scammer may provide a callback number.

Arrest warrants in Hamilton County are never served by telephone. To verify an active warrant, call 317-776-9800, option 2. Do not assume Caller ID or a callback number are legitimate. Scammers may also use names of

local law enforcement officers or court officials to make the call seem more realistic. Do not be tempted to give out private information such as date of birth, social security number, or credit card numbers over the phone. Never be pressured into making a hasty decision over the telephone and always think twice before sending money by prepaid card or wire transfer. Transactions like these are nearly impossible to trace once sent.

Anyone receiving a potential scam call may contact Hamilton County Communications at 317-773-1282 to be connected to the appropriate law enforcement agency.

For culvert replacement...

SR 32 to close 14 days in July

Contractors for the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) plan to temporarily close State Road 32 west of Westfield this summer to replace a drainage culvert under the highway.

The culvert is located one-half mile east of the Boone County line and channels storm water drainage to the Woodruff Branch of Little Eagle Creek. The new structure will measure 7 feet tall by 20 feet wide and 60 feet long.

3D Company of Muncie plans to close the highway at the work site for up to 14 days beginning approximately one week after Independence Day (July 4). A specific closure date will be announced in June.

During the closure of State Road 32, a signed detour will direct highway traffic north to State Road 47 via US 421 and US 31. Local motorists are encouraged to plan ahead and seek their best alternate route.

3D Company was awarded the contract because its bid of \$357,500 was the lowest of seven bids submitted for the project.

Threatening Twitter comment prompts Noblesville Police investigation

The Noblesville Police Department is investigating a threatening comment made on Twitter late Wednesday night.

At approximately 11:23 p.m., the Noblesville Police Department opened an investigation into an incident involving threatening comments posted on Twitter. The comments made reference to the Noblesville High School and as a result, school

officials were contacted. Since that time, investigators and school officials have been in non-stop communication with one another in order to ensure that all parties involved have the most up-to-date information.

Earlier this morning, investigators spoke with two individuals thought to have information about the incident. After further investigation, those individuals were

released. At this time, investigators from the police department continue to work on the case. Currently, there are no suspects or persons of interest. As with any ongoing investigation, information is subject to change with each passing minute.

racially derogatory Twitter post made yesterday by one of our high school students.

"The safety and security of our students and staff is our top priority and we immediately engaged law enforcement and have been carefully monitoring this situation throughout the night.

"Based on consultation with the Noblesville Police Department, school will be in session today as usual. We will be providing increased police presence at the high school today for extra assurance of safety.

Additionally, we have addressed the racially inappropriate tweet with significant consequences for the student in question. We do not condone that type of behavior and are passionate about creating an environment where all our students feel safe and respected."

The school provided this update to parents at approximately 11:30 a.m.:

"Hopefully by now all our of staff and parents are aware that an email communica-

tion went out this morning informing our community that a threat of violence was made on Twitter against Noblesville High School. The threat was related to a racially derogatory Twitter post a high school student made yesterday.

"The Noblesville Police Department informed us this morning that they had two individuals they were questioning related to this case. They have updated us now that those individuals have been released and their investigation is still active and ongoing. In consultation with the police, school is in session at NHS today as usual.

"We will continue to provide an enhanced police presence at the high school both today and tomorrow, and will update you with further information as it becomes available. Any persons with information about the threat should contact the Noblesville Police Department."

Organizer of donation receives Sagamore of the Wabash award...

ISP receives donation of 50 automatic external defibrillators

Indiana Governor Mike Pence and Indiana State Police Superintendent Doug Carter thanked Pierre Twer, founder of Bolt for the Heart, for the donation of more than 50 Automatic External Defibrillators (AED) at a press conference held earlier today at the Indiana Farm Bureau Building on the State Fairgrounds.

The donation of the AED's to the state police was borne the result of an experience Pierre had while running in the 2010 Boston Marathon. During that race Pierre witnessed another marathon runner suffer a cardiac arrest. That runner was saved by an AED.

This inspired Pierre to collaborate with Heart Reach Carmel and establish the Bolt For The Heart 5K Family Thanksgiving Run, of which 2015 was the fourth year for the run. Since its inception, this 5K run has grown from 41 runners to nearly 2,000 that participated this past Thanksgiving Day.

Each year since the run started 100% of the proceeds have been used to purchase AED's for donation to not for profit organizations.

In 2015, the Board of Directors of Bolt For The Heart identified the Indiana State Police as the recipient of AED's from funds raised in the 2015 Thanksgiving Day run, which ISP Supt. Carter was also a registered runner. In fact Supt. Carter ran the entire 5K run in full state police uniform!

Enough money was raised to donate 50 AED's to the Indiana State Police. The AED's presented to the state police today will be strategically placed in more rural parts of Indiana where a state police officer could be the first to arrive at a medical emergency.

At today's press conference it was also announced the Board of Directors of Bolt For The Heart designated the Indiana State Police as the 'primary benefactor' to continue receiving AED's until every state police road patrol car is equipped with this life saving device. There was also a surprise announcement that enough money was raised to purchase five more AED's that will be presented to the ISP in late April.

Also present at the press conference was state police Corporal Dan Becker, accompanied by Rick & Amanda Thacker, grandchildren of German Rivera. On Dec. 28, 2015, German Rivera suffered a heart attack while in a car with his adult grandchildren. They pulled into the ISP Lowell Post to seek assistance. Rick Thacker shared their story how the AED at the state police post was used to administer a shock to revive his grandfather. After

follow-up medical attention, Mr. Rivera made a full recovery and returned to his home in Florida.

One of the many highlights of today's event was the presentation, by Governor Mike Pence, of a Sagamore of the Wabash to Pierre Twer. This is the highest honor an Indiana Governor can bestow upon a citizen in recognition of their distinguished service to the State of Indiana.

At the conclusion of the press conference attending troopers were issued their AED's and placed window stickers on their patrol cars to easily identify the police vehicle was equipped with an AED.

Andrew James "Jim" Lagomarcino, 88, died at The Residences at Thomas Circle Senior Living in Washington, DC, January 9, 2016. Jim was a member of the Cathedral of St. Matthew the Apostle. Jim was born in Burlington, Iowa March 10th, 1927. Son of the late Ida (Snyder) Lagomarcino and Andrew Sylvester Lagomarcino.

Jim graduated High School in 1944, a member of National Honor society and earning eight varsity letters in athletics. He was an Eagle Scout. He attended the University of Iowa and started for the Hawkeyes Football team. In early 1945 he enlisted in the US Navy, serving aboard the USS Marine Phoenix as a Pharmacists Mate in the Pacific theater during WW II. He returned to college after discharge from the Navy. He worked as a Park Ranger at Yellowstone National Park in 1948. He graduated from college in 1949 and started working in his family business, Lagomarcino-Grupe Wholesale fruit and vegetable company for two years. Jim then worked at Keokuk Electro-Metals Company in Human Resources, editing their employee magazine for eight years. During this time Jim was President of the Iowa Industrial Editors Association. Jim was offered a position with Perfect Circle, editing their in house magazine, the Magic Circle, in 1960 and moved his family to Hagerstown Indiana. After Dana Corporation acquired Perfect Circle Jim wanted to stay in Hagerstown and became a lifelong entrepreneur and publisher. He became part owner of V-Plex Clutch Corporation, helping manage and selling their products. Jim later purchased the Hagerstown Exponent newspaper with former co-worker Floyd Lacy from Perfect Circle. Jim published the Hagerstown Exponent weekly newspaper and administered printing production for Exponent Publishers until his retirement.

Jim was a member of Rotary Club-Paul Harris Fellow, Hagerstown/Nettle Creek School Corporation School Board, Wayne County Chamber of commerce, and past President of the Indiana Republican Editorial Association. Jim enjoyed working in his spare time as a High School and College Football Official, playing in his local poker club, playing bridge and Golf.

Jim was preceded in death by his sister, Joanne (Lagomarcino) Hurst, son Mark Andrew Lagomarcino, granddaughter Sarah Frances (David) Lagomarcino, wife Mary Jane "Janie" (Ellison) Lagomarcino, and companion Virginia "Ginny" (Jessen) Kraatz.

Survivors include sons, Joseph "Joe" Lagomarcino and David (Jennifer) Lagomarcino. Jacqueline "Jackie" (Mark) Lagomarcino. Grandchildren, Andrew (Reshma) Lagomarcino and Meghan (Lagomarcino) (Nick) Smith, Son and daughter of Mark. Anne (Esteban) (Lagomarcino) Sagredo, Nancy Lagomarcino, Daughters of Joe, and Hope Lagomarcino, daughter of David. Hoosier State Relays are Saturday

Several of Indiana's high school track and field teams began their outdoor season this week - or tried to. Rain forced a cancellation of Westfield's Thursday opener with Brownsburg.

But there's still one bit of indoor track and field business that needs to be settled, and no rain can stop it: The Hoosier State Relays take place Saturday at Purdue University.

The relays are divided up into two competitions. The small school division consists of schools that are in Classes 1A, 2A and 3A in football, with the large school division making up those schools in Classes 4A, 5A and 6A. In both divisions, the top 24 qualifiers in each event (except for high jump and pole vault, which take the top 18), compete for a championship.

The small schools will start their meet at 8 a.m., with the large schools beginning at 2 p.m.

Hamilton County is well-represented in both divisions. In the small school list, Hamilton Heights' Michael DeFoe is the top seed in the men's 60-meter hurdles; his qualifying time is 8.28 seconds. DeFoe is also seeded fourth in the long jump and sixth in the 60 dash. Guerin Catholic's top qualifier on the men's side is Carter McGinnis, with an eighth seed in the long jump.

In the women's events, the Golden Eagles have two second seeds, in the 4x200 relay and the distance medley relay. The Huskies are seeded ninth in the 4x400 relay.

Meanwhile, all five of Hamilton County's large schools will have competitors Friday. There are five top seeds, three in the women's competition and two in the men's competition.

Carmel's Sarah Leinheiser, this school year's individual cross country state champion, is the top seed in the women's 3200

run with a qualifying time of 10:45.02. Leinheiser is one of four Greyhounds in the event, with Stacy Morozov (sixth), Christina Geisler (eighth) and Rachel Anderson (14th) also in the running.

Carmel also has the top seed in the women's distance medley with a time of 12:37.72. Westfield leads the women's 4x800 relay qualifying in a time of 9:36.27. Hamilton County has four of the top five seeds in that race: After the Shamrocks, Carmel is second, Noblesville is third and Hamilton Southeastern is fifth. Fishers is seeded 15th. The Tigers' highest seed is third in the women's 4x200 relay.

Men's top seeds are Carmel's Ryan Lipe in the pole vault; his best leap is 16-6. The Royals are the first seed in the distance medley with a time of 10:35.78.

IBCA/Subway boys all-state honors set



Myles Turner has big birthday...

Pacers get home win over Pelicans

Myles Turner celebrated his 20th birthday in style. The rookie forward recorded his third career double-double to lead the Pacers (38-33) to a 92-84 win over the injury-riddled New Orleans Pelicans (26-44) at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.
With his parents watching from the stands, Turner scored 24 points on 11-of-17 shooting, blocked three shots, and collected a career-high 16 rebounds in the victory.

"I was just attacking," the rookie said. "I wanted to be a lot more aggressive on the boards. Coach told me he wants me to get on the boards more, so (I'm) making an extra effort to go out and do that."
Pelicans starting point guard Jrue Holiday was a late scratch before the game due to a left toe injury. Holiday's absence meant New Orleans — already ravaged by injuries to stars like Anthony Davis and Eric Gordon — took the floor without its six top scorers from the team's regular roster. The Pelicans had just eight available players against the Pacers, including backup guard Tim Frazier, who

signed a 10-day contract on March 16 after the NBA granted the team an injury exception to add an extra player to the roster.
As one might have expected, the Pacers got off to a fast start offensively. Paul George played at an All-Star level in the first quarter, scoring 11 points on 4-of-6 shooting. Turner added eight points in the period, going 4-for-5 from the field and throwing down a vicious one-handed dunk that sent his dad into hysterics in the stands.





Still, the Pelicans' makeshift lineup hung tough in the first half. The Pelicans actually led as late as the 6:11 mark in the second quarter before the Blue & Gold put together a run.

Once again, Turner was the star over that stretch. The birthday boy scored eight consecutive points to help the Pacers create some separation. All in all, Indiana outscored New Orleans 17-6 over the final 6:10 of the half to take a double-digit lead into the locker room. Turner even put an exclamation point on his performance by blocking Frazier as the halftime buzzer sounded.

"That kid just plays as hard as he can every time he's out there," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel said. "Sometimes he makes mistakes, sometimes he gets it going."

"He's a big-time threat. He's improving and he's working hard on the defensive end. He did have a little bit of an extra bounce tonight."

The Pacers maintained a multiple-possession lead throughout the third quarter, but suffered a bit of a scare when George's leg collided with Alonzo Gee's on a defensive possession. The All-Star forward was diagnosed with

a right lower leg contusion (the same leg he injured last season) and did not return.

"I just got kneed," George said after the game. "Nothing too serious, hopefully. It's a day to day thing right now."

C.J. Miles stepped up in George's absence. The veteran swingman subbed in for PG with 7:31 left in the third quarter and promptly knocked down a pair of threes and a floater in the lane. He added five quick points in the fourth quarter when head coach Frank Vogel went small and Miles took advantage of a mismatch against Pelicans center Alexis Ajinca.

Miles — who had scored in double figures just once in the past month prior to Thursday — said after the win that he sought out some easy shots early in the game, knocking down a couple 12-foot jumpers, that helped him find an offensive rhythm.

"I got in the lane," Miles said. "I tried to hit little runners, get close shots. I need to start building my confidence back up, just as far as fluidity with my jump shots and getting open looks."

To their credit, the Pelicans continued to battle all evening. New Orleans eventually made it an 88-84 game

with 1:03 to play when Toney Douglas — who spent training camp with the Pacers before being waived just before the start of the regular season — hit a layup, stole the ball on the other end, and then buried a 3-pointer.

But Miles knocked down both of his free throws and the Pacers got a stop on the other end to seal the victory.

Miles finished the night as Indiana's second-leading scorer, collecting 19 points while going 7-for-14 from the field and 3-for-8 from 3-point range. George finished with 15 points on 6-of-9 shooting in just under 20 minutes of action.

Ajinca led New Orleans with 22 points and nine rebounds. Frazier chipped in 18 points, five rebounds, and five assists off the bench. Gee added 17 and Douglas finished with 13 in the loss.

Thursday's win concluded a five-game homestand for the Pacers, who went 3-2 over that stretch. Indiana will head to Brooklyn on Saturday before returning to Indianapolis for three more games at The Fieldhouse against the Rockets, Bulls, and Magic.
