

The purchase was aided by Dick Richwine, local realtor, who made up the difference between what the township had to spend and what the previous owners wanted for the land. And, since the acquisition Township Board member Doug Allman has pitched in to help with deciding what vegetation should be encouraged and which should be removed.

Boy Scouts will soon be working on a canoe launch site on Fall Creek at the park which is about a mile upstream from Geist Reservoir. So, the public site is coming together in the rapidly developing township where scenic land is scarce and all land is very expensive land.

While we have a good county park the efforts system. to create Fall Creek Park might serve as a model for other town and township administrations because it won't be long before Hamilton County ground with preservation potential will all be sold for housing or commercial development.

didates for governor, U.S. Senator, 5th District Congressman, state senators and state representatives as well as county offices and political party positions of precinct committee chair and state convention delegates.

Interest is especially high in the contest for delegates to the national party conventions where voters may express a preference for delegates favoring one of the presidential candidates in either the Republican or Democratic race.

County residents may check the county government website to see that they are properly registered, where they vote, or how to get an absentee ballot. Early voting for the primary starts May 5 at the elections office in the Government and Judicial Center. A photo ID is required.

Candidates nominated in the primary will appear on the November general election ballot. Locally there are expected to be few if any Democrats running for county office thereby giving the offices to Republicans who are successful in May.

Councilman vows to get services to Atlanta, Arcadia

I would just like to say that this is unbelievable. The whole reason that the territory was formed was because not in 2015, \$9,913.02. In 2014 there was \$116,272.39 that resolution to pull out of the territory 2-10-2016. one of us could support our fire departments and an ambulance service on our own.

In 2011 Jackson Township, Town of Atlanta and the Town of Arcadia created the Jackson Fire Territory on a shoe string budget and with a great deal of hard work by many people. The territory is bigger and better than ever. DLGF (Department of Local Government Finance) has given the territory a tax levy that has more than doubled since 2011.

When I became the representative for the Town of the provider unit (Jackson Township) was not following the interlocal agreement. I brought this to everyone's attention and nothing has been done.

The provider unit was using a financial advisor that was paid with fire territory money but the territory board members never got any reports from him. The provider unit told Atlanta and Arcadia that the advisor said that their COIT money (local tax) was to be given to the territory. We were also told that if the towns did not give it to the territory that the territory would go under. That did not happen and we are doing just fine.

The next thing that the provider unit came up with was that the advisor did a 5 year long term review for the territory in 2014 that would start in 2015. Again no reports from the advisor and the provider unit used her numbers and chart that she called her down and dirty numbers that did not add up by several thousand dollars.

In 2014 there was \$10,733.06 of EMS money used and to their building out of territory funds and then signed a was brought in from runs and put into that account. 2015 there was \$77,507.77; this account just keeps getting bigger and is not used by the provider unit like it should be used. As of December 2015 there is \$300,217.72 in the EMS account. This account is controlled by the provider unit, not the fire territory.

The reason given by the Jackson Township board for withdrawing was financial concern for the township. I don't see any way that would be the reason.

The provider unit is responsible for any over budget They refused to do so and continued to be the provider unit for the fire territory.

The Jackson Fire Territory as never had a problem with meeting the budget approved by the provider unit. There is carry over money every year and funds that have been encumbered (to spend money from the previous year's budget). Like I said this does not include the \$300,217.72 dollars of EMS money carried over.

The provider unit says that they have a financial concern but they didn't have any concerns when it came to spending fire territory money on their building.

Since the fire territory was started the Jackson Township building got the sleeping quarters remodeled. They say financial concern is their reason for pulling out. They turn around and say that nothing will change and the residents will get the same service and no one will lose their job. If what I have heard is true they will lose about \$100,000.00 out of the budget that the territory is operating on now. And the other thing that I have heard is it may be a lot more than that.

If they are concerned now, how do they think that they can provide the same service with less money.

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

The leadoff man for Fishers will be junior Andy Bennett, with classmate Caleb Brenczewski batting second. Also in the lineup are sophomore Craig Yoho, junior Brendan Toungate, sophomore Matthew Wolff, junior Taylor Soper and senior Mike Folta, who is batting ninth.

Folta looks to be a key outfielder, while Toungate will go between catcher and The big strength for the Tigers will be center field. Yoho is slated for second base, shortstop or catcher. Senior first baseman Christian Chapman is currently injured, but upon his return will be a three-year Fishers starter.

Sheridan opens late

Sheridan will be one of the Hamilton County baseball teams last out of the gate. the Blackhawks opening on April 5 at Tindley. Sheridan's first home appearance isn't until April 16 against Tri-Central in a double-header.

"This team is young," reported Coach Matt Britt, "but we return some key players."

Sam Crail has recovered from an ACL tear and figures to be Sheridan's opening day shortstop and No. 2 pitcher behind Kyle Harwood.

"Crail and Harwood threw the ball well in our scrimmage against Frankfort, and both hit well," said Britt. "Crail homered."

After those top two pitchers Sheridan has freshman Jake O'Hara, sophomore Cole Cummings and freshman Kyle Archer.

"Defensivley we have some work to do," continued the coach, "but we have plenty of players that can get the job done. Archer, Sam Wetherald, and Cummings will be our primary outfield. O'Hara, Crail, Branden Kinkead and Sean Speck will be used around the infield.

"I feel we'll improve as the season goes on, and I think that if we can play our best baseball at the end of the season we'll give ourselves a chance to compete for a sectional championship," Britt added.

Defending HCC champions...

'Rocks have high expectations again

The expectations are always high for the Westfield baseball team.

Not just for the Shamrocks themselves, but also by the standards of the state. Westfield is ranked No. 7 in the coaches poll and No. 16 by Indiana Prep Baseball Report. A good deal of that is based on the fact that last year's Shamrock team won the Hoosier Crossroads Conference - arguably the toughest baseball conference in Indiana and were 21-9 overall.

"Expectations are high as always for this year's club to continue the success and tradition of Westfield baseball has built over the last decade," said 'Rocks coach Ryan Bunnell. The coach said his team "will feature some familiar faces but many new ones," as nine seniors graduated from Westfield's 2015 team. The familiar faces are good ones.

That includes three seniors that are Division I signees. Outfielder Milo Beam has

committed to Purdue, and he returns a .314 average, including six doubles, 25 runs and eight RBIs. Two other seniors have signed with Butler: Harrison Freed, who smacked three home runs and batted in 22 runs last season on a .312 average, and Ryan Pepiot, who had tshe highest average of the three at .333. Pepiot had 18 RBIs and scored 16 runs.

Pepiot also saw significant mound time last year, pitching 35.1 innings. He struck out 41 last year, with a 3.17 earned-run average. Other pitchers returning are senior Max McCool and junior Brian Skelton.

Beam will be the lead-off man, and is projected to be Westfield's center fielder. Freed will play left field, while Skelton is slated for regular first base duties. Pepiot will be the shortstop when not on the mound, and junior Jackson Garrett is the projected catcher. Max McCool will play right field.

Senior Logan Schneider, the third baseman, will be in the eighth spot. The seventh and ninth spots are likely to be filled by

newcomers, such a senior Luke Speek and Freshman: Kyle Pepiot. sophomores Matthew Meyer and Cam Nance. Meyer will be in the pitching rotation with Pepiot, Skelton and McCool. Kyle Pepiot, a freshman, will see relief time.

"For the Rocks to reach the expectations of winning their fifth HCC championship in the last eight years and a state title, players will have to handle pressure well, new players will have to step into their roles and perform well, veterans will have to provide great leadership and, most importantly, everyone will have to persevere through adversity and pull on the same end of the rope," said Bunnell.
