County Republican party infighting still going on

Political warfare within Hamilton County's dominant Republican Party apparently has not ended with a contest earlier this month for the county chairmanship. Pete Peterson, Fishers, who served as chairman for a few weeks was ousted from the position by the Republican State Committee which found his January election to be flawed.

Laura Campbell, Carmel, was declared the winner. Now she faces a potential boycott by some of the April 13 Lincoln Day Dinner, the party's largest annual event.

Although supposedly not organized, there are those who are urging big financial supporters to not attend the event. Sour grapes? Perhaps, and not a good situation when Gov. Mike Pence is the scheduled speaker.

Those generally attending the Lincoln dinners are both party faithful and the engineering and construction firms and legal firms that do work for local government. Some of these firms have been encouraged or otherwise decided to stay away this year, not to embarrass the governor but more because of the chairmanship fight.

One longtime officeholder says the party infighting is the worst he's seen in his years in politics, and it appears to remain troublesome at least in the near future.

At the same time there are other internal party fights shaping up in advance of the May 3 primary election. Some office-

holders are seeking to defeat incumbent county council members Rick McKinney and Brad Beaver because they voted last year against funding a Public Safety Training Center.

And some other party kingpins are reported opposing the re-election of State Sen. Luke Kenley because of his efforts to put controls on Indiana's Redevelopment Commissions. This despite the fact that Kenley is one of the most influential members of the legislature as chairman of Senate Finance.

Money spent on these primary contests or funds not donated to the party by major firms could hamper the GOP campaign in November.

In probably any locale except Hamilton County this internal discord would give Democrats cause for optimism. But, the lack of any local candidates and the nearly

invisible party organization likely means Democrats can make little of the GOP troubles.

Former State Rep. Richard Dellinger years ago said it best. He noted that folks who think the county does not have a two-party system are wrong because "we really have two parties, the Republicans who are in, and the Republicans who are out."

What could happen as a result of the recent turmoil, is that there could be a less than record turnout of Republican votes in November when the statewide party needs a big plurality from the county.

So, after the Lincoln Day celebration and the primary election, one would think it wise for the various factions to bury the hatchet if they want a county that can get credit for producing winners at all levels.

Jackson Fire Territory might not dissolve

An unexpected announcement made by the town of Atlanta on Monday revealed the Jackson Fire Territory might not dissolve effective July 1 as announced in February by the Jackson Township Board.

Atlanta officials told the Reporter, Hamilton County Commissioners issued a quit-claim deed of three county roadways to the town of Atlanta which now makes Arcadia and Atlanta contiguous for purposes of satisfying the requirements for a fire territory.

In February the Jackson Township Board voted unanimously to pullout of the Jackson Fire Territory. The board cited financial concerns as their reason to withdraw.

Because Jackson Township was the providing unit their withdraw would have effectively dissolved the territory, ending fire and paramedic services in the towns of Arcadia and Atlanta on July 1st.

Atlanta and Arcadia would not have been able to operate the territory because the two communities were not contiguous. That changed when the commissioners issued a quit-claim deed of Arcadia Road from 269th Street north until it intersects with 279th Street, then 279th Street running west until it intersects with Whitestown Road, and then Whitestown Road run-

The Noblesville Common Council has approved the designation of Noble Industries as an economic revitalization area. The business plans to expand its production, warehouse and office spaces.

Family business will expand...

Noble Industries designated as economic revitalization area

The Noblesville Common Council has approved the confirmatory resolution designating an economic revitalization area for Noble Industries, Inc., 3333 E. Conner St., Noblesville. Noble Industries, a family business founded by William and Anita Parker in 1968 and incorporated in 1970, started in a barn with less than 300 square feet and has since grown to a 70,000-square-foot facility with all growth occurring in Noblesville. Noble Industries has purchased the five acres to the south of its current building and plan to expand an additional 52,400 square feet. The business plans to expand production and warehouse space by 39,000 square feet and office space by 13,400 square feet. Noble Industries approximate new size with the expansion is 122,000 square feet. Total capital investment for this project will be \$6.1 million – \$3.5 million in real property and \$2.6 million in personal property, which includes laser upgrades as well as a separate IT room for robot use. Noble Industries is poised to become one of Noblesville’s largest manufacturing employers with the addition of up to 50 new jobs in Noblesville. As part of the resolution, the common council has approved the location as an economic revitalization area eligible for a 10-year declining real property tax phase-in and a four-year declining tax phase-in for its personal property investment.

Working side by side with her the last few years has been wonderful and extremely helpful as I take on this role," Hilton said.

More cost effective bank option for Carmel

Carmel Clerk Treasurer, Christine Pauley, has initiated the source selection process of reviewing quotes from 11 financial institutions and will select a financial institution partner to handle municipal banking for the City of Carmel. "I take my role as a steward of the tax payers’ dollars very seriously and wanted to find the most cost effective banking option available while maintaining the high standards of customer service to the citizens of Carmel. I made a campaign promise to be more open and transparent with our public financial information in addition to allow all banks to have a place at the negotiating table and this was one step in that journey. “Our decision to allow for full and open competition of the City’s financial services needs have produced proposals from both small local banks to large regional banking institutions which will provide significant savings while offering additional services to Carmel’s City Government banking needs,” said Clerk Treasurer Pauley. All proposals were evaluated based upon the City’s requirements outlined in its Request for Proposal which included pricing, added services offered, scheduling requirements, technology to name just a few of the evaluation factors. “The city is currently holding discussions with the top three financial institutions which provided the most competitive proposals most advantageous to the citizens of Carmel” added Pauley. Pauley anticipates an announcement by April 7, 2016.

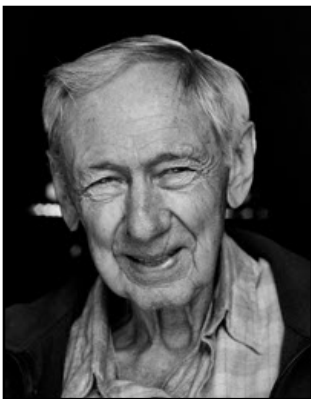

Richard Donald Taylor, 88, of Westfield, Indiana, died on Friday, March 25, 2016 at his home.



Richard (Dick) was born near New Richmond. He attended school in New Richmond and graduated from Crawfordsville High School in 1946. “Slim” was a member of the 1945-46 basketball team that went to the semi-finals in the Indiana high school basketball tournament.

Richard served his country as a member of the United States Army with the Occupation Forces in Japan where he chauffeured for the staff of General Douglas MacArthur. He earned his Bachelor’s degree from Purdue University in 1952. Dick began his harness racing career with his father Don at their training headquarters at the Indiana State Fairgrounds. He traveled county fair circuits throughout the Midwest and shipped to pari-mutuel racetracks on both

coasts. He developed champions including Dauntless Ann, Matann, Majestic Cliff, Allot, Will Sikes, Gold, Isaac C, Home Court, and Spinning Ranger. He summed up his nine decades of experience by saying: “I want to know more about a horse tomorrow than I do today.”

Dick served as president and director of the Indiana Trotting & Pacing Horse Association, was a member of the Indiana Standardbred Board of Regulations, and assistant to the director of Harness Racing at the Indiana State Fair in the early 1970s, as well as working tirelessly in the fight to legalize pari-mutuel wagering in Indiana. He also received the Sagamore of the Wabash from former Governor Robert Orr. In 2014, he was inducted into the Indiana Standardbred Hall of Fame.

He is survived by three children, Jo Barbara Taylor (George Greason), Robert Taylor (Tammera), and Tara Ellen Taylor; sister, Sue Ann Smith; four grandchildren, Vic Blue, Zach Blue, Carolyn Kelley, and Nathan Taylor; and three great grandchildren. In addition to his parents, Donald and Mabel Taylor, and brother, James, he was preceded in death by his wife, Margot Marlatt Taylor.

His life will be celebrated on April 10, 2016, at Parlay Farm, 16565 Carey Road, Westfield, Indiana, from 4 to 7pm.

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Early season track slugfests

You never can tell from results of a meet held before spring break just how tough the track and field teams will be, but the battles between Southeastern and Carmel boys and girls earlier this week will suggest this. All four of those teams likely will be powerhouses this spring.

Carmel and HSE, of course, play in different conferences, Carmel in the MIC and Southeastern in the Hoosier Crossroads. Expect Carmel's and Southeastern's girls and boys to challenge for conference championships. Then, at the end of the season, they'll battle in the post-season, all the way to the State Finals.

These meets were dual meets, so in the larger meets this season some of the depth shown (the third places, for example) will be erased by other schools.

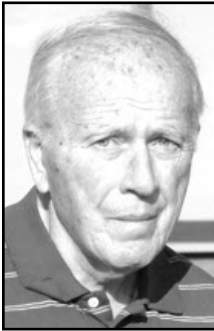
Southeastern's boys demonstrated their strengths in the jumps, hurdles and distance events, where the Royals scored 45 of their 65 points in a 65-62 victory.

The highlight of the meet for Southeastern was a 1-2-3 finish in the 1600, led by sophomore standout Ben Waggoner. The Royals also went 1-2 in the long jump, with senior Greg Miller leading the way, and 1-2 in the hurdles, with sophomore Madison Norris leading the way.

Ian Leatherman also gave the Royals a victory in the 3200 and Aaron Matio, the football star, was first in both the 100 and 200. Brayden Watson of Southeastern won the 800 and Carmel's Jalen Walker, the football standout, won the 300 hurdles.

The Greyhounds gained a 3-2 edge in the field events, led by double victories from Zack Alberts in the shot and discus. Carmel's Ryan Lipe, one of the best if not the best in the state, won the pole vault. Miller got HSE a win in the long jump and teammate Kenneth Hornbuckle won the high jump.

The senior O’Reilly contributed greatly to the Millers’ to success over the years, and did it again this season by helping them to a 23-5 record. O’Reilly averaged 16.9 points and 8.8 rebounds per game, and moved past the 1000 point mark for her career. O’Reilly will play for Florida Atlantic University this fall with her teammate Alexis Shannon as part of the No. 1 recruiting class of 2016 according to Blue Star Basketball.

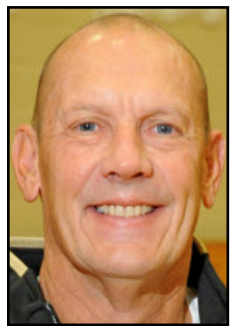

Twelve recognized as IBCA basketball Coaches of the Year

Twelve Indiana high school basketball coaches -- six boys' coaches and six girls' coaches -- have been chosen as Bob King Coaches of the Year by their peers in the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association, it was announced Monday (March 28).

T.J. Lux of Merrillville, Doug Ogle of Warsaw, Jimmie Howell of Lapel, David McCollough of Shenandoah, Matt Britton of Bloomfield and Jim Shannon of New Albany have been selected as boys' honorees through voting that occurred from late January through late February, IBCA executive director Steve Witty said.

Similarly, Chris Kindig of Tippecanoe Valley, Tony Stesiak of Rochester, Doug Laker of Greenfield-Central, Andy Maguire of Zionsville, Scott Smith of Jac-Cen-Del and Missy Voyles of North Harrison were recognized as top girls' coaches through voting in the same time span, Witty added.

Honors are awarded according to IH-SAA district boundaries, and two coaches from each district are recipients -- Lux and Ogle for the boys plus Kindig and Stesiak for the girls in District 1; Howell and McCollough for the boys as well as Laker and Maguire for the girls in District 2; and Britton and Shannon for

the boys plus Smith and Voyles for the girls in District 3.

Here is information about the six boys' Coach of the Year honorees.

McCollough guided Shenandoah to a 21-3 record that included a Henry County Tournament championship and the best start in school history in his first season with the Raiders. In 32 seasons as a head coach, McCollough's teams have compiled a 486-236 record, including 10 conference titles, eight sectional crowns and one regional title. He previously coached at North Judson for 11 seasons and Noblesville for 20 seasons.

Lux guided Merrillville to a 22-2 record, including the Duneland Conference championship. Lux, a 1995 Merrillville graduate and a 2000 Northern Illinois graduate, has an 82-38 record in five seasons with the Pirates. His tenure has included two sectional titles, one regional crown and two conference championships.

Ogle directed Warsaw to a 25-2 season, including sectional, regional and Northern Lakes Conference championships. In 14 seasons with the Tigers, Ogle's teams are 218-101 with five NLC titles, five sectional crowns, two regional titles and one semistate crown. He is a graduate of Clinton Central High School and Purdue University.

Howell led Lapel to a 26-4 campaign that included the Class 2A state championship. Howell has a 565-254 record in 35 seasons as a boys' basketball head coach, including a 203-88 mark in 12 years at Lapel. A 1972 Lapel graduate

and a 1977 graduate of Charleston Southern (S.C.) University, Howell has guided teams to 11 sectional titles, four regional titles, two semistate titles and two state titles. He previously coached at Mt. Vernon (Fortville), Muncie South and Brownsburg.

Britton directed Bloomfield to a 26-4 mark that included a Class A state runner-up finish. A 1996 Bloomfield graduate, Britton is 74-47 in five seasons at his alma mater. His 10-year record as a head coach is 156-95, including one season at West Washington, three seasons at Effingham (Ill.) St. Anthony and one season at South Spencer. Britton played college basketball at the University of Indianapolis and Eastern Illinois University.

Shannon led New Albany to a 27-1 record, including the Class 4A state championship. In 18 seasons with the Bulldogs, Shannon's teams are 331-97 with 10 sectional titles, two regional titles, one semistate title and one state title. In 32 seasons as a head coach, his teams are 496-236 with 13 sectional crowns, two regional crowns, one semistate crown and one state crown. Shannon is a 1978 graduate of Anderson High School and a 1982 graduate of Ball State.

Here is information about the girls' Coach of the Year recipients.

Kindig guided Tippecanoe Valley to a 25-2 season, including a Class 3A sectional championship. He has a 90-45 record in six seasons with the Vikings. He is a 1980 graduate of Tippecanoe Valley and a 1984 graduate of Purdue.

Stesiak directed Rochester to a 24-2 campaign, including a Class 2A sectional crown. He has guided the Zebras to a 249-120 mark in 16 seasons, including the 2004 Class 2A state championship. He is a 1991 graduate of LaPorte and a 1995 graduate of Ball State.

Laker led Greenfield-Central to a 23-5 campaign and a Class 4A sectional title. He has a 112-66 record in six seasons with the Cougars and was a Junior All-Star assistant coach in 2015. He is a 1987 graduate of Rushville and has college degrees from Indiana University, Ball State University and Indiana Wesleyan University.

Maguire directed Zionsville to a 20-4 season and a Class 4A sectional title. He has a 118-151 record in 13 seasons with the Eagles and a career mark of 192-181 in 18 seasons. That includes a 74-30 mark in five years at Western Boone. Maguire is a 1982 graduate of South Vermillion and a 1987 graduate of Purdue.

Smith guided Jac-Cen-Del to a 27-1 season that included the Class A state championship. In 15 seasons with the Lady Eagles, his teams are 258-102 and have won 12 sectionals, four regionals, one semistate and one state title. He is a graduate of Jac-Cen-Del and Northern Kentucky University.

Voyles led North Harrison to a 28-3 record, including a Class 3A state runner-up finish. She has coached the Lady Cats for 13 years over two stints, compiling a 205-101 mark in tenures spanning 1997-2005 and 2011-present. She is a graduate of North Harrison and Indiana University-Southeast.

All 12 coaches will receive plaques as a 2015-16 IBCA District Coach of the Year at the 2016 IBCA Clinic on April 22-23 at Lawrence North High School in Indianapolis.

The Coach of the Year award is named for the late Bob King, the IBCA executive director from 1984-94. King was a Lebanon native who coached at Sacred Heart and Shortridge high schools in Indianapolis before serving as an assistant basketball coach at Purdue and later an assistant and associate athletic director at Purdue.

Four state champions headline IBCA Players of the Week

New Albany sophomore Romeo Langford, Marion senior Reggie Jones, Lapel junior JonRoss Richardson and Liberty Christian senior Franklin Nunn led their teams to IHSAA state championships, and they headline the winners in the IBCA/Subway Player of the Week program for the week of March 21-26.

The quartet is joined by Griffith senior Tremell Murphy as honorees in the recognition program coordinated by the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association.

Murphy received accolades for District 1. Jones, Richardson and Nunn shared hon-

ors for District 2. Langford received the award for District 3.

Langford scored 28 points with five rebounds and three assists in propelling New Albany (27-1) to a 62-59 victory over McCutcheon for the Class 4A championship. The 6-4 sophomore standout sank 11-of-21 shots, 1-of-8 3-pointers and 5-of-8 free throws en route to his game-high scoring output as the Bulldogs won the school's second boys' state title and first since 1973.

The 6-5 Jones produced 25 points, eight rebounds and four assists in leading Marion (23-7) to a 73-68 triumph over Evansville Bosse for the Class 3A crown. He converted 7-of-18 field goals, 1-of-2 free throws and 10-of-10 free throws as the Giants captured the school's eighth state championship in boys' basketball. Jones also had 12 points in Marion's 60-58 semistate victory over Griffith.

Richardson tallied 21 points with 12 rebounds, three assists and four blocked shots as Lapel (26-4) knocked off Indianapolis Howe 59-37 for the Class 2A title. The 6-6 guard was 8-of-13 from the floor and 5-of-5 from the free throw line as the Bulldogs claimed the school's second boys' basketball state championship.

The 6-3 Nunn scored 19 points with eight rebounds and four steals to spark Liberty Christian (26-4) to a 64-45 decision over Bloomfield for the Class A championship. Nunn made 6-of-10 field goals, 1-of-2 3-pointers and 6-of-7 free throws as the Lions won the school's first state championship in any sport.

Murphy, a 6-5 forward, was honored after he tallied 20 points with eight rebounds for Griffith (25-4) in a Class 3A semistate setback to Marion that was delayed four days after a bus crash prevented the game from being played as scheduled on March 19.

This is the eighth season for the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association Player of the Week program and the fourth season it is presented by Subway Restaurants of Indiana, a banner partner of the IBCA. Subway, in its sixth season as an IBCA partner, encourages athletes to "train hard and eat fresh."

This is the final week of award winners for the 2015-16 season.

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
