Of course, there is Forest Park in Noblesville offering swimming and diving, golf, playgrounds and the longtime favorite Forest Park Inn overlooking the city. And, another city facility at Carmel, named Central Park, includes the Monon Center with a huge indoor workout center and Further north just off State Road 37 is the largest gymnasium along with banquet rooms and indoor and sador House in Heritage Gardens Park which belongs to the outdoor swimming pools.

It would be hard to find a greater range of public park opportunities. Admission to all the parks is free for hiking, picnicking and use of the playgrounds. There are rental fees for the various indoor facilities.

For those who like history, Hamilton County has it, but backyard? Of course most folks at least know where Conner Prairie is located. It does not have free admission, but its worth the fee if you have never visited there. The centerpiece is the William Conner home, a 193-year old federal style brick house overlooking the prairie for which the historic farm is named.

It was in a log cabin on the Conner Prairie grounds that state officials met in 1820 to consider a site for a new state capital which would becoming Indianapolis. Also on the property is the Chinese House, a summer retreat for Eli Lilly where he housed his collection of Chinese artwork, but special arrangements must be made for visiting it.

Noblesville Police searching for CVS robbery suspect

The Noblesville Police Department is looking for a man who allegedly robbed the CVS near 146th Street and Hazel Dell Road on Friday morning.

officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to a report of a robbery at the CVS Pharmacy located at 14835 Sunny Dell Lane. Officers arrived on the scene a short time later and began to investigate.

Upon arriving on the scene, officers quickly established a perimeter around the area. NPD officers were assisted by police officers from the Westfield Police Department and Indiana State Police. A K-9 unit from the Carmel Police Department also assisted with a search of the area but the suspect(s) was not located.

Initial information from the caller alleges that a subject came into the store and presented a note to employees in the pharmacy. As a result, employees provided the suspect with items from the pharmacy and the suspect then reportedly fled the scene. Witnesses identified ing a grey hoodie, baggy jeans and sun-





Time to mark hard choices about diet and exercise

habits in our country, I believe our American ancestors would be astonished to see that many Americans today must make some hard choices in their dietary and exercise habits in order to achieve a healthy life. After all, for the most part our ancestors did not have the ability to pretty much eat constantly by virtue of snacking and ready-toeat dining options at their fingertips. The typical 1776 diet of the

colonists consisted of wild game, soups/stews, cabbage/root vegetables and breads1 while the typical diet of early-mid 19th century was made up mostly of salted cured meats, butter/milk, and homegrown vegetables² and the early-to-mid 20th century diet was more varied with fruit and vegetables but mostly consisted of meat and

potatoes, dairy products, and the introduction of convenience foods.3 The typical diet of the USA population from the mid-50's until today introduced soft drinks both regular and diet, chips and salty snacks, processed meats, and a myriad of pastries and sweets. Growing up in the 50's and 60's, I seldom recall eating between meals, and snacks were limited to special \Looking back over 240 years (this July 4th!) of eating occasions. "Fast" food and the accompanying increase of preservatives, antibiotics, and hormones in our foods has increased maladies from heart disease, cancer, diabetes, to an epidemic of obesity.

> I used the quote above this week to emphasize that for many it is quite difficult to sacrifice the salt, sugar, preservative-laden foods that are at our fingertips any time of day or night. Adding to this epidemic of obesity is the cable industry, offering hundreds of cable TV stations to choose from as we click the remote and video games that do not require movement from the sofa. The combination of our dietary habits and "couch potato" fitness regimen are causing us to lose focus on living a long and healthy life. Remember, too, that our American ancestors were in constant movement if they were able; "sitting" was not part of their daily regimen. Their activity levels used what they consumed. For the most part, their shorter life spans were due to maladies not yet curable and preventable by antibiotics and inoculations against disease.

While no one has a guarantee on longevity, don't we owe it to ourselves and our loved ones to have a life that is worth living? Today's world is full of anxiety, stress, and the ability to make poor choices – let's choose a future that can be better shaped by a healthy, dynamic eating plan and the resolve to stay strong, flexible, and energetic. My suggestion is begin slowly, omitting items from your eating plan and incorporating organic foods that actually make you healthier. This is a great time of year to begin a walking activity, add in that all-important stretching and some light weights and you will benefit from a much healthier life by making these changes.



Coach Scott Henson's Royals scored two runs in the fourth and added single runs in the fifth and seventh to post the victory.



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
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
