


A few years ago I was asked to tell "my story" during the worship serat church...my big church, with several thousand peoole listening.

Here is how that came about. In 2001, after

WINDY SATURDAY

The wayward wind was creating havoc all across Indiana Saturday, and Hamilton County had its fair share of breeze-related headaches. Pictured here is the intersection of State Road 32 and Hazel Dell Road/Little Chicago Road, where the traffic signals on all sides were being blown about by the strong winds that prompted a Wind Advisory for most of Indiana all day.

More serious damage took place in the southern part of the county, with roof materials observed peeled back on the roof of Saint Elizabeth Seton Church at 106th Street and Haverstick Road in Carmel. A large tree fell down on Hague Road between 106th and 116th streets in Fishers, blocking both lanes. In the northern part of the county, a mature pine tree was reported down on Quarter Path Road near the Cicero Fire Department. Later that evening, a trained spotter reported large tree limbs blown down near 226th Street and U.S. 31. Wooded areas such as Anthony Road in Westfield and Leonard Road near Atlanta also had scattered tree limbs on the roadway as well.

Give your investment portfolio a "spring cleaning"

Now that spring has officially sprung, might look around your home and decide it's time for some sprucing up. But you don't have to confine your efforts to your house and yard – you can also engage in a little "spring cleaning" in your invest-



Hamilton Southeastern on Saturday at home completed a three-game sweep of Hoosier Crossroads Conference foe Avon by defeating the Orioles 11-0 and then 8-7 in a nightcap thriller.

In the opener, Southeastern led 4-0 when blowing the contest wide-open with seven runs in the fourth.

Carter Lohman got the pitching victory for Coach Scott Henson's Royals, going four innings and allowing just four hits. Sam Bachman mopped up in relief.

Southeastern unloaded eight hits, including a home run by Matt Gorski and doubles by Gorski and Cole Jacobs.



In the third game of the trip, a contest against Collierville, Fishers won its fourth straight battle with a 3-1 decision. The Tigers did it behind a dominating pitching performance from sophomore Luke Albright.

After scoring a run in the top of the first, Coach Matt Cherry's Tigers spotted Siegel seven run in the bottom of the inning.



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Pacers rally to beat 76ers

Desperate for a win, the Indiana Pacers got what they needed after knocking off the Philadelphia 76ers, 115-102. It certainly wasn't easy though, as the Pacers coughed up an 18-point lead in the third quarter and had to rally in the fourth for

The home team jumped out to a 14-6 lead behind the play of center Carl Landry. The Purdue product was red-hot, scoring 12 in the early going, including two 3-pointers.

The Pacers would respond though, led by George. PG scored nine in the opening quarter and Indiana finished the period with a 5-0 spurt to tie things at 28 heading into the second.

In the second period, the second unit dominated play and opened the game up for the Pacers. The Blue & Gold outscored the 76ers 21-7 to begin the quarter and, at the 5:53 mark, Indiana led 49-35.

From there, the teams essentially traded buckets, and the visitors took a doubledigit lead into the locker room.

The Pacers' 12-point halftime lead grew to 18 in the early stages of the third quarter, but Philly didn't go down without a fight. The 76ers responded with a quick 8-0 run and with 6:24 left in the third, Indiana led 71-61.

After a Pacers timeout, the 76ers' onslaught continued and they eventually took the lead with under two minutes to play in the third. In total, it was a 24-3 run by the home team, capped off by a Nik Stauskas dunk over Myles Turner. At the end of the period, the Pacers trailed, 77-74.

The final quarter was a back-and-forth affair for most of the period, but C.J. Miles provided the spark Indiana needed. Down three, Miles tied the game with his fourth 3-pointer. A few possession later, Miles' fifth triple gave Indiana a 101-98 lead.

On Indiana's next offense possession, George Hill converted a three-point play to open up a six-point advantage with 3:17 remaining. This time, Indiana wouldn't relinquish its lead. Paul George drained a pair of 3-pointers to close the door on Philadelphia's comeback hopes.

Miles was huge for Indiana, finishing with 25 points on 9-of-14 shooting. His second unit running mate Rodney Stuckey added 17 points and George had another nice game, contributing 20 points, eight rebounds and six assists.

For Philadelphia, Isaiah Canaan led the way with 24 points. Jeremi Grant added 20 and Landry finished with 19. The 76ers made 16 of their 36 attempts from beyond the arc.


