Candidate to make county visit before primary...

Trump headquarters opens in Carmel today

Presidential candidate Donald Trump will make a stop in Hamilton County before the May 3 primary election, according to campaign workers at Trump's new headquarters in Carmel.

The campaign office at 116th and Range Line Road will have an official opening today (Wednesday) at 4 p.m. and continuing until 6:00. Trump's visit there will be at a yet to be announced date.

Rex Early, chairman for Trump's Indiana campaign, revealed that the central Indiana headquarters will be located in The Corner shopping plaza at the southwest corner of 116th and Range Line. Other field offices will be opening in Fort Wayne and Evansville areas, he said.

At these campaign centers volunteers may sign up to assist the candidate and pick up various materials including yard signs and bumper stickers.

Noblesville looking for Adopt-A-Street sponsors

F.C. Tucker's Carmel office will move to new Midtown development

The F.C. Tucker Company's Carmel office will be making a move to Midtown.

The company announced on Tuesday that it will move from its current location at 1119 Keystone Way to the emerging Midtown development near 3rd Street SW and 1st Avenue SW in Carmel's Arts & Design District. The space will feature many conveniences and amenities today's real estate professionals need, including collaborative space, educational training space and onsite closing rooms. The new lobby will also feature a direct link to the Monon Trail.

company, has chosen Midtown as their new home base for the city,” said Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard. “Through F.C. Tucker, we grow as a community, and their new location is sure to become a beacon for those wanting to call Carmel home.”

Public Safety Telecommunications Week

Public Safety Telecommunications Week originated in California in 1981 and was nationally recognized by an act of the United States Congress in 1991. In Indiana, Public Safety Telecommunications Week has been recognized state wide since 1999, most commonly by a proclamation from Indiana's Governor. Public Safety Telecommunications Week reminds all Hoosiers that the first step in receiving help is the initial call to 911 and hearing the voice of a local city, county, or state public safety dispatcher. These are the men and women that collect the initial information to pass along to law enforcement officers in the field. Often times they are able to give immediate lifesaving directions to the caller during medical emergencies or can be the calming voice to reassure the victim of a violent crime that help is on the way. And the service of a telecommunications operator extends well beyond taking calls from citizens as they are the life line to the police officer, deputy sheriff or state trooper out on patrol. In short, the telecommunications operator is the two-way life line link taking calls for service. Whether the call comes by phone from the public, or over a radio from a law enforcement professional, telecommunication operators are one of the most important and under-recognized components of public safety.


