At Hamilton County Lincoln Day Dinner...

Gov. Pence touts successes

Gov. Mike Pence, touting the successes of his administration over the past three and a half years, spoke to a Hamilton County Lincoln Day Dinner crowd of 375 last night at the Ritz Charles banquet center. The local Republican Party was glad to get the governor as principal speaker, and Pence was glad to be invited to the county where his re-election may be determined.
Hamilton County with about 200,000 potential voters, has become a major factor in statewide elections. With Pence under fire for his position on gay and transgender legislation, he may need every vote he can get in the county. Half his winning margin four years ago came locally.
In his remarks Pence claimed "historic increases in spending for education and an increase in high school graduation rates." He said infrastructure investment of \$4.9

billion "without an increase in taxes and creation of the most innovative Medicaid alternative in the nation called HIP 2.0."
In the area of public safety, the governor said the administration is putting a focus on treatment and prevention of drug abuse while working to increase penalties for drug dealers.
He said the state has maintained a balanced budget and has a surplus since Republicans took power in the Statehouse in 2004. Pence warned against a "return to deficits and debt" which the state experienced before Mitch Daniels took over as governor.
There was no outward sign for internal dissension at the well-attended dinner. A few weeks ago a fight for party leadership in the county resulted in the GOP State Committee stepping in to determine the outcome of a highly contested election for county chairman. Laura Campbell won

that disputed contest and replaced Pete Peterson who had served two months after initially winning election to the chairmanship.
The annual Lincoln Day ritual, held in most counties in the U.S., is designed to honor the nation's first Republican president. Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard gave a tribute to Abraham Lincoln to close the evening festivities.
The event brings candidates together with leading party officials and workers. It is also financially supported by major donors, many of whom conduct business with local governments. Candidates for GOP nomination in the upcoming primary worked the crowd and distributed their campaign materials. Major primary contests will be for State Senate, Judge of Superior Court 2, County Commissioner and County Council.

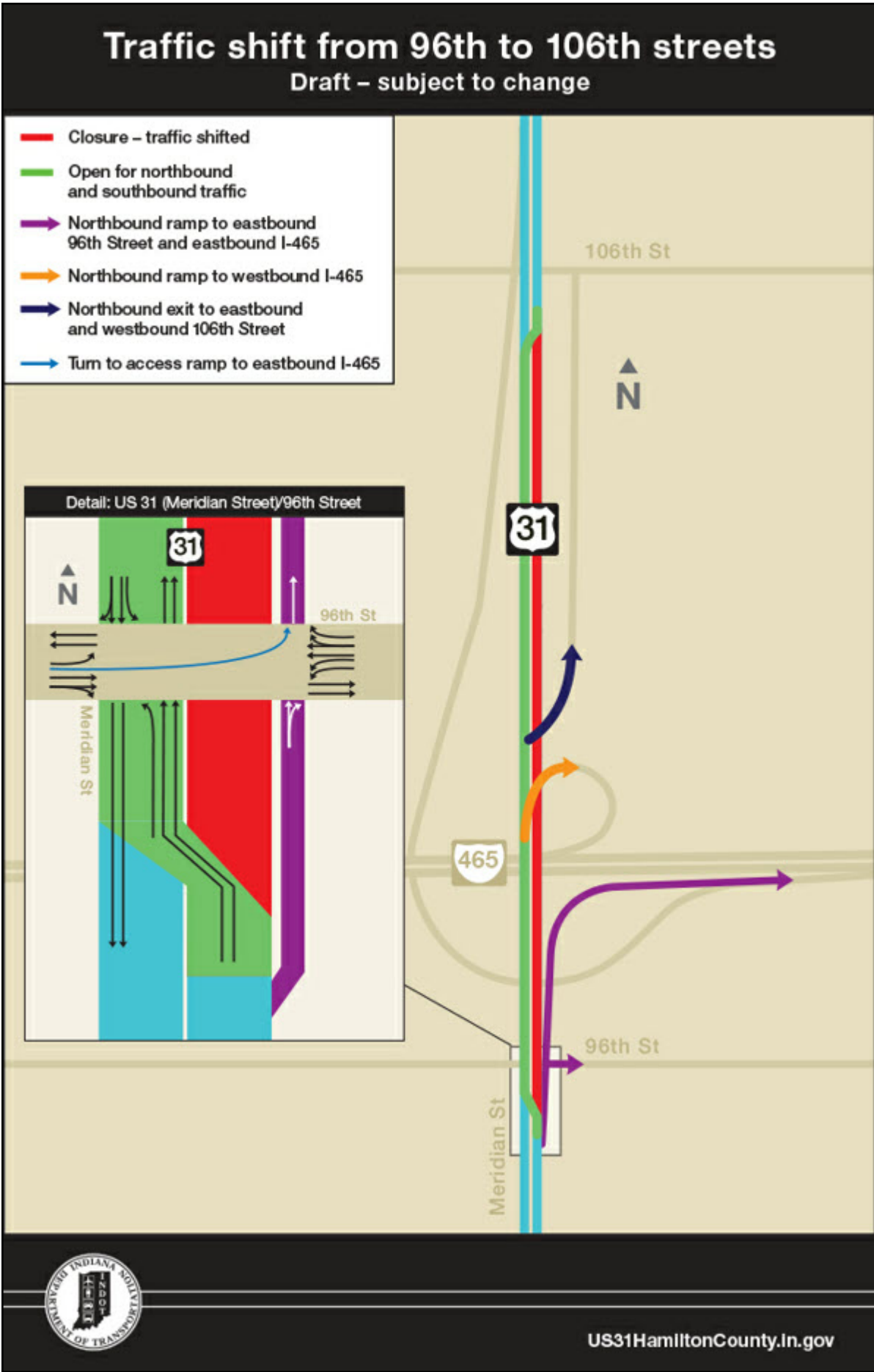

Public meeting scheduled for...

Major Moves
2020 I-69
expansion

Milestone Contractors and United Consulting with the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) will host a public meeting next week to present details about the upcoming Major Moves 2020 expansion of Interstate 69.

The meeting will take place from 6 to 7 p.m. Thursday, April 21 at the Hamilton Southeastern High School cafeteria, 13910 E. 126th St., Fishers. A formal presentation will begin at 6:30 p.m. Members of the project team will be available in an open-house format to answer questions from individuals interested in learning about the project and the anticipated construction schedule.

The design-build team will be presenting project details, anticipated construction schedules and maintenance of traffic plans for the Major Moves 2020 I-69 construction project between State Road 37 and State Road 38.

The \$92 million construction project will add a third travel lane to the median in each direction from State Road 37 (Exit 205) to north of State Road 38 (Exit 219) and add a southbound lane to the shoulder between 116th Street entrance ramp and the future 106th Street exit ramp, which is currently under construction.

In addition, the project will reconfigure the Campus Parkway interchange (Exit 210) into a double crossover diamond design to improve traffic flow, widen the Campus Parkway bridge over I-69, resurface the existing I-69 pavement, lower the State Road 13 (Exit 214) pavement under I-69, and rehabilitate the Brooks School Road and Madison County Road 650W bridges over I-69.

US 31 traffic shift begins between 96th and 106th streets

On Wednesday night, crews shifted all traffic on Meridian Street (US 31) between 96th and 106th streets to the west side of the roadway. For approximately two months, contractors will work to build new northbound travel lanes and paint the US 31/I-465 bridges.

Access will remain available to/from I-465. Two lanes will be maintained on northbound and southbound US 31 (Meridian Street). Access to 106th Street will remain available.

Community Health Network to lift temporary visitor restrictions

Community Health Network will lift temporary visitor restrictions Wednesday, April 13, at all its Indianapolis hospitals (Community Hospitals North, East, South, Westview and Community Heart and Vascular Hospital) due to decreased flu activity. The restrictions have been in place since March 11, upon the recommendation of the Marion County Public Health Department and the Indianapolis Coalition for Patient Safety.

Tier 1 of the coalition’s Patient Visitation Policy, the least restrictive, has been in place at Community and other local Indianapolis hospitals during the past few weeks. Visitation has been restricted for those with flu-like illness or cough and those under age 18. In addition, only immediate family, partner, significant other or spiritual counselor have been allowed to visit patients at Community.

During cold and flu season, all visitors to the hospitals are still encouraged to follow good hand washing techniques and cover their coughs. Visitors experiencing flu-like symptoms are encouraged to stay home until they have recovered from their illness.



Pacers beat Knicks, clinch seventh seed in playoffs

The Pacers (44-37) locked up the seventh seed in the upcoming Eastern Conference playoffs, beating the New York Knicks (32-50) in their final regular season game at Bankers Life Fieldhouse on Tuesday night, 102-90.
Indiana's first-round playoff matchup is now set, thanks to the Pacers' win and De-

troit's loss to Miami. As the seventh seed, the Pacers will face off against the second-seeded Toronto Raptors. It will be the first ever postseason meeting between Indiana and Toronto.
"We're going to have our hands tied with them," Pacers point guard George Hill said about the matchup. "They're a great team, they've got a lot of great players, and

they're well-coached. It's going to take a team effort (to beat them)."
The shorthanded Knicks actually led at halftime, but the Pacers seized control in the third quarter when Hill asserted himself offensively. The "hometown hero" scored 12 of Indiana's first 16 points after the break and triggered a 17-2 run that put the hosts in front for good.

"He was terrific, really terrific," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel said after the win. "He always welcomes whatever he's asked (to do). He's very, very versatile. We just want him to be aggressive and be a force."
All-Star forward Paul George agreed: "We've got to be like a bug in his ear, constantly just chipping away at him. Because he has so much talent and it's not being used (when he's not aggressive)."
The Knicks got within seven points in the fourth quarter but never managed to cut the deficit to two possessions as the Pacers hung on for the win, putting a bow on their 27th straight regular season with a winning record at home, the longest active streak in the NBA.

George and Hill each scored 19 points to lead Indiana to victory. Ian Mahinmi added 14 points and eight rebounds, while rookie forward Myles Turner added 13 points and five boards off the bench.
"We really wanted to share the ball," Mahinmi said. "We wanted to come out, wanted to play for each other, wanted to move the ball from one side to the other. We wanted to run on deflections and stuff like that. I think when we play aggressively like that and move the ball like that, we're a very hard team to beat."
Tuesday's game was the season finale for the lottery-bound Knicks and New York elected to hold out All-Star Carmelo Anthony and rookie phenom Kristaps Porzingis. But even without their two leading scorers, the Knicks got off to a scorching start.
The Knicks went 15-for-23 from the floor (65.2 percent) and made 4-of-5 shots from 3-point range in the first quarter, opening up a 36-29 lead. Former second overall pick Derrick Williams led the charge in the early going, scoring 12 points and going 5-for-5 from the field and 2-for-2 from three in the opening period.
The Pacers also got a surprising offensive spark from Mahinmi, who led the team with 12 points in the first quarter on 5-of-7 shooting.
The Blue & Gold did manage to climb within one on multiple occasions and closed the half with a 4-0 run in the final minute, but they would not retake the lead until after halftime.
Williams led all scorers with 21 points on the night. Knicks rookie guard Jerian Grant added 18 points, six rebounds, and six assists in the loss.
