“Tree of Hope” to planted at Simon Moon Park

The public is invited to attend a dedication ceremony for a ‘Tree of Hope’ this week-end in Westfield.

Hamilton County Tourism and Nick Svendsen, a local Boy Scout, will be planting honorary trees in 10 Hamilton County locations as part of the Indiana Bicentennial. The plantings are part of Svendsen’s project to become an Eagle Scout.

“This Tulip Poplar tree will serve as a living monument, and legacy, for future generations,” Svendsen said. “The tree represents our commitment to sustainability of forests, and hopes for the future of Indiana and our community. It is also the state tree of Indiana and should live 200 years.”

The Westfield tree dedication will occur at Simon Moon Park at 1 p.m. on Saturday, April 23.

**Grand Park to
host top 40
U17 hoops
programs**

This weekend, some of the best high school basketball players in the country will face off at Jonathan Byrd’s Fieldhouse at Grand Park. The NIKE Elite Youth Basketball League Session 2 Event April 22-24 will feature the top 40 under 17 travel basketball programs in the United States and draw high school athletes from up to 27 states, as well as more than 300 NCAA Division I coaches. This is the first year a city in Indiana has hosted a NIKE EYBL event.

“Since the thought of this Fieldhouse began, I wanted to bring a NIKE EYBL to Grand Park,” said Rod Sinn, President of Operations at Jonathan Byrd’s Fieldhouse. “This event is not only huge for Fieldhouse, but for the state of Indiana.”

Other 2016 NIKE EYBL event locations include Hampton, Virginia; Brooklyn, New York and Atlanta, Georgia. Notable alumni of NIKE EYBL include Kobe Bryant, LeBron James, Carmelo Anthony and Jahil Okafor. According to NIKE, 95 percent of alumni go on to play college basketball, 56 percent play in an NCAA championship game and 32 percent get drafted to the NBA.

The event is open to the public with an admission charge of \$5 Friday; and \$10 Saturday and Sunday. Spectator parking is located at Monon Trail Elementary School at 19400 Tomlinson Road. A complimentary and continuous shuttle service will be offered from Monon Trail Elementary to Jonathan Byrd’s Fieldhouse. Due to the high volume of attendance expected, attendees are encouraged to arrive early. Doors will open one hour before the event start. Carmel Police searching for robbery suspects

The Carmel Police Department are looking for two men who robbed a Village Pantry at the Hamilton-Marion county line late Sunday evening.

At 11:49 p.m. Sunday, two black male suspects were involved in an armed robbery at the Village Pantry located at 9601 College Ave. The first suspect was described as approximately 5’ 7” tall with an unknown weight wearing a black hooded (North Face) sweatshirt with red lettering. This suspect displayed a silver semi-automatic handgun. The second suspect was described as approximately 5’ 4” tall with an unknown weight wearing a black ski mask and dark clothing. Based on the surveillance video, it appears the second suspect is wearing black and white Nike Hyperchase shoes. Both suspects were wearing what appeared to be blue latex gloves.

The suspects were reported to be in their early 20s. Both suspects fled east bound from the Village Pantry with an undetermined amount of cash, cigarettes and cigars.

Noblesville Main Street Farmers Market expands with online option

Soon, Noblesville residents will have more ways to order from their favorite local farms and artisan vendors. Noblesville Main Street has entered into a partnership with FarmersMarket.com, an Indianapolis-based startup to put their vendors’ offerings online. The online farmers market experience allows customers to browse products on their computer or smartphone throughout the week, place an order from multiple vendors with one single checkout and pick up their pre-packed order at the Saturday market. Online ordering will continue even after the market season ends, providing a year-round market opportunity to vendors whose products are not season-constrained.

“I am excited for the opportunities this partnership will provide on several fronts,” said Chris Owens, executive director of Noblesville Main Street. “The expansion of the market to include a year-round co-op option provides a nice benefit to many of the vendors already at our market in addition to our residents who enjoy local produce and goods.”

Nick Carter launched FarmersMarket.com in January with a stated mission of “creating endless markets for local food.”According to a re-

New economic development collaborative...

Work! Hamilton County, IN to focus on workforce development

A new economic development collaborative that will aid Hamilton County’s business growth by working to understand and support the staffing needs of local employers and identify strategies for workforce development was announced today.

A survey released April 19 by the new Work! Hamilton County, IN initiative indicates 59 percent of Hamilton County’s employers plan to expand their workforce through 2019, and another 52 percent are challenged to fill existing vacancies. Already, more than half face shortages of candidates for entry-level and midlevel candidates.

The study was commissioned by the countywide group represented by chambers of commerce, economic development, leadership, community and tourism development professionals and conducted by the Hamilton County Business Intelligence Center. The Center is a collaboration between Hamilton County Economic Development and Hamilton County Tourism, Inc. and maintains and seeks data to support all areas of economic and community development. More than 135 employers completed the survey, representing almost 16,000 jobs in the county.

The initiative, announced April 19 at the All-County Economic Development Luncheon at the Ritz Charles in Carmel, Indiana, is the beginning of a multiphase effort. The luncheon is a partnership of Noblesville Chamber of Commerce, Northern Hamilton County Chamber of Commerce, OneZone Chamber of Commerce and Westfield Chamber of Commerce.

Study teams will examine all areas of workforce development and identify private-public partnerships to address companies workforce needs by the end of 2016 for implementation beginning in 2017.

Hern named as suspect in missing McKinney campaign sign investigation

A township trustee is a suspect in a case of missing campaign signs.

On Friday, the Hamilton County Sheriff’s Office opened an investigation into the theft of campaign signs owned by Hamilton County Councilman Rick McKinney. Councilman McKinney reported three campaign banners missing in the Fishers area, one at 116th Street and Olio Road, one at 116th Street and Cumberland Road, and one at 135th Street and State Road 37.

During the investigation of the campaign sign missing at Cumberland Road and 116th Street, Councilman McKinney discovered a cell phone that officers collected for evidence. Further investigation led Sheriff’s Office officials to the owner of the cell phone, an opponent in the Hamilton County Council election, Fall Creek Township Trustee Jeff Hern.

Trustee Hern was interviewed by Hamilton County detectives regarding the cell phone located at the site of Councilman McKinney’s missing campaign signs. During an interview, Hern informed investigators that his cell phone was missing.

Although Hern is listed as a suspect in the case, no formal charges have been filed at this time. The case has been referred to the Hamilton County Prosecutor’s Office for review. Any further information regarding the case will be issued by the Prosecutor’s Office and questions should be addressed to that office.

cent survey of Indiana consumers, over 44 percent of consumers have already begun ordering groceries online. But, many grocery stores lag behind in offering the service.

Niles M. Clark

March 31, 1959 - April 16, 2016

Niles M. Clark, 57, of Westfield, passed away on Saturday, April 16, 2016 at his home. He was born on March 31, 1959 to Ballard and Geraldine (Ballard) Clark in Noblesville, Indiana.



Niles proudly served his country in the United States Air Force, and worked as a finish carpenter for 20 years. He was a member of Noblesville First United Methodist Church, where he sang in the choir. Niles was a living historian with Lee's Lieutenants, and was a Civil War re-enactor who portrayed General George E. Pickett across several Midwest and Eastern states. He was also involved with local community theaters, including MSP of Westfield, Carmel Repertory, The Belfry, and Hendricks Civic Theatre (HCT). In the theater, Niles directed, built sets, and acted; he was best known as Scrooge in "Scrooge the Musical" at the Belfry, and Fagin in "Oliver" at HCT. He was well-respected, a good friend to many, and a loving father & "Grandpa Niles".



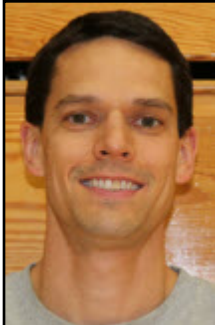
