Record early voting...

# Poll workers needed

If you hear that early voting for the May 3 primary is heavy, you heard correctly. Figures from Election Administrator Kathy Richardson show that as of Tuesday morning 1,283 voters had cast ballots at the County Government and Judicial Center. That compares with only 308 at the same time four years ago.

Any registered voter in Hamilton County is eligible to vote in advance of election day. For those who are confined at home or away at college or with the military, absentee ballots are available, but application must be made to the elections office. Nearly 2,200 applications have been received compared with only 913 four years ago.

Not only is great interest in the Republican and Democratic presidential primaries responsible for the record numbers, but early voting is becoming more popular as

citizens realize that they may avoid standing in line at polling places in major elections, Richardson says.

Hamilton County now has about 200,000 voters and 218 precincts. There is still a great need for election day poll workers. Each polling place needs five board members. Inspectors are now paid \$200 and clerks and judges are paid \$105 plus the workers get a \$20 food allowance..

Persons interested in working May 3 may call the elections office at 776-8476 to learn details and get signed up. It is a long day, polls are open 6 A.M. to 6 P.M. and poll workers are usually there an hour early and up to an hour after the polls close.


Hamilton County may play a big part in the state's election outcome, and Indiana could play an important role in determining the presidential nominees. Plus, there are important local races which are essentially decided in the Republican primary since no Democrats have filed for county office.

A full listing of candidates on the primary ballot is found on the Hamilton County website under current election information.

The county will apparently not get a visit from candidate Donald Trump as had earlier been thought. His central Indiana campaign office is in Carmel, but he scheduled a rally at the State Fairgrounds apparently instead of a visit to the local campaign center.

The election may also be putting some local government decisions on hold. Decisions on jail expansion, an addition to the Judicial Center, funding of a Public Safety Training Center and even a decision on what to do with the planned multi-million dollar state distribution of COIT trust fund monies will not be tackled until after the election since several council and commissioner candidates are busy campaigning.

Right lane of westbound 146th Street closed between Spring Mill, Ditch

The right lane of westbound 146th Street between Spring Mill and Ditch roads is now closed for construction, leaving the left lane open to traffic.

This lane closure is scheduled to last three to four weeks. Both eastbound lanes of 146th Street will remain open. There will be additional lane closures and moving of traffic over the next two to three months to complete the improvements to 146th Street which will expand the two-lane roadway to a divided four-lane roadway with a new roundabout intersection at Ditch Road.

Have Hope partnership

Community Health Network and WTHR-TV Channel 13 have joined forces to launch Have Hope, a two-year public service effort to raise awareness about suicide in Indiana and to help more Hoosiers get the help they need. The Have Hope effort complements Community’s HaveHope.com, an online suicide prevention resource for teenagers, parents and educators.

The partnership will kick off at WTHR’s upcoming Health and Fitness Expo, held April 23 and 24 at the Indiana State Fairgrounds. There, Community and WTHR will co-host a 400 square foot space dedicated to Have Hope. Visitors to the space will be able to learn more about the warning signs and risk factors associated with suicide through interactive displays connected to HaveHope.com, as well as through on-site discussions with members of Community’s behavioral health and primary care teams.

“Have Hope is about raising awareness of this devastating issue and urging our community to take action,” said WTHR President & General Manager Larry Delia. “We are committed to helping families in Indiana by using our television and digital platforms, and we are proud to partner with Community Health Network for this important work.”

Statewide, more Hoosiers die by suicide than homicide, and Indiana has the nation’s highest rate of high school students contemplating suicide. Suicide is the second leading cause of death for youth ages 15 to 24, and the third leading cause for youth ages 10 to 14.

“Suicide is one of our state’s most concerning health issues, and the heart-break it leaves behind is seen in our

schools, families and communities,” said Community President and CEO Bryan Mills. “This is an issue that requires help from all of us, and we are profoundly grateful for the partnership offered by WTHR to raise awareness about suicide and its causes. With the station’s extensive reach and genuine commitment to making a difference, together, we will help more Hoosiers embark on a pathway to healing, hope and renewed health.”

In 2014, Community, Central Indiana’s largest provider of behavioral health services, announced its commitment to becoming the first health care system in the country to fully implement the Zero Suicide model, developed by the National Action Alliance for Suicide Prevention and other partners. At the same time, the Indiana Division of Mental Health and Addiction and Community have partnered to spearhead the state’s suicide prevention movement to save young lives.

With an aspirational goal of achieving a zero percent suicide incident rate among patients in the next 10 years, Community’s Zero Suicide initiative aims to save Hoosier lives specifically through early intervention and prevention, the construction of a robust Central Indiana crisis network and the utilization of innovative mental health diagnostics and treatment protocols. The strategy brings crisis, telemedicine and intensive care coordination services to more than 600 primary care physicians, 10 emergency departments and 12 hospitals located throughout the state, representing both Community facilities and partner organizations where Community provides behavioral health services.

I-69 meeting tonight at HSE cafeteria

Milestone Contractors and United Consulting with the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) will host a public meeting this Thursday to present details about the upcoming Major Moves 2020 expansion of Interstate 69.

The meeting will be held from 6 to 7 p.m. tonight at the Hamilton Southeastern High School cafeteria, 13910 E. 126th St. A formal presentation will begin at 6:30 p.m. Members of the project team will be available in an open-house format to answer questions from individuals interested in learning about the project and the anticipated two-year construction schedule.

The design-build team will be presenting project details, anticipated construction schedules and maintenance of traffic plans for the Major Moves 2020 I-69 construction project between Fishers and Pendleton.

The \$92 million construction project will add a third travel lane to the median in each direction from State Road 37 (Exit 205) to north of State Road 38 (Exit 219) and add a southbound lane to the shoulder between 116th Street entrance ramp and the future 106th Street exit ramp, which is currently under construction.

In addition, the project will reconfigure the Campus Parkway interchange (Exit 210) into a double crossover diamond design to improve traffic flow, widen the Campus Parkway bridge over I-69, resurface the existing I-69 pavement, lower the State Road 13 (Exit 214) pavement under I-69, and rehabilitate the Brooks School Road and Madison County Road 650W bridges over I-69.

Grand Park to have largest attendance to date this weekend

This weekend, April 22-24 will be Grand Park’s largest attendance to date with 40,000 visitors expected for events at the park, including the Crossroads of America College Soccer Showcase (Girls), Bullpen Spring Shootout and Nike Elite Youth Basketball League Event (EYBL).

This is the second weekend of the Crossroads Soccer Showcase, which fea-

In addition to the tournament games, there will be two college soccer matches taking place this weekend. Friday, April 22 at 7 p.m. will feature Indiana University vs. Miami University of Ohio. # Carmel receives AA+ rating for 2016 bonds

Standard & Poor's has assigned a AA+ long term credit rating to the City of Carmel as part of a financial assessment in anticipation of bond sales to be held soon for a 2016 multi-purpose bond issue. The result of the positive rating will save millions of dollars in interest payments during the life of the bond.

According to S&P's rating criteria, the rating indicates Carmel has a very strong economy, strong budgetary flexibility, strong management supported by good financial policies and practices, a strong budgetary performance and very strong liquidity providing very strong cash levels to cover both debt service and expenditures, which S&P considers exceptional.

The AA+ rating is the second highest rating possible for S&P, which rates on a scale from AAA to BBB- on investment grade risk of issuers and issues worldwide. The AA+ rating indicates "very strong capacity to meet financial commitments" according to S&P. More information on that can be found at <https://www.standardandpoors.com>

The rating comes as the Carmel Bond Bank prepares for a bond sale which could take place next week to finance a long list of public improvement projects, including the 96th and Keystone interchange, new roundabouts and other infrastructure projects.

"After a very intense and detailed look at our financial situation, I was very pleased that this independent rating agency recognized Carmel for our strong fiscal health," said Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard. "We work very hard to monitor the city's financial health, working from a 10-year fiscal plan that is regularly updated and helps us be fiscally responsible when it comes to our redevelopment activity."

In its report, S&P noted the city's management as strong with good financial policies and practices. It also noted that Carmel reviews multi-year trends and consults with financial professionals, local businesses and government officials and that the city regularly updates its long-term fiscal plan.

S&P also affirmed a previous AA+ rating for the 2014 bond issue by the Carmel Redevelopment Authority.

"This is great news for the City of Carmel and our newly established Carmel Local Public Improvement Bond Bank. These ratings confirm that Carmel remains a solid investment and continues to be focused in the right direction," said Carmel Clerk-Treasurer and Carmel Bond Bank Executive Director Christine Pauley.

S&P's ratings are meant to provide a reflection of the fiscal climate of a sovereign government and are based on the willingness of an organization or government to pay its financial obligations to creditors. It is essentially a credit rating of the city.

Standard and Poor's Corporation is an independent, global company that provides corporate and municipal ratings for communities around the world. The bond markets rely upon their ratings, and Standard and Poor's uses measurable, unbiased criteria for the basis of the rating in the following categories: local economy, budgetary flexibility, financial management, budgetary performance, liquidity, and debt.

## HHEF Golf Outing set for June 7

## New Britton Elementary 3rd graders’ message: Pull to the Right

New Britton Elementary School 3rd grade students were tasked to do a project that was Project Based Learning. Four of these students decided to do a Public Service Announcement reminding adults to pull to the right when emergency equipment approaches.

Fishers Fire Department partnered with these students to help make the video, and their finished project is an important message for drivers.

As construction season takes off, road trips for vacations, and just the everyday grind of driving, often find drivers attention being challenged. Our phones, radios, passengers, other drivers, road conditions, stress, and consuming thoughts of life often break the all-important concentration of driving, and awareness of our surroundings.

As fire trucks and ambulances drive with lights and sirens to emergencies, fire and police are often faced with drivers that don't see us in their review mirrors or for some reason, don't hear our sirens and horns. When they become aware of us last minute, drivers panic and fail to pull to the right.

We see vehicles pull to the left, pull into the median, pull through intersections against a red light, and sometimes just slam on the brakes and stop where they are. Apparatus chauffeurs must use additional diligence when driving to assure the safety of our firefighters as well as other drivers.

Getting to the scene shouldn't be the most dangerous part of a building fire and these kids spotlight what drivers can do to keep everyone safe.

With over 32,000 firefighters in town for FDIC, it's a great time to remind drivers to protect themselves and their emergency responders by pulling to the right.


