

ing its readers of the history of Hamilton County.

In doing so, I'm sad about a couple of things. Back in those days, many of the stories didn't include bylines. So, I can't give credit where credit is deserved. Also, many, actually most, of the photos used in those stories have long been missing, or damaged, or aged belong reproduction.

I looked up the meaning "newspaper" in Most will come from my faithful 1989 edition of Webster's Dictionary. Actually, it's a copy which was used by my wife, Mattijane, when she was teaching school in Bloomington. Would you believe, no single definition of newspaper, but instead a lumping of newsboy, news dealer, news man, newspaper and news stand under one.

> "Information of public interest," wrote Webster. That's us. Daily.

I think there is only one definition we don't fit. Some people think of a newspaper as something to line the bird cage. That's

One of the Ledger's best sources of newspaper celebrated its 100th year. Interesting, at that time because The Ledger no longer was owned by the Neal family. It was sold to a publisher, LeRoy Stauffer, out of Pennsylvania.

"LeRoy was promising to "Carrying on the high standards" and he urged Ledger readers "to look toward a second century."

I liked LeRoy, I really did, but all of us working for The Ledger at that time simply laughed as those headlines. We all, along with all of Hamilton County, a few years later cried many tears.

The story I'm going to lead off with this Sunday was published with the Bicentennial special edition but actually was written a dozen years earlier when editor James T. Neal gathered a panel to "predict the future of Hamilton County."

Several prominent Hamilton County men were asked to look into the future.

Get that, men and no women even tough both Carmel and Noblesville...both, of course, Republicans.

The panel included Richard Dellinger, local politician and school teacher; Ledger photographer Ray Streib, artist Floyd Hopper, state representative Bud Hillis, longtime Noblesville doctor James Dillon, Methodist Church minister Summer Walters and the boss himself, James T.

Just to give you an idea of what is in store, here is a prediction made by Neal. "The city (Noblesville) will spread out rather than grow up. Housing areas will dot the entire township (Noblesville) with the growth of mini-shopping centers."

Not bad, Jim.

Dellinger predicted, "The taxpayer will demand accountability through performance.'

It's a great article, I believe, to lead off




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#### **HSE tennis falls** to Brownsburg


