Delawares have family ties with William Conner

As Indiana celebrates its Bicentennial this year we hear very little about Hamilton County 200 years ago. Officially the county did not exist in 1816. The 400 square miles that make up today's Hamilton County was a wilderness, but there was a native population, commonly referred to as the Delaware Indians.

Their CEO, known as Chief Anderson, and his people had lived in the area since the mid-1700s when they moved in from the East. And, today we know quite a bit about their life here 200 years ago thanks to one of Chief Anderson's descendants named Bill Pace. Bill is on the staff at Conner Prairie.

I talked with Bill this week asking about Mekinges (my spelling) who was William Conner's first wife, and daughter of Chief Anderson. I asked Bill about the circumstances surrounding the Delaware's removal to Missouri under terms of the Treaty of St. Mary's with the U.S. government.

Those familiar with the Conner story will recall that Mekinges and the six Conner children went with her tribe, leaving Conner who married again and had a second family at Conner Prairie.

Mekinges was not forced to leave, she could have stayed, Bill tells me. The departure was a mutual agreement between she and her husband. Loyalties and values were not always the same as today. Tribal loyalties were strong and the Delawares who stayed in Indiana knew they would soon find themselves in a white man's world.

Conner did not send Mekinges off empty handed. She got silver and several horses which were extremely valuable possessions in the early 1800s. She and her family also got the promise of annuities under terms of the treaty. So, in 1821 the vast majority of the local Delawares left central Indiana.

They had survived the War of 1812 probably by remaining loyal to the American cause while some branches of the tribe had sided with the British. Those who went with the British in some cases found themselves displaced and their villages burned.

Bill tells me Mekinges and her children later moved on to the Kansas Territory. She afterward went into business operating a trading post in northwest Arkansas. Some of her children did well, two sons became chiefs in the Delaware tribe, others eventually served as scouts for settlers going west on the Mormon and Oregon Trails. One son became a Texas Ranger.

Mekinges, a name Bill tells me should be spelled Meh-cunhis, meaning "youngest girl," left little written record behind. She is known to have lived from the 1780s into the

1860s, certainly a dramatic period in American history. She died near Lawrence, Kansas and is buried there.

As we know William Conner went on to at least local fame and fortune. Involved in land speculation and politics, he and second wife, Elizabeth Chapman, had several children. And, of course, Conner helped organize Hamilton County and founded Noblesville in 1823. He and Elizabeth moved to "his" city in 1837 and he died here in 1855.

Fortunately we have a living link to this uniquely American story in the person of Bill Pace who can tell the story like it happened yesterday. Folks interested in more information about the Conner families can contact him at Conner Prairie Pioneer Settlement during the summer season. He returns to his home in Oklahoma in the winter.

John Kasich to
visit Noblesville
Tuesday

Presidential candidate John Kasich will visit Noblesville on Tuesday. It will be the first visit to Noblesville by a presidential candidate since Barack Obama made a campaign stop at Forest Park in 2008.

Kasich, governor of Ohio, is regarded by some pollsters as the strongest Republican candidate for a general election contest. But, polls also show he is running behind Donald Trump for the GOP nomination.

Indiana's important presidential primary is May 3 where it may be 'do or die' for Kasich, and to do well in Indiana he must do well in heavily Republican Hamilton County. He will appear at 11 a.m. Tuesday at the Exposition Hall on the county 4-H Fairgrounds

There is no charge for admission to the Kasich event. Doors will open at 10 a.m. The candidate will also make two stops in Indianapolis later in the day. His visit follows Indy campaign stops by Trump and Ted Cruz earlier this week.

Kasich's appearance will be in a Town Hall format with the audience able to ask questions in an informal setting.

His central Indiana headquarters is located nearby at 7400 Fishers Station Drive.

Westfield Welcome Wagon

Hamilton County Tourism and the city of Westfield are teaming up to create a mobile hospitality center in Westfield. The Westfield Welcome Wagon will be used to greet visitors and residents at Grand Park and community events, and was granted to the city by Hamilton County Tourism.

“Grand Park attracts 1.5 million visits a year to Westfield and we want to greet our visitors with a warm Westfield Welcome,” explains Mayor Andy Cook. “With the Westfield Welcome Wagon, we now have the ability to showcase our hospitality initiative the most visible way possible on a 400 acre sports park.”

Westfield economic and community development report...

Two new PUDs, Grand Park continues to grow

Westfield's economic and community development department has released its first quarter report.

Plan commission filings kept pace with those in 2015, while single-family home starts have increased from last year's first quarter. The total value of permits issued since first quarter 2015 has also increased.

Among the highlights are two filings: One is for a two new Planned Unit Developments Districts, first for the Wilshire PUD, on 156th Street west of Spring Mill Road, and

the West Rail at the Station PUD, at the northeast corner of 156th Street and Ditch Road. Both are proposed to be single-family residential district, with 86 at the Wilshire and 186 at West Rail at the Station.

The release also reported that Grand Park's economic impact was \$147.7 million in 2015, more than double from 2014. It noted that Westfield ranks as the seventh safest cities of Indiana, according to a report by Consumer Affairs. Also, the release said the US Census Bureau has started collecting data for an update to the city's population count.

IURC approves water rate increase

The Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission has approved an increase in rates.

Citizens Energy Group said in a press release that it was pleased by this news, as it is necessary to fund critical infrastructure upgrades to its water system. The exact impact of the rate order will vary based on water consumption and other factors, but it is expected the average residential customer will see approximately a \$5 per month in-

crease starting in May. The current average residential water bill is about \$30 per month.

"We are pleased the IURC recognized the need to continue upgrading our aging water distribution system while also making investments to ensure adequate water supply for a growing population and economy," said Jeffrey Harrison, President & Chief Executive Officer of Citizens Energy Group.

Citizens requested the rate increase in June 2015 and this past December reached a settlement agreement on the rate case with the Office of Utility Consumer Counselor (OUCC) and other interveners. Citizens will fund about \$100 million of system improvements over the next two years with the rate increase including installation of new water mains; reservoir dredging; development of a quarry in Hamilton County

into a new reservoir; a new water intake to ensure water delivery during drought conditions; and upgrades to its treatment plants to ensure water safety and quality.

Since 2011, Citizens has invested more than \$230 million in the water utility. These investments include new water mains, a new water treatment plant, expanded well fields, and new fire hydrants to ensure public safety.

As Citizens has made these investments, it has also made enhancements to customer service including shorter wait times at its call center; a revamped web site; online chat with customer service representatives; online enrollment for budget billing, payment arrangements and move-in/move-out orders; and digital alerts for billing matters and service calls.



Indy 500 champs to be honored at Legends Day
