

Noblesville boy drowns in accident Saturday FIREFIGHTERS

A two-year old boy died Saturday night in Noblesville after being found in a neighbor’s pool. Through an examination and a review of the incident, the Hamilton County Coroner’s Office along with the Hamilton County Sheriff’s Office determined the boy’s death was consistent with signs of an accidental drowning. The young boy, Drayson D. White, was found in a neighbor’s pool on Saturday night after wandering away from the supervision of his aunt. While the pool

was surrounded by a fence, investigators believe the boy accessed the pool either through a portion of the fence that was loose or a gate that was not secure. Officers jumped into the pool after finding the child’s body unresponsive and floating face down. CPR was performed by officers until medics arrived but the child was pronounced dead at Riverview Health a short time after the incident.

Hitchcock moved to Noblesville in the fall of 1969 when he accepted a teaching and coaching position and has remained a Noblesville resident ever since. “I was quite surprised with Mayor Ditslear’s phone call and very honored having been selected,” he said. “Also, it is significant to have the selection be someone from our educational community. Hopefully, I am a worthy representative. As a former history and government teacher, it is certainly special that 2016 is Indiana’s bicentennial. That is meaningful.” Hitchcock graduated from Ball State University in 1969 and earned his masters degree from there in 1976. He began teaching United States history and geography at Noblesville Junior High School in 1969. For the first 10 years of his employment, Hitchcock also served as athletic director and coached football, basketball, baseball, golf and track. “People in Noblesville have always been very friendly, supportive and cooperative. It’s been a very comfortable place to live and I feel very fortunate to have been able to enjoy my entire career here with one school system,” he said. “Even though Noblesville has experienced tremendous growth since arriving in 1969, I continue to enjoy the small town atmosphere and the conveniences Noblesville offers. I never have to travel far for whatever I need.” In 1979, Hitchcock transferred to the high school where he taught U.S. History, government, international relations and urban problems and solutions. He also introduced dual-credit courses offerings with Advanced Placement and Advance College Project providing students opportu-

nities to earn college credit while still in high school. In 1981, Hitchcock escorted his first students to Washington, D.C. – a first-hand history and political experience that he continued for 29 years. “I have actually lost count of the exact number, but it was more than 60 trips with more than 500 students participating,” he said. “It began as the result of a flyer I received in the school mail from a program called Washington Workshops Congressional Seminar. I had not been to D.C., three students agreed to go, and off we went.” Hitchcock indicated the first 15 trips were with Washington Workshops until he felt comfortable in providing other opportunities for students and learning how to maneuver in and around D.C. “We organized our trips and Noblesville Schools was very generous in providing a vehicle and paying for the fuel. So, there were no transportation costs for students,” he said. “We were able to connect with Congressman Dan Burton’s office in providing brief internship opportunities and with the JFK Assassination Records Review Board for the five years of the board’s existence.” During the summer, Hitchcock would make as many as five week-long trips to the nation’s capital with juniors, seniors and chaperones. “It was a lot of driving, but honestly is was one of the best things I did throughout my teacher career,” he said. “The trips were so rewarding for me and, hopefully, for the students as well. It was so encouraging observing students become so interested and excited with who they were meeting, what they were doing, and what there were see-

ing. It is much better to be there than reading or talking about it or watching a documentary on TV. We were able to do so many things – from the West Wing, to the floors of the House and Senate, to behind-the-scenes experiences at the Supreme Court. We were so fortunate in what we were able to do.” With his passion for history, politics, and teaching, Hitchcock has always found as one of the most interesting things concerning the 4th of July, is a quote from a letter written on July 3, 1776, from John Adams to his wife, Abigail: “I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated, by succeeding generations, as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be commemorated, as the Day of Deliverance by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with slews (shows), games, sports, bells, bonfires and illuminations from one end of the continent to the other from this time forward forever more.” This year’s festivities will take place on Monday, July 4. The fun begins at 5 p.m. with the parade followed by the fireworks festival from 6 to 10 p.m. At approximately 10 p.m., the annual fireworks display will begin. The festival is free of charge and will offer activities for kids, teens and adults, live music, food vendors and more. More information about the upcoming Fourth of July festivities will be announced soon. Rep. Kenley, Sen. Brown to lead FIRSST task force

The Indiana State Budget Committee this week named State Rep. Tim Brown (R-Crawfordsville) and State Sen. Luke Kenley (R-Noblesville) as co-chairs of the Funding Indiana’s Roads for a Stronger, Safer Tomorrow (FIRSST) task force.

Brown, chair of the House Committee on Ways and Means, said the newly created task force is charged with developing a long-term plan for state highway and bridge needs.

“In the coming months, Luke and I will be leading a panel in exploring long-term funding options dedicated to supporting Indiana’s infrastructure,” Brown said. “We will present our findings to the General Assembly when it reconvenes in January.”

“I am confident that, through the FIRSST task force, we will be able to identify new road-funding solutions that can be utilized when we draft the next two-year budget,” said Kenley, chair of the Senate Committee on Appropriations and member of the Senate Committee on Tax and Fiscal Policy. “This task force is a vital step toward making well-informed decisions as we maintain Indiana’s status as the Cross-roads of America.”

The task force was established under Indiana’s recently enacted law directing more than \$800 million to state and local roads over the next two years while providing city and county governments additional tools to address their road funding needs.

Fishers to receive Certified Technology Park

State Sen. Luke Kenley (R-Noblesville) that the City of Fishers will receive a Certified Technology Park (CTP) designation.

Fishers’ proposal, which was approved by the State Budget Committee today, will designate the Nickel Plate District and the adjacent North East Commerce Park together as a Certified Technology Park.

“This designation will be a huge step forward for the City of Fishers,” Kenley said. “CTPs allow communities to harness the innovation, drive and entrepreneurship of their citizens and invest in economic growth. The funds coming from the CTP program will help Fishers continue to develop the Nickel Plate District as a high-technology, entrepreneurial epicenter and expand the space, providing more opportunity for growth.”

Kenley added that in addition to expanding the physical location to include North East Commerce Park, Fishers will relocate Launch Fishers to the CTP and perform infrastructure improvements that encourage more high-tech businesses to move to the park. Kenley noted Ball State University’s entrepreneurial technology learning and mentoring center will also be located in the CTP.

The CTP program is a function of the Indiana Economic Development Corporation that allows local governments to recapture certain state and local tax revenue, which can be invested in the development of the park.

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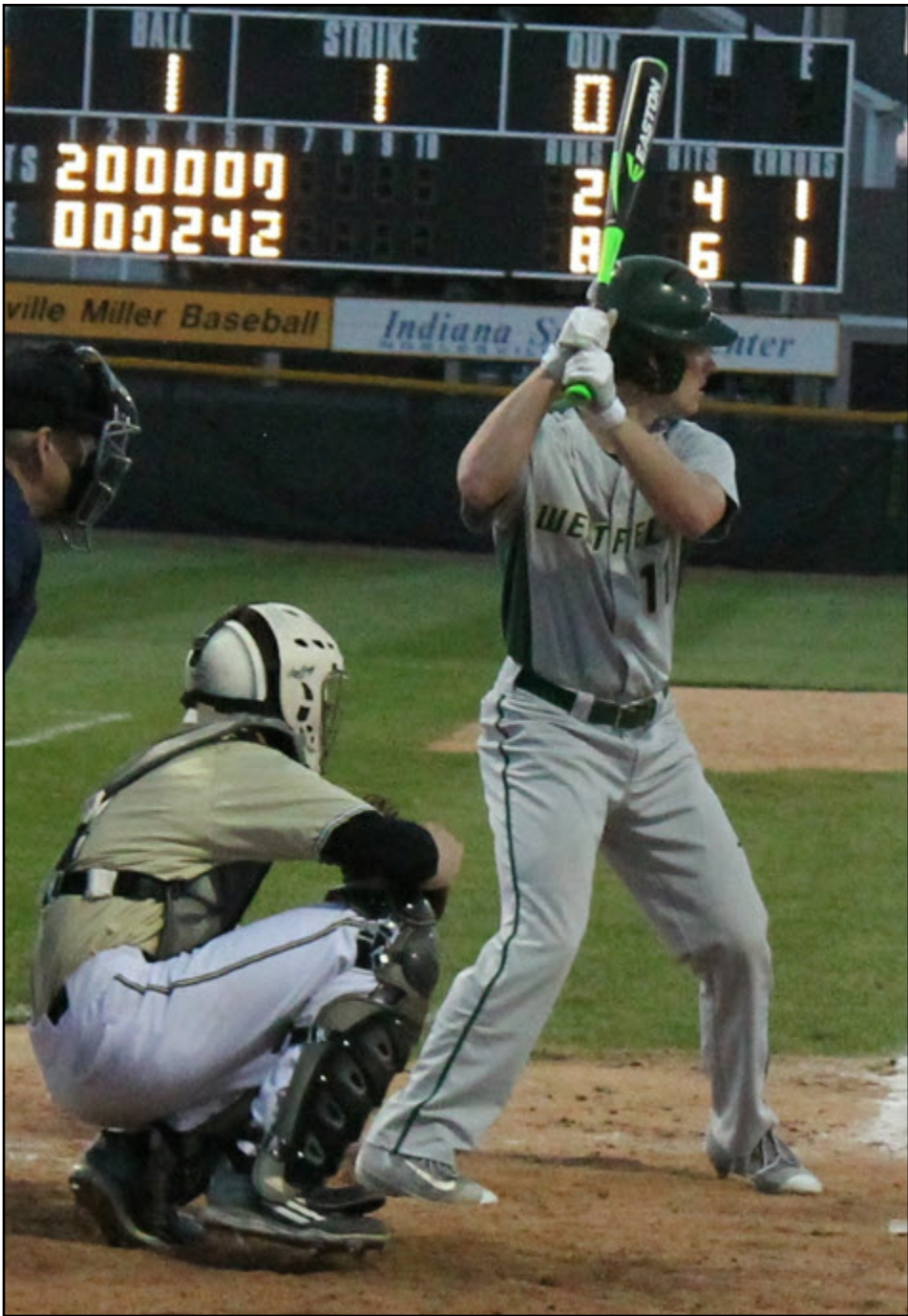
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Sophomores perform on mound, but ...
