The public transportation or mass transit idea has been discussed for two years or more. The plan, fostered by the Central Indiana Regional Transportation Authority, would provide commuter bus service in Marion and Hamilton counties largely geared toward getting residents into downtown Indianapolis on buses rather than cars thereby presumably relieving congestion and pollution.

Public transit is also widely supported by Chambers of Commerce whose business members want transportation for potential employees in Indianapolis to fill jobs in this county at restaurants, hotels, grocery stores and entertainment venues.

At the present time Greater Indianapolis has yet to be released.

Hamilton County public transportation is provided by Janus' Hamilton County Express, an on-demand service and Prime Life, mainly for the elderly. The proposed multi-county plan calls for eventual addition of bus routes into other counties and lines to serve Fishers, Noblesville and various areas within Hamilton County.

To finance the ambitious plan a combination of revenue sources is needed. One component is the increase in the County Option Income Tax. Federal grants and rider revenue would also be used. A budget

Poll workers needed for primary election

Hamilton County is still looking for Republican and Democrat poll workers for Tuesday's primary election in Noblesville, Fishers and West-

The county is looking for Republican Inspectors. Republican and Demo-Judges and Clerks. Those interested must first be a registered voter in Hamilton County.

Republican Inspectors are required to attend a training session, set up the polling place on Monday, run the precinct on Tuesday and return the election results to the judicial center on Tuesday night. Their pay will be \$225 plus \$20 for meals. Inspectors will need to attend one of the following training sessions on Wednesday night at 7 p.m. or on Saturday at either 10 a.m. or 1 p.m.

The Judges help set up the polling place on Monday, work with the Inspector on election day, set the voting machine for each voter and the Democrat Judge accompanies the Inspector to the Judicial center on Tuesday night. Their pay is \$105 plus \$20 for meals. The Democrat judge is an additional \$15 for returning with the supplies on Tuesday evening.

The Clerks will check in voters and assists the other workers. Their pay is \$105 plus \$20 for meals.

Hopefully, I am a worthy representative. As a former history and government teacher, it is certainly special that 2016 is Indiana's bicentennial. That is meaningful."

Hitchcock graduated from Ball State University in 1969 and earned his masters degree from there in 1976. He began teaching United States history and geography at Noblesville Junior High School in 1969. For the first 10 years of his employment, Hitchcock also served as athletic director and coached football, basketball, baseball, golf
