Meals from the Market

The south alley located next to the Visitors Center will soon be alive with a limited dining series thanks to Noblesville Main Street. The event is called Meals from the Market and is designed to be a unique farm-to-table meal featuring local music, art and cuisine. As the name suggests, the shop local theme will be ever-present as this event highlights produce, meat and goods from the Saturday Farmers Market vendors.

Local chef, Rick Moreland will prepare the meals and assist Main Street in continuing to drive the value of local shopping and local ingredients.

“My greatest inspiration for cooking is when I was young, seeing my mom and my grandmother cooking for our family, every-

one coming together to share a meal and the joy it brought,” stated Moreland. “I am excited to be part of this project because as a chef I love to use top quality, fresh ingredients from local sources. I love going to the farmers market and talking with growers and vendors and picking out ingredients that excite me to cook and share with others.”

In addition, live music and art will be incorporated through a partnership with Logan Street Sanctuary to add ambiance and visual art to the setting.

“This concept is taking the place of the Thursday Market we have held the previous three years. Though we enjoyed those Thursday evenings, we thought it best

to revise the program and focus on culinary arts in addition to music and art on display,” said Chris Owens, executive director of Noblesville Main Street. “It will be amazing to see Rick incorporate local goods from those who participate in our market and watch him interact as he cooks throughout the day in the south alley.”

This meal series will take place in the south alley next to the Visitors Center and is limited to 30 participants for one sitting each date, June 9, July 7, Aug. 4 and Sept. 1. Attendees will be given a recipe card containing Chef Moreland’s recipe for the evening and the contact information for the market vendor who supplied the ingredients. Noblesville Main Street will

New iron bridge taking shape on White River

A few news items of interest that have come my way in recent days:

A historic old iron bridge is taking shape in a new location on White River. It will connect Koteewi County Park with the White River Campgrounds at Strawtown. The County Parks Department project is actually two structures end to end designed to provide pedestrian traffic between the two county park and recreation facilities. It will not carry motor vehicles.

The County Historical Museum is open with a new director. Susan Lucas has been hired for the current year. She replaces Diane Nevitt who retired last year. New displays are planned this season. The museum, located in the 140-year old former county jail and sheriff's residence, is open Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Kenley: Local road and bridge funding distributed to local units

Infrastructure funding resulting from a law authored by State Sen. Luke Kenley (R-Noblesville) allocating more than \$430 million for local road and bridge improvements was recently distributed to local governments across Indiana, including nearly \$60 million for Hamilton County.

[Senate Enrolled Act 67](#) provides a distribution of approximately \$433 million to counties, cities and towns for local road projects. The funding comes from local income-tax revenue that was previously held by the state for each local unit in their respective accounts. Over time, excess balances in these accounts accumulated to a statewide average of 25 percent of annual local income tax receipts, which led lawmakers to conclude that it is reasonable to make a one-time distribution of much of the current excess balance immediately.

SEA 67 distributed more than \$57.7 million to Hamilton County and its cities and towns for road work and more than \$8

million to townships, schools and libraries, for a total of more than \$65.7 million returning to Hamilton County.

"This bill is a fiscally responsible, strong step toward fully funding Indiana's infrastructure needs," Kenley said. "Local governments have identified road funding as a top priority, and I am pleased that the General Assembly was able to put road-funding dollars into the hands of locals in time for the summer construction season."

Kenley added that SEA 67 requires that counties, cities and towns direct a minimum of 75 percent of the distributed funds to local road and bridge needs or to their rainy day fund. The remaining 25 percent can be used at the localities' discretion. Under SEA 67, \$72 million will be returned to schools, libraries and townships across the state totaling \$505 million in returned funds to local units of government statewide.

Indiana State Police partners with the DEA in 11th Drug Take-Back Day

This weekend, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) offers residents a chance to get rid of pills, cough syrup, and other unwanted medications that have been piling up around their homes during the eleventh National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day. Held from 10 AM to 2 PM on Saturday, April 30, 2016, the event is one of the few days of the year where residents can drop off expired or unused prescription medications without having to wonder whether they will be accepted—even controlled substances, such as ADHD drugs, are taken. This program WILL NOT ACCEPT NEW OR USED NEEDLES. The collection is intended for liquid and pill medications only.

Past Take-Back Day events have been hugely successful, collecting more than 700,000 pounds of prescription medications nationwide last October alone. Citizens wishing to participate in this program

may drop off their prescription drugs for disposal at any Indiana State Police Post throughout the state (except the Toll Road). This includes the Indianapolis Post on Saturday, April 30, between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. at 8620 E. 21st Street, Indianapolis, IN 46219.

It is unsafe to keep expired, unused or unwanted prescription drugs in your house. Flushing drugs down the sink or toilet is potentially very harmful to water treatment facilities. This is an opportunity to properly dispose of prescription drugs with no questions asked.

For those unable to drop off unwanted or unused prescription drugs, the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office (18100 Cumberland Rd, Noblesville, IN 46060) offers a 24/7 secure drop box inside their lobby.

Be safe on motorcycles this spring and summer

The warm weather of spring and summer brings increased motorcycle traffic, with Hoosiers riding for recreation and transportation. Nationally, every year, motorcycle riders are involved in thousands of crashes that result in disabling injuries and death. The Indiana State Police offers these safe driving tips so that everyone can share Hoosier Highways safely.

Tips for passenger vehicles:

- Watch attentively for motorcycles. Check blind spots before changing lanes and look twice at intersections before you turn or pull out into traffic. Use your turn signals when changing lanes.
- Anticipate hazards that may confront a motorcyclist like large pot holes, debris, or other hazardous road conditions. Allow at least two seconds of following distance between your vehicle and a motorcycle.
- Be cautious and observant when turning left. This is a primary cause of crashes between vehicles and motorcycles.
- Remember, motorcycles are entitled to operate in a full lane.
- Obey all traffic laws.

Tips for motorcycle riders:

- Wear protective equipment and clothing, especially a helmet with face shield.

- Make yourself visible by wearing bright clothing, using reflective tape and by using your motorcycle's headlight. Always use turn signals when changing lanes and turning.
- Check your motorcycle before each ride, and do not ride if any equipment is not operating properly.
- Look for road hazards. Be especially cautious around intersections, alleys, driveways, and other areas where an animal, pedestrian, or vehicle might enter your path.
- Avoid riding in the blind spot of other vehicles.
- Ride defensively; always leave enough reaction time for unexpected movements from other vehicles.
- When operating a motorcycle during inclement weather, slow down and use extra caution. Avoid sudden changes in direction or speed.
- Never ride impaired.
- Never perform stunts like "wheelies" or other tricks.

Motorcycles are harder to see than other vehicles; consequently, many crashes occur because other motorists don't see the motorcycle. All motorists should take the time for a second look before pulling into an intersection or making a left turn. It only takes a second to save a life.

She was born on August 12, 1946, in Prince George, Maryland.

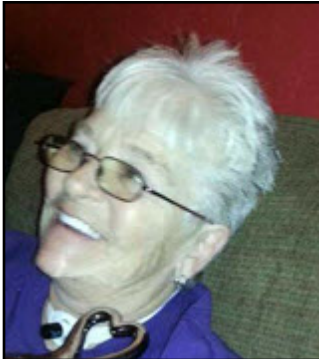
She graduated from Madison Heights High School in 1990.

Indy Fuel releases 2016-17 schedule

The Indy Fuel, proud ECHL affiliate of the National Hockey League's Chicago Blackhawks and the American Hockey League's Rockford IceHogs, released their 2016-17 regular season schedule Thursday afternoon. The club begins their third year of competition on Friday, October 14 against the Cincinnati Cyclones at Indiana Farmers Coliseum.

The Fuel head into year three looking to build upon a 32-36-4-0 record from 2015-16, searching for the franchise's first Kelly Cup Playoff berth. Once again, Indy will play a 72-game schedule with 36 games coming at Indiana Farmers Coliseum at the Indiana State Fairgrounds.

After an ultra-competitive race for the Midwest Division crown last season, the Fuel will play 32 games against divisional foes in 2016-17. Indy will play 12 games against the Cyclones (6 home, 6 road), 11 against the Quad City Mallards (7 home, 4 road) and nine against the Fort Wayne Komets (5 home, 4 road). The Fuel play a total of 50 games within the Western Conference, meeting the Central Division 14 times and the West Division for four matchups.

Other highlights of the Fuel's schedule include a three-game visit to the Alaska Aces on Nov. 9-12, their first trip to Canada on Dec. 7 against the Brampton Beast, a home New Year's Day showdown against the Brampton and a season-long six-game homestand from Jan. 20-29. Indy wraps up the campaign with four straight in the Circle City from April 1-7, followed by the 2016-17 season finale in Toledo on April 8.

Weekends will be a busy time for Indy, with 61 of the team's 72 games landing on a Friday, Saturday or Sunday. Nine of the Fuel's 13 Sunday games will be in Indianapolis. Indy will play three games in three nights a total of 13 times this season, four of which take place entirely on home ice. The busiest stretch on for the Fuel in 2016-17 comes during a stretch of five games in six nights from Dec. 27 to Jan. 1.

Indy will face off against a few unfamiliar foes over the upcoming season. Teams appearing on the 2016-17 schedule that the Fuel did not meet in 2015-16 include the Allen Americans (2 home, 4 road), Atlanta Gladiators (2 home), Greenville Swamp Rabbits (2 road), Reading Royals (2 road) and the Tulsa Oilers (2 home, 2 road). The Oilers are the only team on the schedule which Indy has yet to encounter in their ECHL tenure.

Start times at Indiana Farmers Coliseum remained unchanged from the Fuel's first two seasons; with weekday games (Monday-Thursday) beginning at 7:05 p.m. ET, Friday and Saturday games starting at 7:35 p.m. ET, and Sunday contests slated for a 3:05 p.m. ET matinee start.

The club will release their 2016-17 Promotional Calendar and preseason information later in the summer.
