Adler also served as a Deputy Attorney General for the State of Indiana.

Adler was admitted to the Indiana bar in 1975, and has practiced law for nearly 40 years. A graduate of Indiana University School of Law – Indianapolis, and holds a Bachelor of Science in Mathematics and Chemistry from Purdue University. Adler is a veteran of armed services, and attended Fort Knox Armor School in 1975, prior to entering private practice,

Adler is the current President and senior attorney of Adler Tesnar & Whalin. Adler has worked out of the historic Adler Building since 1990. The Adler Building was the previous home of the First Christian Church in Noblesville, and was originally built in 1896, but renovated in the late 1980's by Adler into office space.
