Fueled by presidential races, Hamilton County experiences a...

Record primary turnout

A record number of primary voters kept polls busy all day yesterday, drawn by the highly publicized presidential race. There were surprises, none greater than in the Democratic primary where Bernie Sanders beat Hillary Clinton by about 2,200 votes which followed the statewide trend of Sanders upset win.

Donald Trump beat Ted Cruz, but only by about 4,300 votes out of nearly 75,000 cast in the county GOP primary. John Kasich came in a poor third with 7,700 votes.

In all, more than 100,000 county residents went to the polls, a new record for a primary election. With about 200,000 registered voters the turnout amounted to just under 50 percent. Three out of four voters participated in the Republican primary.

In county races, Noblesville attorney Jon Brown defeated court magistrate David Najjar for judge of Superior Court 2 in something of a surprise. And, in the hard fought contest for three at-large county council seats Rick McKinney and Brad Beaver won re-nomination. They will be joined by Jeff Hern, currently Fall Creek Township trustee.

The results do not change the balance on the Council in which Beaver, McKinney along with Paul Ayers and Fred Glynn have voted together against the other three members on several divisive issues.

State Sen. Luke Kenley, Noblesville, beat back a challenge from Westfield businessman Scott Willis by slightly over 5,300 votes or a percentage margin of 61 to 39. Other local incumbent state legislators Jerry Torr, Carmel and Donna Schaibley, Carmel, also won easily.

In another hard fought race, incumbent County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt defeated challenger Bill Smythe by a convincing margin of just under 7,000 votes. Although Heirbrandt is the incumbent, it was his first popular election. He had been chosen by a GOP caucus to fill the commissioner seat.

Hamilton County followed statewide trends in supporting Todd Young, formerly of Carmel, for the U.S. Senate nomination, and incumbent Congresswoman Susan Brooks for re-nomination in the 5th District.

Voters in Noblesville and Hamilton Southeastern school districts gave overwhelming support to school tax

Mainstreet suing state due to transitional care moratorium

Does Indiana's moratorium on new nursing homes and transitional care facilities violate state law?

Mainstreet believes it does. The health care property developer, which is headquartered in Carmel's Clay Terrace, is suing the state for that reason. The Inside Indiana Business web site reported that Mainstreet's lawsuit was filed in Hamilton County Circuit Court on Friday, and provided a copy of the suit.

The moratorium took effect with the passage of Senate Bill 460, which went into law on May 12, 2015. According to the digest version on the Indiana General Assembly web site, the law does not allow "the state department of health from approving: (1) the licensure of comprehensive care health facilities; (2) new or converted comprehensive care beds; or (3) the certification of new or converted comprehensive care beds for participation in the state Medicaid program; through June 30, 2018." The bill was approved by the State Senate 35-14 on Feb. 3, 2015 and by the House 52-40 on March 17, 2015. It became law after it was not signed by Gov. Mike Pence eight days after he received it.

Zeke Turner, Mainstreet's CEO and founder, told the IIB that "filing this lawsuit is our only recourse" to fight the moratorium.

Mainstreet has developed facilities in Carmel, Terre Haute, South Bend, Indianapolis and Westfield, as well as in Lafayette, Colo., which is located near Boulder.

Overnight I-69 traffic restrictions for 106th St. bridge demolition

Walsh Construction Company plans to close multiple traffic lanes on Interstate 69 during overnight hours this week to continue demolition of the 106th Street overpass bridge.

Removing the structure will also require multiple rolling slowdowns of traffic on I-69 to create gaps in interstate traffic that will allow for safe removal of the bridge deck above.

Weather permitting, lane closures and rolling slowdowns of traffic will begin after 9 p.m. on the dates below, and all traffic restrictions are expected to end before 6 a.m. the next day. Construction schedules and traffic restrictions are subject to change.

Wednesday, May 4

- I-69 northbound and southbound will have rolling slowdowns and up to three right lanes closed

Thursday, May 5

- I-69 southbound will have up to two right lanes closed
- I-69 northbound will have one left lane closed

Friday, May 6

- I-69 northbound and southbound will have one left lane closed

The speed limit near the construction zone at mile marker 204 is reduced to 55 mph and may be reduced further to 45 mph when workers are present. Motorists are advised to pay attention to work zone warning signs and follow posted speed limits.

IHSAA annual By-Laws review...

Tournament success factor measure approved; two proposals tabled by board

Unanimous passage of a two-part proposal to the Tournament Success Factor rule affecting schools playing in a higher classification highlighted a list of 21 proposals during today’s annual review of the IHSAA By-Laws in Indianapolis.

In all, seven items were passed, 12 failed and two were tabled. All proposals are considered in the order that the affected rule appears within the current by-laws. The Board of Directors has four options on each proposal: affirm, deny, table or amend. A copy of the current by-laws [is available here](#). A simple majority is necessary to act on any measure. All approved measures become effective immediately unless otherwise noted.

The first adjustments to the Tournament Success Factor (Rule 2-5), first enacted in June 2012, were approved by a unanimous 19-0 vote today. For schools already playing up in a higher classification that do not achieve the same level of success, those schools will now go down only one classification whereas the previous rule calls for schools to return to the classification set by their enrollment.

A second part of the rule that was approved is the point values needed to stay in a higher classification. Currently, schools need to accumulate four or five points (four points for a state championship, three for a semi-state, two for a regional, or one for a sectional) over a two-year cycle to maintain their current classification. The Board adjusted that rule to now read three, four or five points to maintain their place in their current class.

Two proposals were tabled by the Board for further study and clarification will be sought from the leadership of the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association and Indiana Football Coaches Association who were involved in both.

The first was a proposal related to Rule 20-2 (Past Link) which states that an incoming freshman from a non-feeding school who has a link at his/her new school will be ineligible for 365 days following their enrollment. That link would also have to have occurred in the 12 months previous to their enrollment or within 90 days after enrollment.

The second tabled proposal involved allowing an individual on a member school coaching staff in basketball to coach and instruct students during Open Facilities but only take part in “Summer Basketball Team Activities” under specific circumstances.

The following are additional highlights of today’s Board meeting. Complete minutes will be posted at IHSAA.org.

- Approved a proposal outlining conditions that the Board of Directors may remove any member of the Board and setting basic director standards. This rule was passed by the Executive Committee in February and was formally ratified today by the Board.
- The Past Link rule (Rule 20-2) was clarified that a link is established where a transfer student is in a non-school athletic program in which the past linked person was involved as a coach, manager, trainer, *volunteer or employee*.
- A proposal from the Indiana Football Coaches Association was approved unanimously that restricts contact drills. After Friday of week 7, a football team/player may participate in a maximum of two practices per IHSAA Corresponding Week involving contact equal to the “Thud” level drill or the “Live” level drill.
- Five amendments proposed on behalf of the Metropolitan Interscholastic Conference were each rejected. A detailed budget, including line item income, accounts payable and employment contracts would be distributed to member schools failed to gain any support as was an amendment that would have the Association send an electronic survey to member schools to gauge support of lack thereof, and the results of the survey shall be made available to schools. A third item offered that when a school or team is suspended from further interschool contests or state tournament by the IHSAA, that an explanation of charges will be issued, an opportunity to answer those charges and the opportunity to appeal the decision to a panel of school administrators. A fourth item would have allowed a state tournament series contest to be played on Sunday. The final rule proposal would have stricken language from Rule 19.1 (Transfer Options When Transfer with Change of Residence by Parent/Guardian).
- Two proposals authored by Switzerland County principal Gregg Goewert were voted down. The first would have amended portions of Rule 2 (Classification of School) to allow for the individual sports of cross country and swimming and diving to be contested in a multiple class format. The second would have changed

boys and girls basketball rules to permit a JV player to participate in six quarters instead of five, in a given session.

- An amendment to Rule 15-3.2 (Camps and Clinics) was approved to correct the ending date from week 4 to week 5.
- Rule 15-3.4 (Moratorium) was amended to eliminate “Week 52 or Week 1” which created confusion when the Fourth of July falls during a non-designated corresponding calendar week.
- Two proposals from South Dearborn principal Brad Stoneking did not win any support. The first was a request for a Summer Try-out Week with the second item seeking to clarify that for a half to count in boys and girls soccer, a minimum of 20 minutes of playing time must be played.
- An amendment to Rule 19-6.1 (Eligibility when Transfer without Changes of Residence by Parent/Guardian) did not garner any support that would have permitted a transfer with full eligibility prior to a student’s enrollment as a sophomore.
- A pair of proposals from Floyd Central principal Janie Whaley were turned down. The first would permit a member school soccer team to participate in a controlled scrimmage with a non-member school. The second requested permission for a school’s junior varsity soccer team to play a Jamboree in addition to a school’s varsity team.

Board of Directors and Executive Committee Elections

The elections for next year’s leadership of the Board and Executive Committee also were held. Jennings County athletic director Mike Broughton was voted president of the 2016-17 Board of Directors and Tim Grove, superintendent of South Knox School Corporation, was elected vice president. Debb Stevens, Caston athletic director, was named chairwoman of the 2016-17 Executive Committee and Jim Brown, Fishers co-athletic director, was confirmed as vice chair.

In a separate session, the IHSAA Executive Committee voted unanimously to retain the sport of gymnastics. Because the sport falls below the minimum participation numbers required by the Association, the status of girls gymnastics is annually reviewed.

LST Marketing co-owns and operates Jonathan Byrd's Event & Entertainment, which will manage all aspects of the Grand Park Events Center business, including event scheduling, sponsorship coordination, marketing, event production and vendor procurement.

Sommer will lead the Grand Park initiative and expand LST Marketing's business in multiple field sports, including soccer and developmental youth athletics, by serving as the Executive Director of the Grand Park Events Center, as well as Executive Director of Field Sports for both LST Marketing and Jonathan Byrd's Event & Entertainment.

Sommer, 47, is a current board member of the U.S. Soccer Foundation and previous Athlete's Council member for the U.S. Soccer Federation. He lives in Carmel with his wife, Susie, and two sons, Tommy and Noah.
