Noblesville Farmers Market opens this weekend

The annual Noblesville Farmers Market, organized by Noblesville Main Street, opens this Saturday from 8 a.m. until noon for the first of 24 consecutive weeks ending on Oct. 15, 2016. The 2016 market will take place in the Riverview Health overflow parking lot, located on Conner Street at the intersection of SR 32 and SR 19.

"We're excited to once again host the Noblesville Farmers Market on the lot just east of our main hospital campus," said Seth Warren, president and CEO of Riverview Health. "The market's farm-to-table approach fits nicely with our mission to help people in our community improve their overall health and well-being. We're happy to support any initiative that gives people convenient, cost-effective access to fresh fruits, vegetables and other food for better nutrition."

New to the market this year, the Main Street tent is the pickup location for orders placed through the following web site: NoblesvilleFarmersMarket.com. In addition to SNAP benefits and WIC benefits, market patrons who are eligible for those programs can also take part in Fresh Bucks, a local initiative to further combat food insecurity.

Fresh Bucks is a SNAP, formerly known as food stamps, double-up program, that allows customers who pay with their EBT card to double their dollars, up to \$20 a day, spent on fruits and vegetables. The Fresh Bucks program is a project of the Indy Hunger Network, a local nonprofit whose goal is to ensure that anyone who is hungry can access the nutritious food that they need. IHN is a coalition of leading anti-hunger organizations within the Indianapolis area. 
Jellison congratulated for Alumnus of the Year award





Carmel's Cynthia Yue was one of two Indiana high school students to be named as a U.S. Presidential Scholar.

The award recognizes some of the United States' most distinguished graduating high school seniors. The Scholars are chosen after a lengthy process where SAT and ACT scores are used to select the top 20 boys and top 20 girls in each state. The general component subsection of the "How Are Scholars Selected" section on the Pres-Scholars (http://www2.ed.gov/programs/psp/select.h tml) explains further:

'To be considered further, candidates must submit candidacy materials, including essays, self-assessments, secondary school reports, and transcripts. Candidates are evaluated on their academic achievement, personal characteristics, leadership and service activities, and an analysis of their essay."

An independent committee chooses 500 semi-finalists - about six to 20 from each state - in late March, and the Commission on Presidential Scholars selects the final 121 students in April. That consists of one boy and one girl from each state, Washington, D.C. and Puerto Rico. The committee also selects a number of at-large scholars, choosing up to 15.



Flyovers bring "Fast Forward" theme full-circle in patriotic fashion

Pre-race festivities will take on a similar For Legends Day, prepaid parking is theme with two special flyovers. The first will feature historical World War II-era military planes while the second will feature state of the art F-18E Superhornets piloted by the U.S. Navy.

> "The 30 minutes before the green flag drops are always my favorite time of the year," said IMS President J. Douglas Boles. This year's flyovers will be thrilling, and represent the perfect blend of past and present we're celebrating at the 100th Running of the Indy 500."

> The first flyover will include two planes that saw action during critical World War II missions: a Douglas SBD-5 and P-51 Mustang. It will be carried out in collaboration with the Commemorative Air Force, an organization founded to acquire, restore and preserve in flying condition a complete collection of combat aircraft which were flown by all military services of the United States.

> The SBD was the only U.S. combat aircraft to fight from the beginning of World War II until the end. Considered the most destructive air weapon of the U.S. Navy, the SBD sank over 300,000 tons of enemy ships, a greater tonnage of Japanese shipping than any other Allied aircraft during the war. In the skies over Pearl Harbor, the SBD was the first American combat aircraft to shoot down a Japanese Zero fighter.

> The P-51 Mustang is an American longrange, single-seat fighter that saw action during World War II and the Korean War. It was first commissioned in 1940 and has a top speed of 437 mph.

> The second flyover will involve a single-pass in a four-plane formation at 300-350 mph. The F-18E is a single-seat variant that deploys on carriers and provides precision air to ground support, along with the ability to protect carriers from any airborne threats. The top speed of navy fighter pilots flying an F-18E is approximately Mach 1.8.

> The squadrons carrying out the flyovers - VFA-81 and VAQ-139 - most recently wrapped up a 10-month deployment in the Persian Gulf assisting the fight against ISIS. It was the longest deployment for the two squadrons attached to CAG-17 since the Vietnam War. VFA-81 is based out of Naval Air Station Oceana in Virginia Beach, Virginia, while VAQ-139 comes from Naval Air Station Whidbey Island based in Washington State.
