

that there isn't a sporting event in which more Hamilton County athletes have competed than the Hamilton County Track & Field Meet.

Athletes like you, from all schools in Hamilton County. Even from schools which no longer exist in Hamilton

Tonight's Hamilton County Meet, boys and girls, will be held at Carmel. The field of teams is at an all-time low. Just six schools will show up ... Carmel, Fishers, Guerin Catholic, Hamilton Southeastern, Noblesville and Westfield.

For the first time ever, Hamilton Heights and Sheridan will not compete.

Will the county track and field meet survive losing two more teams?

Most nearly everyone who is involved say "no." They say the meet will continue. But, that's what most folks said a few years ago when another Hamilton County sporting tradition ended, following the small schools' withdraw from the competition.

This time it's a little different. Hamilton Heights and Sheridan have an ex-

cuse. A good excuse. "Only issue we ran into is that our (new) conference meet is on the same date as the county meet," Sheridan athletic director Brian Jones told The Re-

Same thing happened to Hamilton Heights.

'As long as the date remains on the same date as our conference met, the conference meet will take precedence," said Hamilton Heights AD Kurt Ogden.

"I think it is unfortunate that not all of the schools are participating," offered host athletic director Jim Inskeep. "However, that is their choice.

We will continue to have the county meet. It is one of the best in the state during the regular season and gets better each year with the individual talent."

While the little schools, Heights and Sheridan, are leaving because of conference conflicts, it has been several years since they've been able to compete as a team against the larger Hamilton County powerhouses.

Earlier this week, the IHSAA voted down a proposal to change its track and field program to a class enrollment sport.

That's too bad.

"I'm definitely in favor of class track and field or making some sort of concessions like they did with cross country," Ogden told The Reporter.





Millers take Game 1 over Royals

Thursday's opener of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference series between Noblesville and Hamilton Southeastern turned out to be almost a game and a half.

That's because 10 innings were needed to decided the first of three games for the Millers and the host Royals. Noblesville finally won 5-4, and will host HSE tonight as the series shifts to Don Dunker Field.

"Every time HSE and Noblesville get together, it's going to be a war," said Millers coach Justin Keever

The Millers got the go-ahead run in the top of the 10th, when a Ty Lindstrand hit batted in Julian Simac. It was Lindstrand's second hit of the night, and Simac got himself in position to score after he stole second base.

"Ty was having good swings all day long," said Keever. "He had real good at-bats."

Keever also gave credit to Tyler Owens, who came in to pitch in the fifth inning and was credited with the win.

"He just kind of held them down, just found ways to keep them off the plate," said Keever, who also noted that the Noblesville defense "made some good plays behind him."

Owens went five and two thirds innings for the win. Both he and starter Reese Sharp (who pitched four innings) had two strikeouts on the night. Michael Carmosino pitched the last out for Noblesville.

The Millers started the game with three runs in the first inning and another one in the third, but the Royals tied the game by scoring all four of their runs in the bottom of the fourth. Spencer Irick was 2-for-2, with Matt Gorski and Jon McGee both hitting a double.

Carter Poiry started and lasted eight innings. He struck out four and allowed four hits and just one earned run. Gorski threw two innings, walked one, struck out four, and allowed one run.




