County commissioners set five road projects

Hamilton County during the next couple of years. Five priority road projects were set Monday in a special County Commissioners session.

At the top of the list is the much publicized reconstruc-I-69 at Fishers. The plan is the eliminate traffic congestion on one the state's most heavily traveled highways.

Next, the county will assist Carmel in rebuilding the artery. congested 96th and Keystone intersection. It is currently considered a major problem for commuter traffic from massive 37 upgrade comes largely from a \$100 million Carmel and Westfield areas into Indianapolis.

At the north end of Keystone, commissioners want to proceed with a plan to build what is being called a "fly over" ramp to allow motorists on 146th Street access to southbound Keystone.

Big plans are afoot for major highway improvements in among the priorities. It will likely required participation by the city to upgrade Pleasant Street from 16th Street to White River where the county will build a new bridge and connect Pleasant to River Road.

And, last but not least, is the plan to construct a roundtion of intersections on Ind. 37 between Noblesville and about at 146th Street and Allisonville Road. This along with a city-built roundabout at Allisonville and Greenfield Ave., should improve traffic flow on the busy north-south

These projects are not cheap. Funding for the state grant. Another \$18 million in a recent COIT distribution will help with the other projects along with several million in accumulated Major Bridge Fund monies for the Pleasant Street bridge and possibly the Keystone fly over.

Not all plans are limited to highway improvements. County Auditor Dawn Coverdale, acting as secretary to the held June 23. The council must appropriate the funds for all commissioners, said plans are also proceeding for expan- capital projects.

In addition, officials are anticipating a report due June 13 on suggestions for providing more jail space. And, there is now a hope that a shelter for victims of domestic abuse can be built on Cumberland Road property north of the jail facility. Currently sheltering for such victims is provided in Anderson under an agreement with Madison County.

Financing of these non-highway projects may come from renewing bond issues that were sold to finance earlier projects and will be paid off this year. Issuing new bonds in the same or lesser amounts would not require a tax increase.

There may be a rainbow over that hill this morning. If not this morning, then soon.



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
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Dr. J.M. Shugart November 20, 1922 - May 10, 2016

Police looking for AutoZone robbery suspects

Noblesville Police are looking for two suspects who robbed a Noblesville Auto-Zone Monday evening.

At approximately 9:56 p.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to a report of a robbery at the AutoZone located at 14515 Mundy Drive. Officers arrived on the scene a short time later and began to investigate.

Initial information from the caller alleges that two subjects came into the store and immediately confronted the two store employees. The caller stated that both suspects were armed with handguns and were demanding money from the store's cash registers and safe. As a result, employees provided the suspects with an undisclosed amount of cash. The suspects then reportedly fled the store running towards the northwest. Officers established a perimeter in the area and utilized a K-9 unit during the search. Officers lifted the perimeter at approximately 10:23 p.m. and were unable to locate the suspects.





Next up were two Hamilton County schools. Carmel was runner-up with 103 points, with the Millers third at 93.33 points. Both schools won three events.

The Greyhounds spread out their wins over three different areas. The distance runners stepped up with a victory in the 4x1600 relay, the sprinters won the Sprint Medley in a very tight race, and Mitch Lipe and Alex Audia teamed up for a win in the Pole Vault Relay. Lipe was the individual winner with a vault of 14 feet, 6 inches.

This meet was the regular season finale for Carmel, the defending state champion, and it went a long way for helping coach Ken Browner to figure out who will be competing at the sectional.

"We're trying to find out the last few spots for our sectional roster," said Browner. The sectional is set for Thursday, May 19 at Carmel Stadium.


