Ind. 37 intersections lead the list...

County commissioners set five road projects

Big plans are afoot for major highway improvements in Hamilton County during the next couple of years. Five priority road projects were set Monday in a special County Commissioners session.

At the top of the list is the much publicized reconstruction of intersections on Ind. 37 between Noblesville and I-69 at Fishers. The plan is the eliminate traffic congestion on one the state's most heavily traveled highways.

Next, the county will assist Carmel in rebuilding the congested 96th and Keystone intersection. It is currently considered a major problem for commuter traffic from Carmel and Westfield areas into Indianapolis.

At the north end of Keystone, commissioners want to proceed with a plan to build what is being called a "fly over" ramp to allow motorists on 146th Street access to southbound Keystone.

A long-considered bypass of downtown Noblesville is among the priorities. It will likely required participation by the city to upgrade Pleasant Street from 16th Street to White River where the county will build a new bridge and connect Pleasant to River Road.

And, last but not least, is the plan to construct a roundabout at 146th Street and Allisonville Road. This along with a city-built roundabout at Allisonville and Greenfield Ave., should improve traffic flow on the busy north-south artery.

These projects are not cheap. Funding for the massive 37 upgrade comes largely from a \$100 million state grant. Another \$18 million in a recent COIT distribution will help with the other projects along with several million in accumulated Major Bridge Fund monies for the Pleasant Street bridge and possibly the Keystone fly over.

Not all plans are limited to highway improvements. County Auditor Dawn Coverdale, acting as secretary to the commissioners, said plans are also proceeding for expan-

sion of the Government and Judicial Center. Preliminary plans show a major addition on the west front of the building providing space for more courtrooms, offices and storage needs.

In addition, officials are anticipating a report due June 13 on suggestions for providing more jail space. And, there is now a hope that a shelter for victims of domestic abuse can be built on Cumberland Road property north of the jail facility. Currently sheltering for such victims is provided in Anderson under an agreement with Madison County.

Financing of these non-highway projects may come from renewing bond issues that were sold to finance earlier projects and will be paid off this year. Issuing new bonds in the same or lesser amounts would not require a tax increase.

The commissioners' proposals will now go to a joint meeting of the County Council and Commissioners to be held June 23. The council must appropriate the funds for all capital projects.

The sky should be "blue" ... soon

The sky may have been gray over Noblesville lately, waiting the arrival of summer time weather. But those skies may soon turn "blue."

Last evening the Noblesville Common Council dotted all the I's and crossed all the T's by approving the development agreement and taxpayer agreement for the soon be BlueSky project on the west side of the city.

BlueSky Technology Partners, a leading e-Commerce and digital marketing consultancy, is moving ahead with relocating their U.S. corporate headquarters in Noblesville at the new Federal Hill District.

It's another feather in the hat of the Mayor John Ditslear administration's new look to the near west side.

The new area will feature the already began Federal Hill Commons park.

And, just before the Council made its moves last evening, Ditslear talked about the planned improvements to Riverview Health's land on the east side of the hospital, some which the City of Noblesville will have an opportunity to develop even farther east to the river.

All of which is a slam-dunk for Ditslear, who has worked hard in making the west corridor to the city, shall we say, extremely pleasing to Noblesville visitors.

Actually, the final moves of the City and of BlueSky are running a little behind. Previously, ground breaking was scheduled for this summer, but now has been moved to the fall. Probably in August.

It's a very expensive deal between Noblesville and BlueSky, but one that the city believes will pay off big time.

BlueSky wants a new office building and parking lot on land located on the southwest corner of John and Os-

Carmel celebrating Founders Week this week

Founders Week, sponsored by Carmel Clay Historical Society is being celebrated this week in commemoration of the Indiana Bicentennial. Entertainment and educational programs are being held to celebrate Carmel's contribution to the state's history.

The week's activities started Sunday with a locally created video 'The Story of Carmel' at the Monon

Depot, 211 First St.,SW. The historical presentation was put together by Andrew Wright, assistant to the historical society director. It will be available for viewing again this weekend.

Tonight (Wednesday) 'Quakers and the Underground Railroad' will be presented at the Museum of Miniature Houses, 111 E. Main St. Tom Hamm, Indiana historian, will speak on the local contribution to the Underground in the mid-19th century.

On Saturday, the Wendy Reed Band will perform at Main and the Monon Trail beginning at 1 p.m. At the same time activities for kids will begin on the Depot lawn. And, at 2:30 'A Visit With A Hoosier

Pioneer' featuring Kevin Stonerock as pioneer, will begin at the Depot.

Historical Society exhibits will be available for viewing all day Saturday. There are also enlarged photos in Main Street store windows depicting how the locations appeared in earlier times.

Carmel's official founders were four property owners whose farms joined at what is now Range Line Road and Main Street. Daniel Warren, one of the four, platted the town on small portions of the four tracts in 1837. Carmel was platted as Bethlehem, but later changed the name to Carmel.

Batmanghelidj.* The premises of these two books indicate that incorporating a very green diet and increasing the amount of water consumed can make a big difference in our state of health and our energy level. Cutting back or entirely omitting sugar and processed foods gives our bodies a fighting chance to ward off disease and to heal more quickly from disease and poor health. Adding exercise appropriate to our age and fitness level is also an important part of the wellness plan. In recent years there have been remarkable advances in the treatment and often the cure for many types of cancers, and for that we can and should praise researchers

and physicians in this remarkable feat. Proper diagnosis, treatment, and follow up are essential for those suffering from cancer as well as other serious disease. However, nutrition and exercise cannot be overstated. Proper hydration, as mentioned above, is critical. When we are dehydrated our bodies do not work efficiently at their highest level. Our brains suffer from lack of focus and our organs and digestive systems are sluggish. Just hearing the word “cancer” strikes fear and apprehension; few of us have escaped hearing that word in relation to ourselves, family members or friends. However we are also blessed to hear of many success stories such as I was privileged to hear from this young lady who bravely told her story. It is obvious that she will do everything possible to ensure that her body is receiving the best “fuel” possible, and that she is pro-active in her approach to a long and healthy life. She illustrates very well the importance of patients being their own best advocates, coming alongside the medical professionals

to ensure a holistic treatment and recovery. Many thanks to her for her courage, her will, and her determination to be the best she can be as she has long illustrated in her academic, athletic, and professional career. born streets. Noblesville will purchase the land which contains approximately 1.5 acres. The real estate then will be conveyed to BlueSky for construction of the building. The proposed parking lot will be available in evenings and weekends for folks who will attend events at Federal Hill Common. “It’s expanding our downtown,” Ditslear said when the original announcement was made. “It will bring growth to the downtown.” BlueSky was voted the last five years as one of the best places to work in Indiana. The company hopes to make its move to Noblesville with 70 to 75 employees here locally. The hill on which BlueSky will build, once a doctor’s office, has not been occupied in the last 25 years. There may be a rainbow over that hill this morning. If not this morning, then soon.



Noblesville woman shot Sunday

Noblesville Police are investigating a Sunday afternoon shooting in Noblesville.

At approximately 1:29 p.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to the address of 12271 Lindley Drive in reference to a report of a person shot. Officers arrived on the scene a short time later and began to investigate.

Upon arriving on the scene, officers entered the residence and located the victim. The victim, later determined to also be the complainant, stated that she had been shot in the leg by an unknown intruder. Officers provided immediate care to what appeared to be a single gunshot wound to the leg. Medical personnel arrived moments later and transported the victim to I.U. Health Methodist (Indianapolis) by ground ambulance. The victim's injury has been characterized as non-life threatening.

The victim has been identified as Di-ana R. Neville, 36, of Noblesville. Neville was unable to provide police with any description of the suspect(s) in this case. Investigators petitioned for and were subsequently granted a search warrant for the address of 12271 Lindley Drive in order to investigate the scene.

This remains an ongoing investigation.

Police looking for AutoZone robbery suspects

Noblesville Police are looking for two suspects who robbed a Noblesville Auto-Zone Monday evening.

At approximately 9:56 p.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to a report of a robbery at the AutoZone located at 14515 Mundy Drive. Officers arrived on the scene a short time later and began to investigate.

Initial information from the caller alleges that two subjects came into the store and immediately confronted the two store employees. The caller stated that both suspects were armed with handguns and were demanding money from the store's cash registers and safe. As a result, employees provided the suspects with an undisclosed amount of cash. The suspects then reportedly fled the store running towards the northwest. Officers established a perimeter in the area and utilized a K-9 unit during the search. Officers lifted the perimeter at approximately 10:23 p.m. and were unable to locate the suspects.

Suspect #1

Suspect #1 is described as a dark-skinned black male, black hair, approximately 18-25 years old, approximately 5'6" tall, very thin build, weighing approximately 130 lbs., light stubble above upper lip, wearing all black, possibly a black hooded sweatshirt or a zip-up sweatshirt and carrying a silver revolver handgun.

Suspect #2

Suspect #2 is described as a Hispanic male, black hair, approximately 16-18 years old, short and thin build, wearing a sweat-shirt that was grey in the middle and reddish-orange on the outer parts with a zip-up front, possibly wearing a reddish-orange scarf over the area of his mouth and believed to be carrying a small black handgun.

Noblesville Relays...

‘Hounds, Millers win three events each

Sectionals are on the horizon for the state's track and field teams, but there is still some regular season business to finish before then.

First up was the Noblesville Relays, the 67th annual running of which took place on Tuesday at Hare Chevrolet Field. Center Grove won the meet by scoring 122 points.

Next up were two Hamilton County schools. Carmel was runner-up with 103 points, with the Millers third at 93.33 points. Both schools won three events.

The Greyhounds spread out their wins over three different areas. The distance runners stepped up with a victory in the 4x1600 relay, the sprinters won the Sprint Medley in a very tight race, and Mitch Lipe and Alex Audia teamed up for a win in the Pole Vault Relay. Lipe was the individual winner with a vault of 14 feet, 6 inches.

This meet was the regular season finale for Carmel, the defending state champion, and it went a long way for helping coach Ken Browner to figure out who will be competing at the sectional.

"We're trying to find out the last few spots for our sectional roster," said Browner. The sectional is set for Thursday, May 19 at Carmel Stadium.

"This really became the deciding meet for a few events," said Browner. "We've got some things we've got to sit down as a coaching staff and figure out what we want to do. For the most part, it answered a lot of questions for us."

Meanwhile, Noblesville also had success across the board. The Millers were victorious in the Shuttle Hurdle Relay, were winners in the Distance Medley Relay, and finished first in the Shot Put Relay, with Eric Ferguson and Dalton Davis teaming up for the win. Ferguson won the individual shot put with an effort of 50-6; this came after he broke 160-11 in the discus.

"We had some very good performances in the field events," said Noblesville coach Kent Graham. "Aaron Grossman went 13 feet in the pole vault. That's his best of the year."

The Millers have one more regular season meet, and it's a big one - the Hoosier Crossroads Conference meet, which takes place Friday at Hamilton Southeastern.

"We need a good conference meet to propel us toward the sectionals," said Graham. "We're just trying to get the guys in positions or events that they'll have a shot to advance further in the tournament, and we're hoping to prepare some for the state meet."
