Mayors participate at OneZone Luncheon

The mayors of Hamilton County's four cities spoke at the May OneZone Luncheon Wednesday at the FORUM Conference Center in Fishers. The mayors were asked questions on a variety of topics. Here are the answers that Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear gave to his questions.

1) What is one bold leadership move you have made in your city?

Transforming 146th Street from a two-lane road to a main east/west traffic artery. The city had our corporate campus already designated but we had no way to get to it. After one meeting with INDOT, the county, Simons and other stakeholders, we are able to enlarge I-69 to six lanes and create a plan to expand 146th Street to what it is today. This assisted with the creation of Hamilton Town Center, which has been a major retail success.

2) Each of you recognizes the role of creating a sense of place for your community. What challenges does that present for you?

Despite our city's growth to nearly 60,000 residents, one aspect of Noblesville that our community members constantly remark about is its "small-town feel." As we continue to grow, the biggest challenge is making every resident feel included and a part of our community. We want those that live miles away from Downtown to feel just as a part of our city as those that are a stone's throw from it.

Noblesville Schools, in collaboration with the Noblesville Education Foundation, has named Amanda Thorner their Teacher of the Year for 2016. Thorner, who has taught at Noblesville since 2004, is a Special Education Resource Teacher at Noble Crossing Elementary and was chosen from approximately 650 teachers across the district.

"Amanda is a master at targeting students' specific learning needs, identifying the issues and addressing them," said Pat Haney, principal of Noble Crossing Elementary. "When she takes a child under her wing, there is phenomenal growth to close any academic gaps they may have."

Thorner's accomplishments include:

- Creating unique opportunities for students far below grade level that have significantly reduced their learning deficits
- Serving as a district leader on special education issues

- Mastering the use of student data to best address needs and monitor progress
- Exhibiting a passion for building and maintaining relationships with students and their parents
- Launching co-teaching at Noblesville Schools (with fellow Noble Crossing teacher Gina Mertens), furthering the collaboration between special education and general education instruction
- Driving her own professional development by constantly researching and implementing new, successful teaching strategies

Teachers were nominated for the award and a district review committee ultimately selected Thorner. The criteria for consideration required that a teacher have at least five years of experience at Noblesville Schools and strongly demonstrate:



tial Special Census later this summer to update the City's population count. This will give Carmel greater access to tax dollars distributed according to population. The city could receive as much as \$2.4 million in additional revenue between now and when Carmel would receive updated revenue amounts from the next census. This additional revenue will be used for road improvements, infrastructure and other projects that enhance our daily lives.

As this is a partial Special Census, only those areas with significant growth in the past few years will be counted. The Census will be conducted by workers who go door to door in these areas; they will ask only a few questions of each household. The Cenidentifies specific individuals or house-

Carmel will need about 275 applicants for temporary employment to complete the Census. There are openings for enumerators (those who go door to door to gather information), crew leaders (who are in charge of groups of enumerators) and cleriby enumerators). The pay rates are \$13.74 you are notified when testing begins.

The City of Carmel will conduct a par- for enumerators, \$15.24 for crew leaders and \$10.74 for clerical staff. All Census employees will be required to take a written test for basic knowledge and skills, pass a background check and attend a paid threeday training session. Mileage will also be paid for those who work in the field.

All applicants must be U.S. citizens and 18 years of age (16- and 17-year olds may be hired for clerical positions if they meet state employment requirements). Enumerators need to be available days, weekends and evenings, but will generally have flexibility to choose which hours to work during productive time periods. All employees are expected to work a minimum of 25 hours each week and a maximum of 40 hours. Jobs will last 3-5 weeks on average. 






Fishers opened its three game series with Westfield with an impressive 8-4 victory on Wednesday evening.


The Tigers were led by Caleb Brenczewski with four RBIs. He finished 2-for-3 with a three-run home run, a double and an RBI sacrifice fly.
