Mayors participate at OneZone Luncheon

The mayors of Hamilton County's four cities spoke at the May OneZone Luncheon Wednesday at the FORUM Conference Center in Fishers. The mayors were asked questions on a variety of topics. Here are the answers that Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear gave to his questions.

1) What is one bold leadership move you have made in your city?

Transforming 146th Street from a two-lane road to a main east/west traffic artery. The city had our corporate campus already designated but we had no way to get to it. After one meeting with INDOT, the county, Simons and other stakeholders, we are able to enlarge I-69 to six lanes and create a plan to expand 146th Street to what it is today. This assisted with the creation of Hamilton Town Center, which has been a major retail success.

2) Each of you recognizes the role of creating a sense of place for your community. What challenges does that present for you?

Despite our city’s growth to nearly 60,000 residents, one aspect of Noblesville that our community members constantly remark about is its “small-town feel.” As we continue to grow, the biggest challenge is making every resident feel included and a part of our community. We want those that live miles away from Downtown to feel just as a part of our city as those that are a stone’s throw from it.

Noblesville Schools’ Teacher of the Year:

Noble Crossing’s Amanda Thorner

Noblesville Schools, in collaboration with the Noblesville Education Foundation, has named Amanda Thorner their Teacher of the Year for 2016. Thorner, who has taught at Noblesville since 2004, is a Special Education Resource Teacher at Noble Crossing Elementary and was chosen from approximately 650 teachers across the district.

“Amanda is a master at targeting students’ specific learning needs, identifying the issues and addressing them,” said Pat Haney, principal of Noble Crossing Elementary. “When she takes a child under her wing, there is phenomenal growth to close any academic gaps they may have.”

Thorner’s accomplishments include:

- Creating unique opportunities for students far below grade level that have significantly reduced their learning deficits
- Serving as a district leader on special education issues

- Mastering the use of student data to best address needs and monitor progress
 - Exhibiting a passion for building and maintaining relationships with students and their parents
 - Launching co-teaching at Noblesville Schools (with fellow Noble Crossing teacher Gina Mertens), furthering the collaboration between special education and general education instruction
 - Driving her own professional development by constantly researching and implementing new, successful teaching strategies
- Teachers were nominated for the award and a district review committee ultimately selected Thorner. The criteria for consideration required that a teacher have at least five years of experience at Noblesville Schools and strongly demonstrate:

3) What is the biggest challenge or opportunity for your community in the legislature next year and how can One-Zone assist?

** The threat of not having TIF. Because of property tax caps, the increment is needed. We should band together to have TIF controlled locally and not by the legislature.*

4) Looking at our region, what type of regional cooperation do you believe would be most beneficial to your city and Hamilton County?

** I believe we cooperate well together locally – especially here in Hamilton County. At the regional level, the Central Indiana Council of Elected Officials also provides a cooperative place to share ideas and discuss issues. From talks we’ve heard, Hamilton County is lucky we have a 1-party system so decisions are based on the best interests of the city and its residents and not on party lines.*

5) With employment in Hamilton County around 3-3.5%, what challenges does that present for your community and how does housing and transit fit into those challenges?

**Noblesville has plenty of affordable housing available in the city. The hardest part of low employment is the workforce. One way our community is addressing that is through NoblesvilleWORKS, a soft skill initiative that is focused on grade school children through business professionals. Workforce development is a key issue we are addressing and constantly working on.*

6) The state does not have sufficient funding in place to meet their long-term infrastructure needs. What are your

thoughts on how they should address this gap?

** As a lifelong Republican it’s hard for me to say this, but one idea is to create a gas tax. It is a user tax so those they use the roadways and deteriorate the infrastructure help pay to maintain through a vehicle necessity. We are used to seeing gas prices change 8 to 10 cents daily so a small tax would go largely unnoticed. Indiana is the Crossroads of America and all of our visitors traveling across the state would assist in paying for it as well.*

7) Hamilton County is an impressive business engine. What threats do you see to our continued success? What keeps you up at night?

** I believe the biggest threat to our county is infighting amongst county leaders and a theological shift from all of us working together to better not only our city but our neighbors as well.*





Carmel hiring for partial special census

The City of Carmel will conduct a partial Special Census later this summer to update the City’s population count. This will give Carmel greater access to tax dollars distributed according to population. The city could receive as much as \$2.4 million in additional revenue between now and when Carmel would receive updated revenue amounts from the next census. This additional revenue will be used for road improvements, infrastructure and other projects that enhance our daily lives.

As this is a partial Special Census, only those areas with significant growth in the past few years will be counted. The Census will be conducted by workers who go door to door in these areas; they will ask only a few questions of each household. The Census Bureau never releases information that identifies specific individuals or households.

Carmel will need about 275 applicants for temporary employment to complete the Census. There are openings for enumerators (those who go door to door to gather information), crew leaders (who are in charge of groups of enumerators) and clerical staff (who track information collected by enumerators). The pay rates are \$13.74

for enumerators, \$15.24 for crew leaders and \$10.74 for clerical staff. All Census employees will be required to take a written test for basic knowledge and skills, pass a background check and attend a paid three-day training session. Mileage will also be paid for those who work in the field.

All applicants must be U.S. citizens and 18 years of age (16- and 17-year olds may be hired for clerical positions if they meet state employment requirements). Enumerators need to be available days, weekends and evenings, but will generally have flexibility to choose which hours to work during productive time periods. All employees are expected to work a minimum of 25 hours each week and a maximum of 40 hours. Jobs will last 3-5 weeks on average. Enumerators and crew leaders must have a valid driver’s license and access to a reliable vehicle.

HCC girls meet delayed again

The Hoosier Crossroads Conference girls track and field meet will stretch into a third day, as lightning interrupted the meet as it took place Wednesday at Avon.

Seven events remain to be complete at the meet, which was originally postponed from Tuesday after threatening weather pushed it back a day. The meet is scheduled to resume at 6 p.m. tonight, again at Avon.

Hamilton Southeastern is in front in the team standings so far, with 83 points, well ahead of the host Orioles' 62. The Royals have already picked up five wins, with Mia Mackenzie sweeping the 100 and 300 hurdles, Camille Christopher getting a victory in the 100 dash, Natalie McDaniel winning the pole vault, and HSE's 4x100 relay team taking that race as well.

Noblesville has two event wins so far. Maria Anderson finished first in the 400 dash, while the Millers' 4x800 relay opened the meet with a victory there.

Westfield was runner up in the 4x800 relay, while Fishers placed second in the 4x100.

Team scores (through all events completed): Hamilton Southeastern 83, Avon 62, Zionsville 56, Westfield 44, Fishers 40, Noblesville 33, Brownsburg 25.
