## Arrests made in **Gray Road** construction vandalism

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Of-



fice arrested two individuals connection with a case of extensive criminal mischief at a home under construction.

Deputies were first called to the new home con-

struction site in the 16300 block of Gray Road in March when the

construction contractor discovered damage done inside the home. More vandalism occurred later in the spring with a total estimated damage of more than \$50,000 occurring. Vandalism included damage to walls, cabinets, and flooring as well damage to construction equipment.

Arrested in the case was Timothy Austin Moore, age 18 of Westfield. Moore was initially charged with Burglary, a Level 5 Felony, and Criminal Mischief, a Level 6 Felony. Moore was booked into the Hamilton County Jail on May 10, 2016 and was released later on a \$15,000 bond.

Also arrested and charged with burglary and criminal mischief in connection with the case was a 16 year old juvenile male. Names of juvenile suspects are not released.

Charges are merely accusations and all person are innocent unless found guilty in a court of law. This case has been sent to the Hamilton County Prosecutor's Office and any requests for additional information should be forwarded to that office.

Investigators are appreciative of the partnership with the public as solving the case was assisted by several citizens who came forward with information concerning the vandalism.



Nate will be leaving his work in Hamilton County soon, although his work is far from complete. Nate in an open letter encouraged a long term view and suggested that a comprehensive strategy is needed in Hamilton County considering affordable housing. He leaves still with his heart in his work. Nate has called for a Hamilton County Trust Fund to be created to keep the vision in place for the future. Nate also said, "Hamilton County could start a program to help teachers, firefighters and police officers purchase housing in the communities in which they serve. I urge you to get involved and pledge your support and contribute real solutions to the cause".

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

Robert "Bob" Cusack passed away Wednesday, May 11, 2016 at Riverview Hospital in Noblesville at the age of 95. He was born on April 4,



1921 to Walter and Helen Cusack in Indianapolis, Indiana. A veteran of WWII, Dr. Cusack served as a combat

medic in the 86th Infantry Division in the European Theater. He was awarded a Bronze Star. In the immediate post-war months, his division served in the Philippines. Dr. Cusack graduated from Park Preparatory School and continued his education at Indiana University in the School of Medicine, receiving his MD degree in 1949. Upon moving to California in 1952, he practiced family medicine in San Fernando Valley for seven years before joining and becoming a partner in Southern California Kaiser-Permanente Medical Group, retiring in 1984. He and his wife, Valerie, moved to Pismo Beach in 1989, and have resided in Noblesville since 2015.

Dr. Cusack is survived by his wife of 63 years, Valerie G. Cusack of Noblesville; sister, Helen Turk of Florida; daughter, Carla Bowman (husband Bill) of Noblesville; four grandchildren, Teresa, Jenni, Christy, and Scott; and thirteen great-grandchildren. 
## 50 Years Ago




