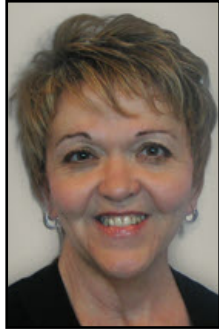

Hamilton County history...

Women in local politics

Editor's Note: The following is a second part to the "GOP, a local tradition." The story, written by Fred Swift, appeared in the Noblesville's Daily Ledger's 100th anniversary section on Sept. 29, 1988.

The only Democrat to hold countywide office in recent history was Charles W. Ardery Jr., then a young Noblesville attorney who was elected Circuit Court Judge in 1958. He served until 1964 and did not run for reelection.

Ardery's surprising win is still regarded as something of a "mission impossible." The victory is generally credited to a helpful Democratic trend that year which somewhat reduced the GOP margins. Ardery's opponent was not regarded as a powerful force within the party. And Ardery had many Republican friends through civic activities who assisted his bid for office.

One of the most unusual political events in Noblesville occurred in 1958 when the city had four mayors in a period of 46 days.

The chain of events that led to this situation began on March 30, 1958 when two-term major Herman Lawson died in office. The city council named Gordon Olvey to succeed him. On May 1 Olvey died in office. He was succeeded by Charles Merideth, who actually served as a mayor pro-tem until May 16 when Ledger publisher John Neal was named by the council to fill out the unexpired term that ran until Dec. 31, 1959

Noblesville teenager arrested on vehicle break-in attempts

A Noblesville teenager was arrested early Saturday morning after attempting to break into motor vehicles.

At approximately 12:06 a.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to the 900 block of Maple Avenue in response to a report of a suspicious subject possibly breaking into vehicles. Officers arrived on the scene a short time later and began to investigate.

Initial information from the caller alleges that a subject had been observed walking around in the area trying to open doors on parked vehicles. The subject was described as a male, 6 feet tall, approximately 180 pounds, wearing a red/orange hooded sweatshirt, gray sweatpants, and a ball cap.

Officers began to search the area for the subject by utilizing motor and foot patrols. At approximately 12:20 a.m., officers on foot patrol located an individual matching the description of the subject in the 900 block of Hannibal Street. Officers indicated that the subject was partially inside a 2008 Jeep Wrangler when they attempted to make contact with him. Officers reported

that a short foot chase ensued before the subject was taken into custody.

The subject, Justin T. Hadley, 18, Noblesville, was later transported by ambulance to Riverview Health (Noblesville) where he was treated for injuries sustained during the arrest process. He was later released and transported to the Hamilton County Jail and booked on a number of preliminary charges:

Three counts of Theft, a Class A Misdemeanor, three counts of Unlawful Entry into Vehicle, a Class B Misdemeanor; Resisting Law Enforcement, a Class A Misdemeanor and Illegal Consumption of Alcohol, a Class C Misdemeanor.

This remains an ongoing investigation.

The next mayor, Dale Hanshew, also died in office, on July 27, 1963. Neal was again appointed to fill out the unexpired term that ran through Dec. 31, 1963.

Noblesville’s twenty-third mayor since Edgar C. Wilson was elected on May 18, 1887, certainly is noteworthy. Robert Wical, a Democrat, defeated Mayor Max E. Robinson.

The reason for the political composition of Hamilton County over the years is regarded to be the traditional conservative, rural Republicans combined with the influx of Republican suburbanites in the past 35 years. The absence of a large number of industrial workers and ethnic minorities has assured to have contributed to what most has been a three to one GOP majority.

During the past 15 years, probably the major change in local politics has involved the success of women seeking elected office. This change from a male-dominated monopoly on public offices such as county recorder and city clerk-treasurer were considered a woman’s domain. There were very few exceptions.

In the past decade, however, women have taken over such major offices as mayor in both Noblesville and Carmel. They have taken many county offices including

county auditor, treasurer, clerk and assessor and most recently (in 1986) a woman, Peg Goldberg, was elected County Commissioner.

From a partisan point of view, the success of women has involved almost exclusively Republicans, but that is large because the GOP continues its dominance in the county.

Democrats remain vastly outnumbered and continue, perhaps even more than in the past, to let elected offices go by default. Fifteen years ago the Republicans were deeply divided into two factions. While there may still be factions (realigned somewhat from the past) they are not so well defined and disputes are mostly confined to internal party matters rather than being visible in pen disputes between public officials

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

Four county students named...

Lilly Endowment Community Scholars

Four Hamilton County students were named as Lilly Endowment Community Scholars. The prestigious scholarship provides full tuition for four years of study at an Indiana college or university. The students are Emma Derouin of Westfield, Grace Dittoe of Cathedral, Sarah Knight of Noblesville and Alexis Smith of Sheridan. A total of 29 Hamilton County students were interviewed for the scholarships, which stipulated that recipients must: be a resident of Hamilton County; plan to pursue a full-time baccalaureate course of study beginning in the fall of 2016 at a public or private college or university in Indiana; demonstrate an unweighted GPA of at least 3.0; demonstrate financial need; demonstrate leadership or initiative in their school or community; and promise to, upon graduation, give back to the community.

Each student was nominated by his/her guidance counselor before being invited to complete an application and interview with Legacy Fund, a Central Indiana Community Foundation affiliate serving Hamilton County. Following the application and interview process, the finalists' names were submitted to Independent Colleges of Indiana, Inc. for final approval. The scholarship covers full tuition, required fees and a book stipend of \$900 per year for four years. A total of 142 scholarships were awarded in Indiana and are the result of a statewide Lilly Endowment initiative to help Hoosier students reach higher levels of education.

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Exactly what is a public record, and who has the right of access?

The Reporter asked local attorney Raymond Adler, senior partner in the law firm of Adler Tesnar & Whalin and former Hamilton County attorney to discuss Township public records. He currently represents White River Township and has had experience representing several governmental entities.

Please consult with an attorney concerning any specific fact situation as the following is only general statement of law. Any opinions expressed are those of the author.

It is the public policy of the state of Indiana to be open and transparent in the conducting of public business. Townships are subject to the Open Records Act and it is the Township trustee's duty to make township records available.

Except for certain executive sessions described below, all meetings of the governing bodies must be open at all times for members of the public to observe and record them. A secret ballot vote may not be taken.

A governing body utilizing an agenda shall post a copy of the agenda at the entrance to the meeting prior to the meeting. Final action adopted by reference to agenda item alone is void.

As the meeting progresses, the following memoranda shall be kept:

- (1) The date, time, and place of the meeting.
- (2) The members of the governing body present or absent.
- (3) The general substance of all matters proposed, discussed, or decided.
- (4) A record of all votes taken by individual members if there is a roll call.

The memoranda are to be available within a reasonable period of time after the meeting to inform the public of the governing body's proceedings. The minutes, if any, are to be open for public inspection and copying.

Public notice of the date, time, and place of any meetings, executive sessions, or of any rescheduled meeting, shall be given at least 48 hours (excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays) before the meeting. This requirement does not apply to reconvened meetings where the date, time, and place of the reconvened meeting is made at the original meeting and recorded in the minutes, and there is no change in the agenda.

Public notice shall be given by posting a copy at the principal office or, if no such office exists, at the building where the meeting is to be held.

The governing body shall give public notice to all news media which deliver an annual written request. The governing body shall give notice by United States mail with

postage prepaid; electronic mail, if the public agency has the capacity to transmit electronic mail or by facsimile (fax).

Notice of regular meetings need be given only once each year. An additional notice shall be given where the date, time, or place of a regular meeting is changed. This does not apply to executive sessions.

If a meeting is called to deal with an emergency involving actual or threatened injury to person or property, or disruption of the governmental activity then the time requirements do not apply. News media must be given the same notice as is given to the members of the governing body; and the public must be notified by posting a copy of the notice.

Notice has not been given if a meeting is started at a time so unreasonably departing from the time stated in its public notice that the public is misled or substantially deprived of the opportunity to attend, observe, and record the meeting.

Executive sessions generally may be held only for discussion of strategy with respect to collective bargaining; litigation; the implementation of security systems; or the purchase or lease of real property; to interview prospective employees; to receive information concerning the individual's alleged misconduct; and discuss, before a determination, the individual's status; discussion of records classified as confidential by state or federal statute; to discuss a job performance evaluation of individual employees; to respond to the threat of terrorism.

A final action must be taken at a meeting open to the public.

Public notice of executive sessions must state the subject matter by specific reference to the reason executive sessions may be held. A governing body may not conduct an executive session during a meeting. A meeting may not be recessed and reconvened with the intent of circumventing the rules.

Any officer who with the specific intent to violate the law fails to give proper notice; takes final action outside a meeting; participates in a secret ballot; discusses in an executive session subjects not eligible for discussion in an executive session; or fails to prepare a memorandum of a meeting is subject to a civil penalty.

A court may not impose a civil penalty unless the public access counselor has issued an advisory opinion:

- (1) to the complainant and the public agency;
- (2) that finds that the individual or public agency violated this chapter; and
- (3) before the action is filed.

Nothing in this section prevents both the complainant and the public agency from requesting an advisory opinion from the public access counselor.

The fines may not be more than one hundred dollars (\$100) for the first violation or more than five hundred dollars (\$500) for each additional violation.

More views on the primary election

The primary election for the county offices had some interesting twist and turns this year. It was especially interesting to observe the Commissioner and Council race.

Incumbent Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt defeated challenger Bill Smythe in the 60 to 40 percent range. That victory wasn't a surprise to long time political observers. Heirbrandt was one of the leaders who had led the effort to get the \$100 million from the State in order to do the State Road 37 project. Smythe had tried to organize the businesses along 37 to oppose the project. Personally, I think he underestimated all the folks who sit in the 37 traffic, both in the morning and then again in the evening, wondering when their government leaders would do something about 37.

I also think it was a mistake for the Smythe campaign to attack Heirbrandt's integrity. I have worked with Mark for a little over three years now and I can assure you, I don't know of a more honest, hard working public official than Mark Heirbrandt.

Political observers also were quite interested in who was running with whom.

It appeared that Heirbrandt was very much supporting the two new comers in the County Council race. Fishers long time Police Chief George Keil and Fall Township Trustee Jeff Hern, both were vying for positions on the three seats that were up on the County Council. On the other side, it appeared Smythe was teaming with the two incumbent Councilors Brad Beaver and Rick McKinney. One of the big issues there was the proposed County Police and Fireman Training Center. Both Beaver and McKinney voted against the training center last year and Smythe lobbied against it as well. Heirbrandt heavily supported the center and Kiel and Hern both tried to get the supporting votes.

Another interesting issue was McKinney had accused Hern of vandalizing his political signs, after finding Hern's cell phone at the site. This created an investigation from the Sheriff's Department and now is the hands of a special prosecutor.

The television news coverage of the event gave both candidates name recognition that neither would have had the campaign funds to afford. Both were elected, along with Beaver barely beating out Kiel.

The big question now, will be how the three commissioners and the two re-elected county councilors put their differences aside and do the right things for the right reasons and continue to make Hamilton County the number one county in the state.

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Leading 14 laps, tying career-best IndyCar finish...

Daly finishes sixth at Grand Prix

Having been around auto racing since he was born, Conor Daly got a chance to do something many dream of on Saturday.

Lead a lap at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

In fact, he led 14 laps at the Angie's List Grand Prix of Indianapolis. Daly, a Noblesville native, jumped from the back of the pack to pace the field during the middle stages of the race. He eventually finished sixth, but that ties his career-best IndyCar finish, and was a huge confidence booster for the big race - the Indianapolis 500 - which is now just two weeks away.

"Just a nice place to kind of turn up our season a little bit and it felt really nice," said Daly. "It's my hometown, love everything about this place and this track. And to lead here is something that's really special to me. I really enjoyed it."

Driving the No. 18 Jonathan Byrd's Hospitality car for Dale Coyne Racing, Daly started 22nd in the 25-car field. But he started quietly moving up the grid, reaching the 13th position by Lap 23. He moved back down to 17th by Lap 37, but the yellow flag intervened.

The caution came out after Sebastien Bourdais, already down a bunch of laps after an opening-lap incident with Tony Kanaan, stalled on the track. With the race in yellow mode, several drivers headed into pit lane.

Suddenly, Daly was up to fifth place, then second place behind Helio Castroneves in Lap 41. The race ran five more laps under yellow, with Daly raring to go at the three-time Indy 500 champ.

Daly made his move once the race went green on Lap 46, wasting no time in passing Castroneves. That gave him the lead on his hometown track.

"That was one of the biggest moments of my life, I think," said Daly. "I knew I could get him, I knew I had to get him if I was going to stay in contention. And sure enough, we did that, pulled away and gave ourselves a bit of a gap and that was that."

Daly got stronger as he held the lead, at one point leading by 3.37 seconds. He eventually had to pit, doing so in Lap 60. While that forced him to relinquish first place and fall back to 12th, he was out of the pits in 7.9 seconds.

Daly worked his way back up to third by Lap 65, before his friend James Hinchcliff passed him for that position on Lap 70. Daly was in sixth by Lap 79, but held on for the sixth spot.

"Starting in the back, we had to get a little lucky, and today we did," said Daly. "We got the strategy, but we were able to deliver when we got there, because our car is good, and we are continuing to develop the car, and it is getting better. To get up there, to fight at the front, is what we want to do and, sure, it took a little luck today, but we hope to be able to keep demonstrating that as we go."

By taking the sixth spot, Daly matched his finish at last year's Chevrolet Detroit Belle Isle Grand Prix. He was a replacement for Hinchcliff, who suffered a terrible crash at the Speedway last year. Daly got a full-time ride with Dale Coyne Racing for the 2016 IndyCar season, and has been getting solid results, tying for 13th at the Grand Prix races in St. Petersburg and Long Beach.

Next up is the 500, which ended in a disappointing fashion for Daly last year, as he suffered engine problems and had to quit before the green flag dropped.

"The oval is a totally different world, totally different program," said Daly. "We'll have to see what happens on Monday."

Another Noblesville racing star, Bryan Clauson, also plans to give the 500 another try. Clauson, who has won over 70 races on the USAC circuit, is coming off a Friday night win at the Plymouth Speedway, and is "Chasing 200," - trying to race in 200 events in the year 2016. As of Saturday night, Clauson is at 55 races and counting.

The Angie's List Grand Prix was won by Simon Pagenaud, who has been the hot-

test racer on the IndyCar circuit this year. The win at Indy was the third in a row for Pagenaud, and the second time he's won the Angie's List race, having taken the checkered flag for the inaugural 2014 race.

"The car was fantastic once again," said Pagenaud. "The balance was perfect all race. When we were in the lead, we were cruising ... obviously we had a great last pit stop, too."

Castroneves finished second, while Hinchcliff held on to third place. While he said that "99 percent" of making his comeback after his crash was done when he got back into a race car in September, it was meaningful to get back on the track at Indy.

"For me, it's over and done with," said Hinchcliff of the accident. "It's in the past and so far the present's working out pretty well."

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
