Pence appears at county political rally

Here are just a few brief news items of interest coming to our attention this week:



Gov. Mike Pence appeared in the county political rally on Saturday at the Pence regional campaign headquarters, 11711 Pennsylvania. Also there was Todd Young, former Carmel resident, who is running for U.S. Senate. Pete Peterson, who served briefly as county GOP chairman, and now Pence campaign co-coordinator for Hamilton County, was present to accept praise from Pence.

Hamilton County deputy prosecutors were cleared last week by the state Disciplinary Commission of misconduct allegations in the handling of a local drug bust two years ago. Andrew Dollard who filed the complaint is also suing the Current Publishing Company for damages he says he suffered from its false portrayal of his part in the scheme. Dollard has been cleared of all charges brought by the prosecutor's office. The local attorney, is back in the county after moving to Florida for a year because of loss of business in his law practice.

The Noblesville Parks Department summer concert series starts June 2 at the Dr. James Dillon Park on 146th Street east of Hazel Dell Road. The popular series continues with performances June 9, 16, 23 and 30, then moves to Forest Park on July 14 and 28.

A new book entitled *Legendary Locals of Carmel* will be found in area bookstores on June 6. It was written by Debra Haskett May, lifelong Carmel resident and fifth generation member of her family in Hamilton County. The book with 155 photos, provides information on dozens of the community's influential residents.

Voter registration opens again on May 17 for those who wish to vote in the November election but may not have gotten registered in time for the primary. Registration can be completed at county license branches or at the county elections office in the Government and Judicial Center in Noblesville.

Carmel men arrested after attempted robbery

Two Carmel men were arrested for an attempted armed robbery Monday night.

At around 10:40 p.m., Carmel Police responded to an attempted armed robbery in the parking lot of 434 South Range Line Road.

According to police reports, two white male suspects approached a group of five white male victims who were walking in the 200 block of 2nd Street SW. The suspects followed the victims east on 3rd Street SW towards Range Line Road. As the victims walked in the parking lot of 434 S. Range Line Road, the first suspect displayed a handgun

Cicero Friends of the Park to Host Chili Cook Off

The Cicero Friends of the Park will be hosting their annual Chili Cook off on Saturday, May 21st at Red Bridge Park. Proceeds from the event will go to further their mission of providing for recreational and equipment needs for Cicero Parks in Northern Hamilton County, Indiana. A few of the projects Cicero Friends of the Park has previously funded includes \$35,000.00 of new universal playground equipment for Community Park, 3 concerts during the summer, annual "Kids Go Fishing Day", E Concerts during the summer that are free to the public, and new handicap accessible swings.


There will be two divisions to compete in: Homestyle and State Competition. NFD receives American Heart Association's Mission: Lifeline EMS recognition award

The Noblesville Fire Department has received the American Heart Association's Mission: Lifeline® EMS Silver Award for implementing quality improvement measures for the treatment of patients who experience severe heart attacks.

"The Noblesville Fire Department is dedicated to making our service among the best in the country, and the American Heart Association's Mission: Lifeline program is helping us accomplish that by implementing processes for improving systems of care with the goal of improving the quality of care for all acute coronary syndrome patients," Noblesville Fire Department EMS Chief James Macky said. "We are pleased to be recognized for our dedication and achievements in emergency medical care for all cardiac patients."

Every year, more than 250,000 people experience an ST elevation myocardial infarction (STEMI) the most deadly type of heart attack caused by a blockage of blood flow to the heart that requires timely treatment. To prevent death, it's critical to restore blood flow as quickly as possible, either by mechanically opening the blocked vessel or by providing clot-busting medication.

Unfortunately, a significant number of STEMI patients don't receive this prompt reperfusion therapy, which is critical in restoring blood flow. Mission: Lifeline seeks to save lives by closing the gaps that separate these patients from timely access to appropriate treatments. Mission: Lifeline's EMS recognition program recognizes emergency medical services for their efforts in improving systems of care and improving the quality of life for these patients.

Emergency Medical System providers are vital to the success of Mission: Lifeline. EMS agencies perform 12-lead ECGs which measure the electrical activity of the heart and can help determine if a heart

attack has occurred. They also follow protocols derived from American Heart Association/American College of Cardiology guidelines. These correct tools, training, and practices allow EMS providers to rapidly identify suspected heart attack patients, promptly notify the medical center, and trigger an early response from the awaiting hospital personnel. Agencies that receive the Mission: Lifeline Silver award have demonstrated at least 75 percent compliance for each required achievement measure for one year.

"EMTs and paramedics play a vital part in the system of care for those who have heart attacks," said James Jollis, M.D., Chair of the Mission: Lifeline Advisory Working Group. "Since they often are the first medical point of contact, they can shave precious minutes of life-saving treatment time by activating the emergency response system that alerts hospitals. We applaud the Noblesville Fire Department for achieving this award that shows it meets evidence-based guidelines in the treatment of people who have severe heart attacks."

Westfield plans time capsule ceremony for June 11

Westfield's Grand Park will be the home to a different kind of event in June, as the community plans to bury a time capsule at the sports campus.

The time capsule will contain items from community organizations, businesses and other groups, and is being buried in conjunction with the state's bicentennial year and the opening of the Grand Park Events Center.

"We want to preserve a piece of Westfield for future residents to look back on," Mayor Andy Cook said. "As Westfield continues to grow, and as Grand Park becomes more of a feature in our community, it's important to take account of where we are today and think about where we will be years from now."

A special website, www.westfieldtimecapsule.org, was created by Westfield High School students Alicia Silhavy, Jordan Loeser and Trevor Crupi. The site is designed to help members of the public contribute to the project.

"Web development is very enjoyable for us," Crupi said. "It was a really fun website to contribute to and I'm happy I got to work on something to help the community I have grown up in."

Residents can submit photos and "messages to the future" by visiting the site and either typing a letter or uploading scanned images or photos. These items will then be considered for inclusion in the time capsule.

The time capsule ceremony will occur half-way to Indiana's Bicentennial date, on Saturday June 11 at 10:00 a.m. at Grand Park.

Smythe responds to Dillinger column

Mr. Dillinger writes some interesting spin. I understand that to the victor goes some spoils. You can have your own opinions, but not your own facts. In the interest of some facts, I present the following:

Firstly, I did not lobby against the fire training center. It wasn't on my radar, going into the campaign. There were three reasons for my run for office, which were stated and repeated with vigor.

1) I was opposed to the way the commissioners and the mayors rushed the 37 project forward with little to no communication with the business community. Nothing has transpired since to change my opinion in this matter. The degree with which I challenged Mr. Heirbrandt's integrity followed from what was reported in the media regarding his emails in St Joe's county. You failed to report on this. Thank you though, for covering my concession so carefully.

2) I was offended by Mr. Dillinger's comments at the January state of the county address when he personally called out 4 county councilors because they had the temerity to oppose the fire training center. Where he is correct is that I aligned with McKinney and Beaver, in as much as they were being targeted by the commissioners for replacement, and they are true conservatives, while Dillinger and Heirbrandt are not. My entering the race forced the commissioners and their vendor allies to expend most of their resources holding serve as they gained no more supporters for this project and likely poisoned the well for future cooperation by actively attacking those two. You can check any of my campaign material and note that I clearly felt that "stacking" the council was the commissioners' intent.

3) I was motivated to enter the race to push back against what I see as a powerful few, that included the former GOP county chair, and his effort to fix the election for a new county chair with his (eventually overturned) last minute appointments. I have had a long history of disagreement with the establishment and their strong armed tactics as they brow beat (even in victory) and try to intimidate opposition supporters . They did it in the 2014

council race and Mr. Dillinger himself was back at it on Wednesday May 4th walking unannounced into a car dealership on Hwy 37 to express his disappointment that they supported my effort.

Mr. Dillinger can gloss over the reality that nearly 26,000 people in this county supported my last minute campaign as confirmation their power is still intact. He can pretend that Mr. Heirbrandt won something of a mandate, but the facts are that he lost the area he represents. Fall Creek township specifically and Fishers collectively was won by Bill Smythe. This is typical, though. When Mr. Dillinger was challenged in primaries in the past, he too lost the area he represents, relying upon the countywide nature of the vote to pull him through. As it stands, no previously successful commissioner had ever garnered more than 20,000 votes in a primary win. More importantly, they were unsuccessful in changing the makeup of the council into a rubber stamp, and have as their singular achievement, helped elect a candidate that likely will be charged with theft and face trial before the November general election.

After nearly 3 decades in office Mr. Dillinger's opinion should be respected, but as stated above , he doesn't own his set of facts. Mr. Heirbrandt ran a vigorous campaign and was the clear victor as measured vs Bill Smythe but there was much more at stake and in that regard, I think a clear message was delivered. Looking forward to 2018.

Regarding the Mayor's Forum

Last week I attended a Chamber of Commerce luncheon in Fishers that featured the four Hamilton County mayors. It was a friendly crowd and the moderator tossed softball questions, so there wasn't much newsworthy content there. And, I would have been willing to just pass it off as so much happy talk if our mayor hadn't chosen to repeat his answers in the next day's newspaper. I'm sorry but I can't let this go unchallenged.

In case you missed it, the very first question asked the mayors to name a bold leadership move they had made for their city. Our mayor's answer was that he had widened 146th Street to four lanes. You heard that right: under this administration a nine-year-old project to extend a road a few extra miles and connect the interstate to the city serves as a bold move. And the mayor's proud enough of it that he repeated it in the newspaper the next day.

A quick review of the 146th Street extension project: It happened in 2007, was a partnership between the city and the county, was made necessary by the presence of the

Corporate Campus, a soon to open mall and an interstate highway, all of which were initiated under previous administrations or the private sector. There was absolutely nothing bold about the project. No vision, no leadership, no political capital expended. It was a routine public project that is more accurately called followership, as opposed to leadership.

At the same meeting we were treated to some of our peers' ideas: roundabouts, Grand Park, Fishers' new downtown, the Palladium. It's frustrating watching other communities advance while we seem to be stagnating, and even losing ground.

I have presented ideas in the past to help chart a new course for Noblesville. This episode has inspired me to speak up again. We must hold our city leaders accountable and if our mayor continues to cite a nine-year-old road project as the best we can do, I say it's time we hold ourselves to a higher standard.

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Sobriety checkpoint May 19 and 20

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership will conduct a sobriety checkpoint on the night of Thursday, May 19 and early morning of Friday, May 20.

At a sobriety checkpoint, law enforcement officers evaluate drivers for signs of alcohol or drug impairment at a specified point along the roadway, often depending upon the support of local property owners for the use of appropriate land. Checkpoint sites are selected based upon analysis of available crash and impaired driving arrest data and a consideration of officer safety.

Vehicles are stopped in a specific sequence, such as every other vehicle, every third vehicle, every fourth vehicle or by stopping three, four, or five cars in succession and allowing other traffic to proceed while checking the stopped vehicles. The planned sequence in which vehicles are stopped depends on the number of officers available to staff the checkpoint, traffic congestion, and other safety concerns.

Upon making contact with the driver, the officer advises them that they've been stopped at an HCTSP sobriety checkpoint

and asks for the driver's license and the vehicle's registration. If, in the course of the contact, the officer detects that alcohol may be involved and that the driver may be impaired or if some other issue arises, then the vehicle is directed into a pull-off area for further investigation. Further investigation may involve the Standardized Field Sobriety Tests (SFSTs).

On the other hand, if all looks right during the initial contact, the driver is often on his or her way in less than two minutes.

Officers staffing the sobriety checkpoints work on an overtime basis paid by grant funds from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration through the Indiana Governor's Council on Impaired and Dangerous Driving.

Sobriety checkpoints have proven successful in both raising awareness of impaired driving and reducing the likelihood of a person driving after they have been drinking.

A sobriety checkpoint will be conducted on the night of Thursday, May 19 and early morning of Friday, May 20.

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership (HCTSP) is a consortium of law enforcement agencies in Hamilton County working to increase the usage of seatbelts, to combat aggressive driving, and to decrease impaired driving with the overall goal of creating a safer Hamilton County. The HCTSP is comprised of the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department, Fishers Police Department, Carmel Police Department, Noblesville Police Department, Westfield Police Department, and Cicero Police Department, with the assistance of the Indiana State Police.

Impaired driving is one of our nation's most frequently committed violent crimes. Just in Indiana in 2012, alcohol-related traffic crashes killed 158 people (up from 140 in 2011), accounting for approximately twenty percent of all fatal crashes, and injured another 2,112 people.

About 1000 people are convicted of an impaired driving offense annually in Hamilton County alone, and nearly 200 of those are repeat offenders. In 2012 in Hamilton County, for example, the State filed 1004

charges of operating while intoxicated. Of these, 158 drivers had prior convictions for operating while intoxicated within the last five years.

In order to raise awareness of the prevalence of impaired driving in our community and the efforts of the Partnership to combat the crime, the Partnership maintains a webpage at <http://www.hamiltoncounty.in.gov/topic/?topicid=36&structureid=26>.

Sobriety checkpoints are legal in 39 states, including Indiana, and the District of Columbia. In 1990, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that, if conducted properly, sobriety checkpoints do not constitute an illegal search and seizure. In the 2002 case of State v. Gerschoffer, the Indiana Supreme Court found that sobriety checkpoints are constitutional when conducted properly. Members of the Hamilton County Prosecuting Attorney's Office work with the Partnership to ensure that each checkpoint meets constitutional requirements.

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Girls track and field sectionals...

Royals edge Carmel for team trophy

The Hamilton Southeastern girls track and field team won a close sectional title over Carmel Tuesday at Guerin Catholic. The Royals scored 135.5 points to the Greyhounds' 131; both schools qualified several athletes for next week's regional.

In one of the more thrilling girls track and field sectionals in recent memory, Hamilton Southeastern made it through the rain.

The Royals edged Carmel to claim the Guerin Catholic sectional championship on Tuesday. Southeastern got past the unusually chilly weather and a tough Greyhounds team by 4.5 points, 135.5-131. In addition, HSE also qualified several athletes for next week's West Lafayette regionals, as did the other Hamilton County schools.

"We knew it was going to be very close," said HSE coach Julie Alano.

The Royals' stars came through with victories: Camille Christopher won both the 100 and 200 dashes in new sectional record times, winning the 100 in 12.17 seconds and the 200 in 25.21 seconds. Christopher also was part of HSE's victorious 4x100 relay, along with Alexa Jenkins, Deneen McKinney and hurdles sensation Mia Mackenzie, who triumphed in both the 100 and 300 hurdles.

"I'd like to improve a lot more, but I think I'm doing good," said Christopher.

Other Royal athletes getting top three finishes, and thus automatically qualifying for regionals, were Sydney Encinias (2nd in the long jump), Meghann Cullen (3rd in the 100 hurdles) Valerie Obear (3rd in the discus) and Chelsea Maxey (3rd in the shot put). The top three automatically advance to regionals, followed by the next four best times from the feeder sectionals, which means several other HSE athletes will likely move on to the next level as well.

Carmel got an incredible performance from its 3200 runners. All three ran under the state's three participant standard; bettering this time guarantees advancement to the regional. All three also ran under the old sectional record.

Christina Geisler used a jaw-dropping kick in the last 100 to win the race in 10:35.38, beating out her teammate, reigning individual state cross country champion Sarah Leinheiser. She placed second in 10:37.58, followed by Stacy Morozov, who finished third in 10:39.76.

"We knew they would score 24 points in the two mile," said Alano (10 points for first, eight for runner-up and six for third). "What we said to the girls coming in is that, every place, every event, we could score two people and I think we did - almost - except for one spot."

The Greyhounds also got a win from Natalie Cotherman in the discus. Carmel's other guaranteed regional qualifiers are Kara Deady and Kaila Kolodkin in the pole vault, Stacy Morozov and Rachel Anderson in the 1600, Reagan Hune and Rachel Dixon in the 400 dash, Jessi Cowen in the 300 hurdles, Maddie Dalton in the 800 run and Cailyn Etgen in the long jump, along with the Greyhounds' 4x100 and 4x400 relays.

Fishers placed third with 114 points, with its 4x400 relay team of Paris Carver, Kayla Crose, Destoni Grace and Danielle Harrison picking up a victory there. Also advancing are Harrison in the 100 dash, Kathryn Folta in the 300 hurdles, Carver in the 200, Kaitlyn Thompson in the discus and shot put, Emily Monson in the high jump, and the 4x800 and 4x100 relays.

Westfield was a strong fourth, scoring 81.5 points. Devon Leahy paced the 800 run, winning by over a second, while Jada Caldwell was victorious in the shot put. Emily Robertson advanced to the regional in the 100 hurdles, Karen Hubbard is moving on in the 100 dash, as is Rebecca Pronschinske in the 200 dash and Sydney Spears in the

“Looking at graduation conflicts and potential rain, us, North Central, Southeastern and Westfield will probably all have to use three starters and or bring a starter back on short rest. It can be done, as Southeastern demonstrated last year in their sectional championship

“All of the HCC schools are use to using three starters to get through our conference schedule and I know North Central plays several games each week and need three starters in their rotation, as well,” Cherry concluded.

Carmel and Noblesville, which drew into the bye game, have strong pitching staffs.

“I believe the sectional draw to be fairly even for all the teams,” said Carmel coach Dan Roman. “It really would not matter what the draw is. All teams will earn the sectional title by playing well.”

“Everyone would be happy with a bye, however, we will have our work cut out for us,” said Noblesville coach Justin Keever. “Carmel is a very good team and really put it to us in late April.

“We are honored to host such a great collection of teams and really excited for the challenge ahead of us. It should be a great event and opportunity,” Keever concluded.
