Hamilton County Drug Court celebrates successes

May is National Drug Court month. Hamilton County has a Drug Court and our Drug Court celebrates the month and the court's successes.

Today there are 2,966 drug courts in the United States and its territories, 38 of which are right here in Indiana. Hamilton County's Drug Court began five and a half years ago, in November, 2010. While following Indiana statutes and court rules, our Drug Court unites the legal and treatment resources in our community to intensively supervise and insure treatment for nonviolent and non-dealing drug addicted offenders. This represents real criminal justice re-

Instead of warehousing those offenders in our jail or prisons, where their rehabilitation is difficult to achieve, the 16 professionals who comprise the Hamilton County Drug Court team assist the participants to become drug free, to stop committing crimes, and to stay out of jail. They also help the participants to become responsible. productive members of society, with jobs, good habits, and rebuilt family relationships. The Hamilton County drug court has saved lives, prevented crimes, reunited families, and been responsible for the birth of drug-free baeducation achieved, employment gained and kept.

In addition to the court assisting the participants learn personal responsibility and achieve long-term sobriety, the court promotes public safety and reduces criminal justice costs by using evidence based practices. Research shows that Drug Courts work better than jail or prison, better than community supervision, and better than treatment alone. Nationally, 75 percent of the offenders who complete drug court programs are not re-arrested. At the end of 2015, 81 percent of Hamilton County Drug Court graduates had not re-offended.

Our Hamilton County Drug Court is a judicially supervised court docket which requires participants to remain in treatment for long periods of time, while being closely supervised by the professionals on the drug court team. Drug Court participants must meet obligations to themselves, their families. and society throughout the 18-24 months that they remain, if successful, in Drug Court. To ensure accountability, they are often and randomly tested for substance use, required to meet regularly with their case managers and treatment providers, and appear frequently in court for Judge Bardach to review their progress. They are rewarded for meeting goals, and swiftly sanctioned for not meeting their clearly stated obligations.

Hamilton County, like too many other counties in Indiana and around the

The new location in Noblesville will serve approximately 250,000 guests in its first year.


Community event to celebrate Noblesville IndyCar drivers Monday



City of Noblesville launches new website design

The City of Noblesville's website, www.cityofnoblesville.org, is now live with a new design that users should find cleaner and easier to navigate.

"We thought it's time for a fresh look. I'm very pleased with the way it turned out and how user friendly our website has become," Mayor John Ditslear said.

The new homepage has a similar template to the previous site with drop-down menus at the top. New buttons highlight areas that visitors search for most – including paying bills, meeting agendas, forms, maps, employment opportunities and a place to provide feedback. The site also features social media feeds to the city's Facebook and Twitter accounts alongside news releases and upcoming events. The site is modernized with a responsive design, which changes size to fit any mobile device - iPad, tablet or phone.

country, suffers from increasing numbers of people, young and old, who are addicted to drugs, specifically opioids and alcohol. Sheriff Bowen recently estimated that there has been a 45 percent increase in heroin related deaths in our county and that Hamilton County ranks fourth in the state in the total number of opioid overdoses. Hamilton County also continues to have a substantial problem with individuals operating while intoxicated. Our Drug Court addresses these problems. Ninety-three percent of our Drug Court participants are either heroin addicts or alcoholics with multiple operating while intoxicated convictions.

Our Hamilton County Drug Court team remains committed to using best, evidencebased, practices to engage in real criminal justice reform. The members enthusiastically work with high risk, challenging participants to keep them out of what is otherwise and too often just a revolving door system of offenders entering and reentering our jail and prisons. Judge Bardach and the rest of the team find their very intensive efforts some of the most rewarding work that they do, especially when they can see the successful participants and graduates overcome their many quality of life issues and become law-abiding, contributing members of society and their communities.

The Hamilton County Drug Court anticipates the graduation of four participants on June 13, 2016. The graduation ceremony will take place in Hamilton Superior Court 6 at 12:30 p.m.

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

Methodist Church, 2051 Monument Street, in Noblesville, with Pastor Dick Judson officiating.


