

New station at Market District today...

Carmel opens first Zagster west of U.S. 31

Carmel's Zagster bike-share program is adding a new station this Friday, May 20 at 11 a.m. at Carmel Market District.

Marking the 11th location for the growing program in Carmel, the new Market District station will add six bikes. Carmel declared May as Bike Month, and the ribbon cutting coincides with National Bike to Work Day. Carmel residents and those who work in Carmel are encouraged to bicycle to work.

Carmel launched its bike-share program in April of 2015 as a way to provide active transportation options for local residents, workers and visitors seeking a safe and convenient way to access the City's vibrant developments, parks and corporate corridors. The program started with two stations and 22 bikes and grew to 10 stations with 80 bikes in one year.

Current locations include The Palladium at City Center, Main Street and the Monon, the Clay Township Government Center, the Monon Community Center, Carmel City Hall, SpringHill Suites and Residence Inn, Visit Hamilton County office, Clay Terrace, Allegion and the City of Westfield. The program is expected to continue to grow as more private companies and business parks consider adding new locations to their campuses.

Zagster is known for developing a system that can be easily operated using cell phone technology. The company is a leader in bike-sharing programs for the real estate industry and college campuses across the country, including Purdue University. Under the bikesharing program, users establish their own accounts through Zagster and are then able to rent a bike from one rack and return to it any of the other racks. For users, the bikes cost \$3 an hour to rent with a cap of \$24 for up to a 24-hour period. A \$15 monthly or \$75 annual fee would include unlimited rides under one hour, with additional hours being charged at \$3 an hour to a maximum of \$24 for up to a 24-hour period.

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
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

Permit numbers continue to show growth in Westfield

Westfield's growth continues as the summer approaches, with permitting numbers higher than last year.

In 2016, the number of single family permits issued through April is 236. At the same time last year, the city had issued 192.

"Westfield has been recognized as a great community to live and do business in and I think these numbers do a good job of estimated at \$97,100,000. bearing that out," Mayor Andy Cook said. "We are thrilled that more and more people are looking to call Westfield home."

'Hounds win team title, four double winners at meet

The Carmel boys track and field sectional turned into a daily double.

Four different athletes won two events at Thursday's sectional, which took place at Carmel Stadium. It was an exciting meet run under perfect weather, and every school that competed had something to be happy about in the end.

The Greyhounds won the team title, using its depth to score 148 points. Hamilton Southeastern was the runner-up with 120 points, followed by three teams close together: Westfield scored 95, Fishers 90 and Noblesville 82, but all of them had multiple event wins, and each school advanced several athletes to next Thursday's regional at Lafayette Jeff.

"Everybody did what was expected," said 'Hounds coach Ken Browner. "We maintained our seeds for the most part, and everybody we expected to advance to the regional advanced on. So we're just excited to buy another week and just get some more training in and try to get a little better, advance to the big show."

The "big show," of course, is the state meet. Two Greyhound athletes have already announced themselves as state contenders, starting with double winner was Ben Veatch. He cruised to victories in the 1600 and 3200 run. Veatch set a new sectional record in the 1600, finishing that run in 4:11.90 and lowering the old mark by over a second and a half.

The Greyhounds' Ryan Lipe also continued his stellar pole vaulting season. He won that event with a vault of 16 feet, 5 inches, setting a new record in the process by a quarter of an inch. Carmel's other wins came from Jalen Walker in the 300 hurdles, and the 4x100 and 4x400 relays.

"I think I ran pretty good," said Walker. "My steps felt good. I just need to finish a lot stronger in the next couple rounds."


