Every year, more than 250,000 people experience a STEMI, or ST Elevation Myocardial Infarction. STEMI is a type of heart attack caused by a complete blockage of blood flow to the heart that requires rapid treatment. To prevent death, it's critical to restore blood flow as quickly as possible, either surgically opening or by giving clot-busting medi-

Fire Chief Steven Orusa believes. "We are blessed in the City of Fishers to have such an effective continuum of care for our heart attack patients. The highly trained men and women of our fire department combined with strategically located heart hospitals make a difference in patient outcomes. This partnership provides the citizens of Fishers with one of the highest survival rates in the country."

Emergency Medical System providers are vital to the success of Mission: Lifeline. EMS agencies provide access to 12-lead ECG machines (devices that measures the electrical activity of the heartbeat and can help medical personnel determine if a heart attack has occurred), and follow protocols derived from American Association/American College of Cardiology guidelines. The correct tools and training allow EMS providers to rapidly identify the STEMI, promptly notify the medical center, and trigger and early response from the awaiting hospital personnel.

The family has planned a private service and burial.



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Softball sectionals include...

Tough games at Cherry Tree

If you blink, you might miss the Carmel softball sectional at Cherry Tree Softball Complex.

The action will be fast for the six teams in Class 4A Sectional 8, one of four tournament sites in which Hamilton County teams will be competing. The first round takes place Monday afternoon, with the semi-finals Tuesday and the championship on Wednesday.

With so many games on consecutive nights, everyone will have to be at their best every day. The event opens with Noblesville playing Hamilton Southeastern at 5 p.m. Monday, followed by Westfield taking on North Central.

Both the Royals and the Millers have solid record: HSE is 15-7, while Noblesville is 12-6. The two teams played earlier in the season, with Southeastern winning 8-0. But two-time state champion coach David Cook is certainly not going to take the Millers lightly.

"The draw is really tough for the Royals," said Cook, noting that HSE must "play 3 games to win the sectional. To start that run we will face an outstanding Noblesville team for the 2nd time in a couple of weeks."

However, Cook said that Southeastern started the season 1-4. Since then, the Royals are 14-3, and finished 3-3 in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference, which the coach thinks "is the best softball conference in the state.

"So as you can see we have been playing really good softball lately," said Cook. "Hopefully regular our tough season schedule helps us next week in the sectional."

Southeastern has two solid hitters in Abby Taylor, a freshman who leads the year against good teams and have played Royals in batting at .463. Ally Goley is hitting .444, and Marlee DeSplinter is not far behind at .397, DeSplinter and Taylor are tied for most runs scored with 20 each, while Sydney Cooley leads the RBI count with 17. Alexis Macha has been solid in the pitching circle, with a 2.20 earned-run average and 121 strikeouts.

Noblesville, the defending sectional (and regional) champion, has some big hitters, too. Senior Kimi Box has the Millers' highest batting average, hitting at a .514 clip. That total includes four home runs. Freshman Emily Minett is averaging .442 at the plate, while junior Maddie Moore is hitting .426. Moore and Box each have scored 21 runs, and Moore also leads the RBI count with 20.

As for pitching, Brooke Herron and Kristin Melloh both have five wins on the season. Herron has struck out 33, while experience that she has in the game." Melloh has 26 strikeouts on the season.

Bullard. "We have definitely had some ups and downs this season. We are excited about the players and the potential we have for the tournament. We have to focus on playing our softball and getting the situations we want to execute for our benefit.

The Shamrocks, who are 9-15, have lost to Carmel 6-1 and Fishers 2-0. They did not play North Central in the regular season; the Panthers are 2-19.

Westfield's leading hitter is sophomore Ashley Swartout, who is batting .449, followed by junior Cassidy Ferrer, who claims a .417 average at the plate. Swartout has driven in 31 runs, including eight homers, with Ferrer batting in 24 with four home runs. Swartout has also scored 23 runs, with sophomore Dory Thompson crossing the plate 22 times.

Ferrer has won six games in the circle, tossing 54 strikeouts.

"While we are excited to compete in sectionals, our players are gaining some great experience right now," said first-year Westfield coach Brian Revercomb. The coach said that while his team is focusing "on the little things we are doing right and correct the things we can improve on.

"We have some very good wins this very well against some ranked opponents in which we have lost," said Revercomb. "One Tuesday. 

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
