

Carmel recognized as Indiana Bird Town

Carmel has recently been recognized as an Indiana Bird Town by the Indiana Audubon Society. To become an Indiana Bird Town, Carmel had to meet seven criteria of the application, including being certified as a Tree City USA which Carmel has done for 22 years. "Bird Town Indiana" is a designation awarded by the Indiana Audubon Society to those communities in Indiana that demonstrate an active and ongoing commitment to the protection and conservation of bird populations and habitat.

"The natural environment benefits when we promote the creation of bird habitats. Planting trees is one way for people to increase an important part of the ecosystem in which birds and other wildlife live." said Carmel's Urban Forester, Daren Mindham. Carmel is proud to partner with the Indiana Audubon Society and continues to promote birds by providing natural habitats within its parks system along with providing information on the city website.

The Indiana Audubon Society (www.indianaaudubon.org) is the oldest conservation organization continuously operating in Indiana. 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

Jackson Township is on fire. What do we do?

There are multiple ways to obtain Fire Service in Jackson Township.

Cicero and Jackson Township) can provide their own paid or volunteer fire departments. If the standard is to have at least 2 people at any fire, each department would need to cover 42 eight-hour periods per week. This is an expensive proposition for manpower and does not include equipment and/or facilities.

2. Fire service could be provided by one municipality contracting with another through what is called an Interlocal Agreement. An Interlocal agreement is a statutory contract between governmental entities. For instance, Cicero could contract to provide fire services for Atlanta thus dividing the cost between the towns. Jackson Township could provide fire services for Atlanta and Arcadia through such an Interlocal Agreement. Many other combinations would be possible, including contracts among Cicero, Noblesville, Adams Township, Noblesville Township, White River Township, Tipton County etc.

Other methods may be available using Fire Protection Districts and Fire Protection Territories

3. By law, the County Commissioners may establish Fire Protection Districts for fire protection and prevention. Any area may be established as a fire protection district, but one part of a district may not be completely separate from another part. A municipality may be included, but only if it consents by ordinance, unless a majority of freeholders [landowner] of the the municipality have petitioned to be included. The territory may consist of one or more townships and parts of or or more townships in the same county. The boundaries need not match those of other political subdivisions.

4. A Fire Protection Territory is established by the governing bodies of at least two neighboring units. Thus, Arcadia, Atlanta, and Jackson Township could form a Fire Protection Territory for fire prevention and other purposes related to fire protection and prevention. One of the units within the proposed territory may be designated as the provider unit [the participating unit that is responsible for providing the fire protection services within

the territory] The neighboring unit need not be in Jackson Township or even in Hamilton County.

5. The Jackson Township Trustee, with the approval of the advisory board, may Contract with a with a town in Jackson township or with a neighboring township that maintains adequate firefighting or emergency services to provide fire protection or emergency services for the township. Thus, Jackson Township might be able to contract with Cicero, Arcadia, Atlanta, Noblesville, White River Township, Noblesville Township, Adams Township or townships in Tipton County to provide these services.

Jackson Township could also contract with a volunteer fire department that has been organized to fight fires in the township and use the firefighting equipment that has been purchased by the township.

6. Jackson Township could provide fire 1. Each municipality (Arcadia, Atlanta, services for Arcadia and/or Atlanta without an Interlocal Agreement if the town councils of Arcadia and/or Atlanta would adopt an ordinance to have the township provide the services without a contract. The township advisory board would also need to pass a resolution approving the township's provision of the services without contracts to the towns.

As I tried to help Luke get re-elected, I couldn't help from wondering why in the world we replace one of the most powerful men in State government, with a freshmen with no influence or experience.




> None of this reflects poorly on Mr. Willis. It's simply a fact of life, he didn't have the time served or the experience.

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
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

Golden Eagles fall to Heritage in 11


