U.S. Conference of Mayors will be partially in Carmel

The U.S. Conference of Mayors is scheduled to have its 84th annual meeting in Indianapolis between June 24 and 27, according to advance publicity. It will actually be partially in Hamilton County, Carmel to be specific.

Opening night at the conference will feature a concert at Carmel's Palladium with Michael Finestein followed by a meal and fireworks on the Green, a landscaped expanse to the south of the Palladium.



While all the media representatives will probably say "reporting from Indianapolis," you can bet Mayor Jim Brainard will do his best to get attention focused on Carmel and his accomplishments. He will probably be allowed to make some kind of welcoming remarks when the mayors come to town on June 24.

It's the kind of audience Brainard wants in order to show what a relatively small city can do with aggressive leadership. Love him or hate him, the six-term mayor is on a mission to make Carmel what he calls "a world class edge city." And, he's on his way to doing it and enjoys showing it off.

All cities with populations of more than 30,000 are eligible for membership in the Conference of Mayors. That's 1,407 cities in the U.S. They have annual meetings in different cities and exchange ideas on solving urban problems. And, you can bet there is plenty of time for fun as a host city shows off its best attractions to the influential guests. What will they see in Carmel besides the nationally acclaimed Palladium complex? That hasn't been revealed, but what would a visit to Carmel be without a drive through the Arts and Design District, maybe Clay Terrace, the CHS athletic complex or Central Park, but it surely must include circling as many roundabouts as can be found between Carmel and the Marion County line.

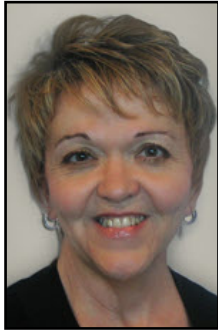
Losing things seems to run in spurts. This past week was quite a spurt.

The women take charge

In sharing Hamilton County's history, the next story the Hamilton County Reporter would like to share with its readers is a the third part of an article which appeared in the Noblesville Ledger 100th anniversary section on Sept. 29, 1988.
The writer was Fred Swift.

Prominent among the successful female candidates for office have been Sue Shields, long time Superior Court judge and now a justice on the state Court of Appeals; Jane Reiman and Dottie Hancock, past and present mayors of Carmel; Pat Logan and Mary Sue Rowland, past and present mayors of Noblesville; Barb Jennings and Polly Pearce, the former and current county auditors; Phyllis Davis and Frances Montgomery, county treasurers and Gina Howard Burrington and Myrna Endicott Tescher, the assessor past and present.

Women also broke into the ranks of the county council with the election of Marg Norris and Sharon Clark; city councils with Minnie Doane and Sue McMullin, and the

township trustees with Billie Caldwell and Dianne Parish.

Hancock has also taken the honor of becoming the first woman to head a county political party organization. She is currently GOP chair person.

Another significant change in the political atmosphere in the past 15 years is certainly the easing of Hamilton County's reluctance to be involved in federally sponsored or financed programs. Various funds for bridges and law enforcement have been utilized in recent years, although a conservative approach to federal government involvement remains entrenched.

Probably two elections (both Republican primaries) stand out in Hamilton County during the 70s and 80s as major turning points in political history.

The 1976 GOP primary featured an obvious move by voters to clean house following a bitter fight between then Circuit Judge Ed New and the county commissioners. Two years later change continued when John Pearce and his GOP faction were successful in winning control of the party organization. It was shortly thereafter that

factional disputes at least between county office holders began to subside.

Another "milestone" election was in the recent May primary of 1988 when a distinctly new, more urban oriented element captured a majority on the board of commissioners for the first time. Steve Dillinger and Steve Holt won COP nominations in the second and third districts.

As the coming year will bring a largely new board of commissioners – the real policymaking group in county government. With the addition of Dillinger and Holt, a more aggressive county government may be in store. Look for progress on a county office building, cooperation with city officials in planning a civic mall, possible more money for the sheriff's department, more interest in planning and zoning and some type of change in the county highway department.

Carmel recognized as Indiana Bird Town

Carmel has recently been recognized as an Indiana Bird Town by the Indiana Audubon Society. To become an Indiana Bird Town, Carmel had to meet seven criteria of the application, including being certified as a Tree City USA which Carmel has done for 22 years. "Bird Town Indiana" is a designation awarded by the Indiana Audubon Society to those communities in Indiana that demonstrate an active and ongoing commitment to the protection and conservation of bird populations and habitat.

"The natural environment benefits when we promote the creation of bird habitats. Planting trees is one way for people to increase an important part of the ecosystem in which birds and other wildlife live," said Carmel's Urban Forester, Daren Mindham. Carmel is proud to partner with the Indiana Audubon Society and continues to promote birds by providing natural habitats within its parks system along with providing information on the city website.

The Indiana Audubon Society (www.indianaaudubon.org) is the oldest conservation organization continuously operating in Indiana. It is not a chapter of the National Audubon Society, but an independent statewide organization. It was organized to stimulate an interest in birds and their protection and to serve the needs of youth, civic, churches, and schools. This society provides information concerning birds and educates the public concerning the necessity for conserving and preserving Indiana's natural heritage and its unique flora and fauna.

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Noblesville’s Himes receives Tim & Tom Gullikson USTA/Midwest Section Scholarship

The USTA/Midwest Section congratulates Allison Himes for being selected as one of two recipients of the 2016 Tim & Tom Gullikson USTA/Midwest Section Scholarship, a \$2,500 award.

Himes playf her senior year of varsity tennis at Noblesville High School, previously playing three years at Lawrence Central High School. She is serving as team captain and currently plays number one singles; she also served as manager of the boys’ tennis team. She began her high school tennis career playing number one doubles, finishing the season 23-3. During her four years as a varsity player she has received All-Conference, All-County, All-State, and All-District recognition.

Himes extended her love of tennis outside of high school competition. She played in the USTA Junior Team Tennis program and competed in USTA/Midwest Section tournaments during her junior tennis career. In 2014 she became the youngest USTA certified official in the Central Indiana District which allows her to officiate USTA tournaments as a part-time job. Himes currently plays in the USTA League program, and volunteers for a local Community Tennis Association which offers programming for young players.

Off the courts, Himes is an honor student and recipient of a school English award. She will graduate from Noblesville High School in the top 10% of her class, finishing with a GPA of 4.153. She plans to play collegiate tennis and major in Professional Tennis Management at Methodist University in Fayetteville, North Carolina this coming fall.

“I consider it a privilege and a great honor to have been chosen as a recipient,” Himes said. “This scholarship allows me to be less worried about the financial aspect of college and allows me to attend Methodist University to pursue my tennis dream.”

The USTA/Midwest Tennis & Education Foundation established this scholarship in 1998 to recognize Tim and Tom Gullikson, and to reward young players with funding to advance their education and tennis interests. With exactly 33 cars entered in this year’s Indianapolis 500, there will be no drama of Bump Day during the race’s qualifications day.
Instead, there was a different kind of drama in the closing hour of Saturday’s qualifying. Who would make the top nine, and thus get a chance at today’s Top Nine Shootout to sit on the pole at the May 29 100th running of the Indy 500?

Noblesville’s Conor Daly was part of the mix, as he made two separate qualifying attempts during the wild last hour on Saturday. Things were already rushed, as rain forced morning practice into the afternoon, and the qualifying was extended an hour to 7 p.m.
Daly wound up qualifying 17th in his No. 18 Dale Coyne Racing Shirts for America car, with a speed of 227.862 mph for his second attempt. That was incrementally

better than his first run, which yielded a 227.804.
“I’ve just been frustrated of not running all day, until really late in the day,” said Daly. “We chose not to practice earlier, which I think was the wrong move. The track was totally different today, the wind was totally different and the car was affected by that. I think we have a great car. We just didn’t get to show it today. I really thought we’d have the opportunity to be in the Fast Nine, but, oh well.”

Daly did not make his first run until shortly after 6 p.m., after the initial qualifying run. He was set to go after his Dale Coyne Racing teammate Pippa Mann, but DCR pulled him from the lineup after Mann’s car spun, then hit the outside wall. It wasn’t a terrible crash, but better safe than sorry.
“She had a rear wing end fence fail, so obviously they wanted to pull my car to

make sure that didn't happen, because there's no need to crash any cars, for sure," said Daly.

While he may have been frustrated, Daly was able to remain calm. He was still signing autographs for the fans outside of his garage while the crew worked on his car. His garage also received a visit from Pat McAfee, the Indianapolis Colts punter who signed on as Daly's sponsor this week. His new "Shirts for America" company will benefit the Pat McAfee Foundation, which provides scholarships to the children of military personnel and Wish for Our Heroes, which assists those who are on active duty in the military.

Daly is now Dale Coyne Racing teammates with fellow Noblesville mate Bryan Clauson, who had a much more drama-free Saturday. The USAC star rode his No. 88 Jonathan Byrd's Racing car to a 22nd place finish, with a speed of 227.110.

"Honestly felt like that was probably pretty close to what we expected, given how much everybody else has

slowed down, compared to yesterday," said Clauson. Friday's speeds were very fast, with Will Power and Josef Newgarden well over 232 mph.

"Overall a decent run for us," said Clauson. He was realistic about not being up there with the Fast Nine, but it did give him confidence, and said that he was "able to go another step further than we did yesterday on downforce, and we'll continue to work up to it and go."

The drivers that qualified 10th place and lower will get one more run this afternoon, with their speeds today determining where they will start in next Sunday's 100th Running. Then, the Fast Nine will have their shootout, with the pole at stake.

Early in the day, it seemed Townsend Bell was going to head into Sunday with the fastest speed, as he turned a 230.452 during the initial qualifying run. But then came the final hour, when several drivers decided to take a chance at getting into the Fast Nine.

Helio Castroneves, the three-time 500 winner, jumped to the top of the pylon with a 230.500 around 6:19 p.m. Then came James Hinchcliff, who was involved in a terrible accident last year during practice that nearly claimed his life.

Hinchcliff then set the remaining gallery wild with three straight laps above 231 mph, finally finishing with a four-lap average of 230.946, putting him on top of the leaderboard. Ryan Hunter-Reay, the 2014 champion, wound up second with a 230.805, and Will Power was third with 230.736.

Castroneves will be fourth in the Fast Nine, with Bell down to fifth. Also in the Fast Nine are Josef Newgarden (sixth), Carlos Munoz (eighth), Simon Pagenaud (ninth), and Mikhail Aleshin, who milked the clock down to the last second - literally - and qualified with a 230.209, putting him in seventh place and guaranteeing him a Fast Nine spot.
