To Clay, Washington township officials...

Mass transit authorities make their pitch

Township officials from Clay and Washington townships last night got a formal sales pitch from mass transit authorities seeking to get a funding referendum on the November election ballot.
Meeting at the Clay Township government center, officials listened to several leaders of the Hamilton County Transit Forum, the Central Indiana Regional Transit Authority and Indyconnect all urging the placing of the tax referendum on the ballot.
If township boards agree to the referendum and voters give it majority approval, individual county income taxes (COIT) would be increased 25 percent next year.

The \$6.5 million raised by the tax would go toward operating a rapid transit bus route known as the Red Line from downtown Indianapolis to Grand Park north of Westfield. The route would generally follow Pennsylvania Street, Range Line Road and U.S. 31 to Westfield and on to Grand Park.
Supporters say a significant percentage of the populations of the two townships live within walking distance (a half-mile) of the proposed Red Line.
CERTA officials admit that a similar concept failed five years ago when ridership on the Carmel Express dropped off, but claim that was because there was no

ongoing funding source. The proposed tax would presumably remedy that problem.
If the entire Red Line proposal becomes reality, modern electric buses will move commuters from Hamilton County and the Greenwood area of Johnson County into downtown Indy making stops are new covered and elevated shelters along the way.
Chambers of Commerce and other groups are on record favoring the referendum, pointing out that employees from Indianapolis could more easily gain access to jobs in Carmel and Westfield.

Godbys visit Sheridan Rotary

Sheridan Rotarians had a special treat at their most recent Tuesday evening: Jim and Jeff Godby were the honored guests. Many of the Rotarians present remember well when Jim Godby first started Godby Home Furnishings in Sheridan in 1974. Son Jeff was just 10 years old at the time and there was only 1 store. In addition to furniture he also sold carpets and draperies.
The story of Jim Godby is quite remarkable. He grew up in Sheridan—actually in Boxley—and graduated from Sheridan High School in 1960. He attended Purdue as an ag major, graduated in 1964 and a year later found himself in Viet Nam participating in the early build-up to the war. He left the army with a rank of captain, came back to Indiana and worked for Swift and Company as a grain buyer before moving on to Wayne Feeds in Middle Fork.
Jim transitioned to furniture sales, working at Glover Furniture in Warsaw. Eventually he and his family came back to Sheridan where he started his own furniture store in 1974. In 1983, Jim moved his operation to Westfield and when son Jeff graduated from Purdue in 1986, he joined his dad in the business and shortly thereafter they opened a second store in

Lebanon. Eventually they added stores in Avon and Noblesville. Last year they grossed over 27 million dollars in sales and currently have 110 employees, a far cry from the early days in Sheridan.
Both Jim and Jeff note they are truly blessed with and owe much of their success to their great employees. They said that several of their key employees are Sheridan people and they are quite proud and pleased with their efforts to make this business the success it has become.
Sheridan Rotarians enjoyed this program, hearing about the successes encountered by one of their own. The club hopes to have more programs featuring successful local people in the future.
Sheridan Rotary has formal meetings with a special program and guest speaker the first and third Tuesdays of each month. 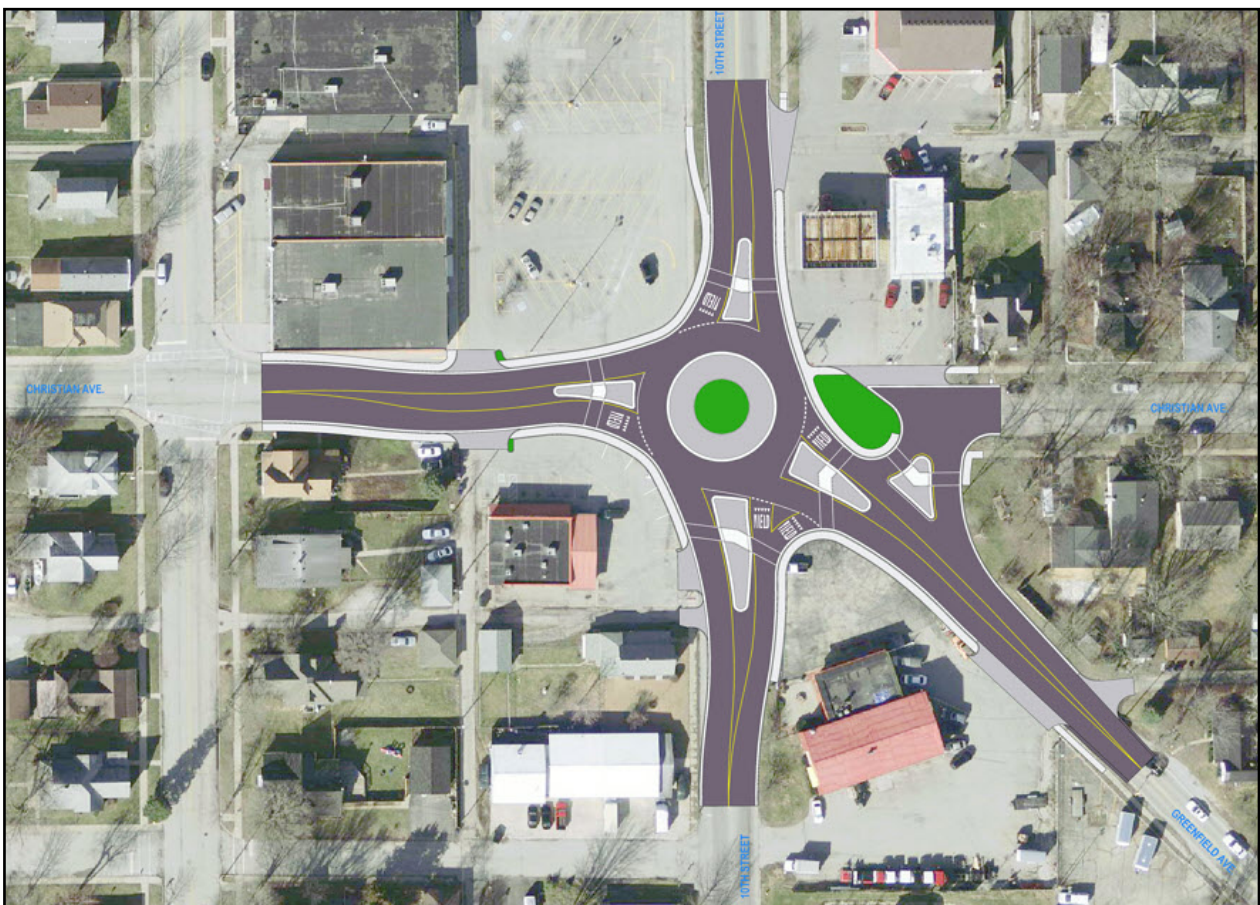

Equipment. "Our 'Future of Ag' breakfast will offer farmers, agribusinesses and community leaders an opportunity to hear what's coming in ag and how best to capitalize on the evolution underway."

For nearly two decades, Bechdol has served in innovation roles on projects with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, NASA and the U.S. Department of Interior. The Hoosier native is both an Indiana and Purdue University graduate and serves an academic consultant and instructor at George Mason University.

"Technology is enabling farmers to unlock the opportunity to blend the art of production with the science of growing at a pace never before seen," said Bechdol in a statement prior to the breakfast. "By exploring this reality, we will provide attendees a foundation to fuel higher levels of success – even amidst a challenging economic backdrop."

After the event, Bechdol said that speaking at Reynolds was "a fantastic experience."

"I love taking with farmer groups, but a group like this this morning, which was very diverse - you had livestock, you had seed and chemical companies and farmers all in the same room - that's exciting when

you think about how technology is changing innovations based across the value chain," said Bechdol.

In addition to Bechdol's keynote, Reynolds Farm Equipment and AgriNovus Indiana hosted a discussion and share real-world examples with local farmers and experts about how to begin using data to improve farm productivity.

The Future of Ag breakfast came just hours before U.S. Farm Report produced a national television program on agricultural equipment at Reynolds Farm Equipment. Selected as one of 10 John Deere dealers nationwide to participate throughout 2016, the program will feature Reynolds experts and Indiana farmers discussing trends in the ag equipment market with U.S. Farm Report hosts and Farm Journal's used equipment expert Greg Peterson.

The township boards did not vote last night on whether to put the referendum before voters this year. Clay board members indicated a vote would come at their June 28 meeting. Westfield is also expected to consider the matter next month.

Eventually there will be plans to expand the public transit system to other areas of Hamilton County including Noblesville and Fishers. But, that will be done township by township as allowed under recently amended state legislation.

Supporters stopped short of predicting passage of the referendum, but said a tremendous public relations campaign will be mounted in affected townships to persuade voters to approve of the added tax.



Sommers, Conway “slingout”

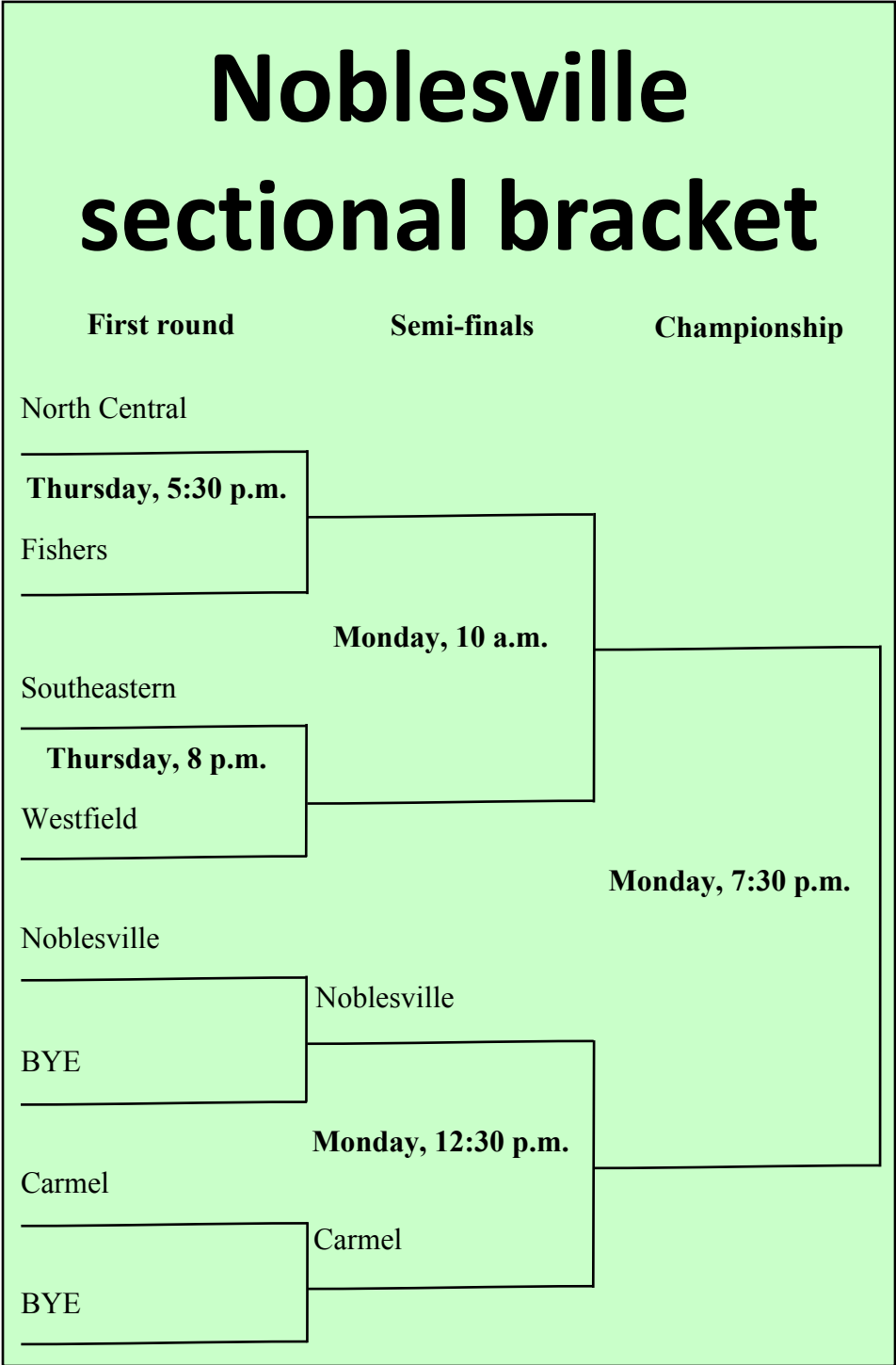

Although Noblesville may have reasons to argue the point, there probably isn’t a favorite entering the Noblesville Baseball Sectional.
And, that might be good news for any school claiming the label. Seldom does the pre-sectional favorite in the local 4A sectional capture the championship.
Nor looking at the last 10 sectionals, no team has dominated the crown. Noblesville and Westfield each have won three titles. Defending champion Hamilton Southeastern has produced two winners. And Zionsville (which no longer plays in this sectional) and North Central each have won once.
Overall, down through the years, Noblesville and Southeastern each have captured 14 titles; Carmel 12 and Westfield five.
Carmel’s last championship was in 2000. Arguably, Noblesville certainly is one of the contenders. So is Carmel.
Noblesville has a 23-5 record and Carmel owns a 21-6 mark. Southeastern finished very strong and posted a 19-8 record.

The Noblesville Sectional at Don Dunker Field will include the Millers, Carmel, Southeastern, Fishers, Westfield and North Central.
The Noblesville-Carmel bye game on Saturday could be the key to a sectional title.
Carmel has hit better than Noblesville, a .295 team average to the Millers’ .277 mark. Two of the better Division I pitching prospects belong to Noblesville, Clayton Marowski and Cory Conway, both seniors. But, Carmel has Tommy Sommer, one of the state’s better junior slingers.
No promises, but the Saturday showdown between the Greyhounds and the Millers likely will be a matchup between Sommer and Conway. If that happens, seldom will any sectional find a better matchup.
Carmel’s argument for the favorite role? The Greyhounds slammed the Millers during the regular season 11-1. Carmel also has defeated Westfield 7-3, Fishers 5-1 and North Central 8-0.
The Greyhounds lost 10-4 to Southeastern.

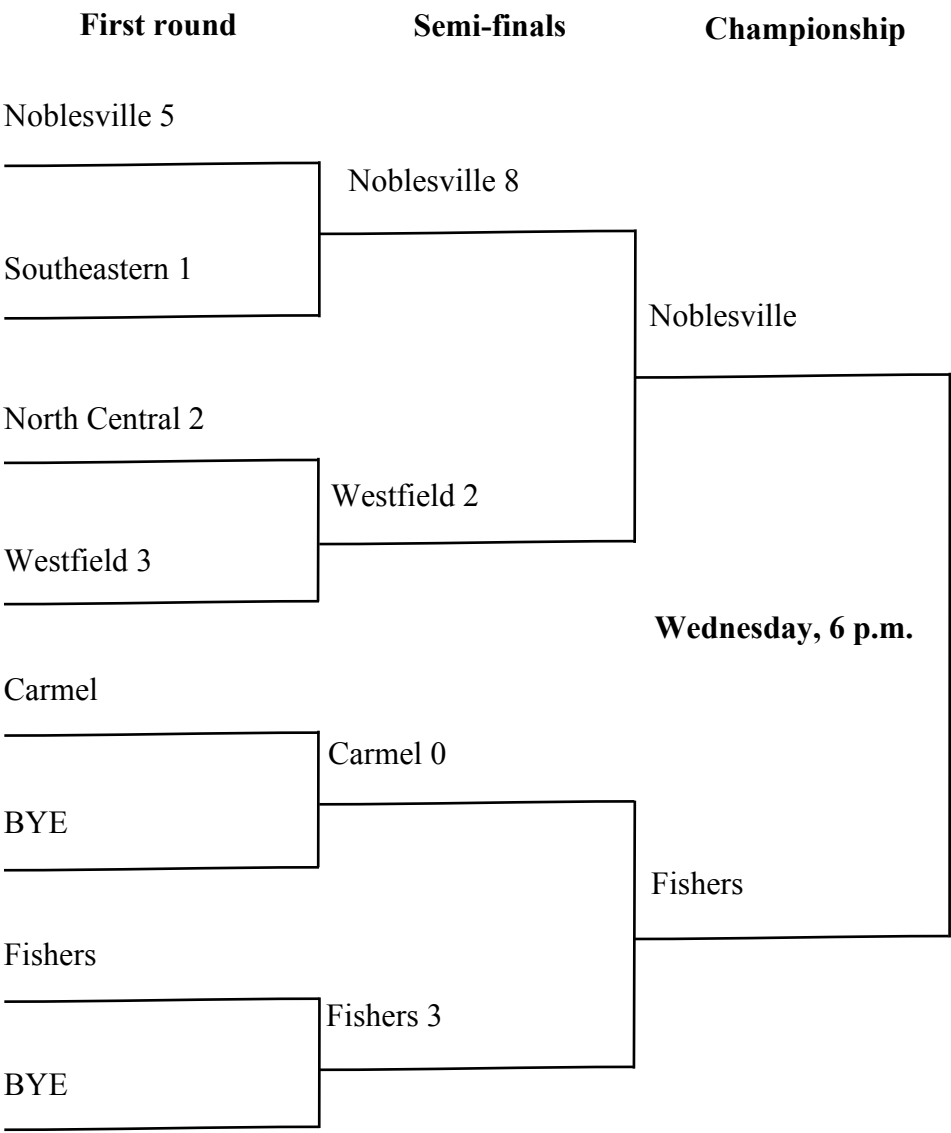

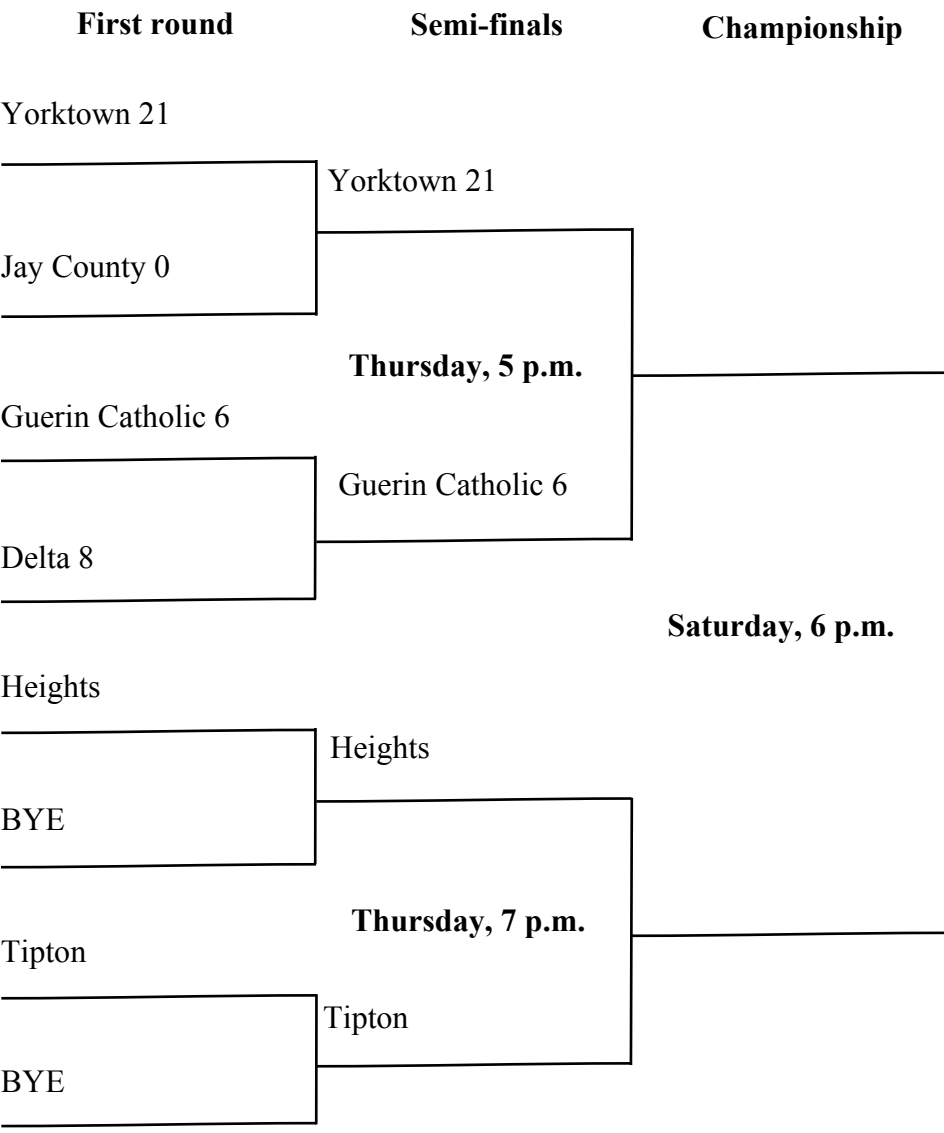

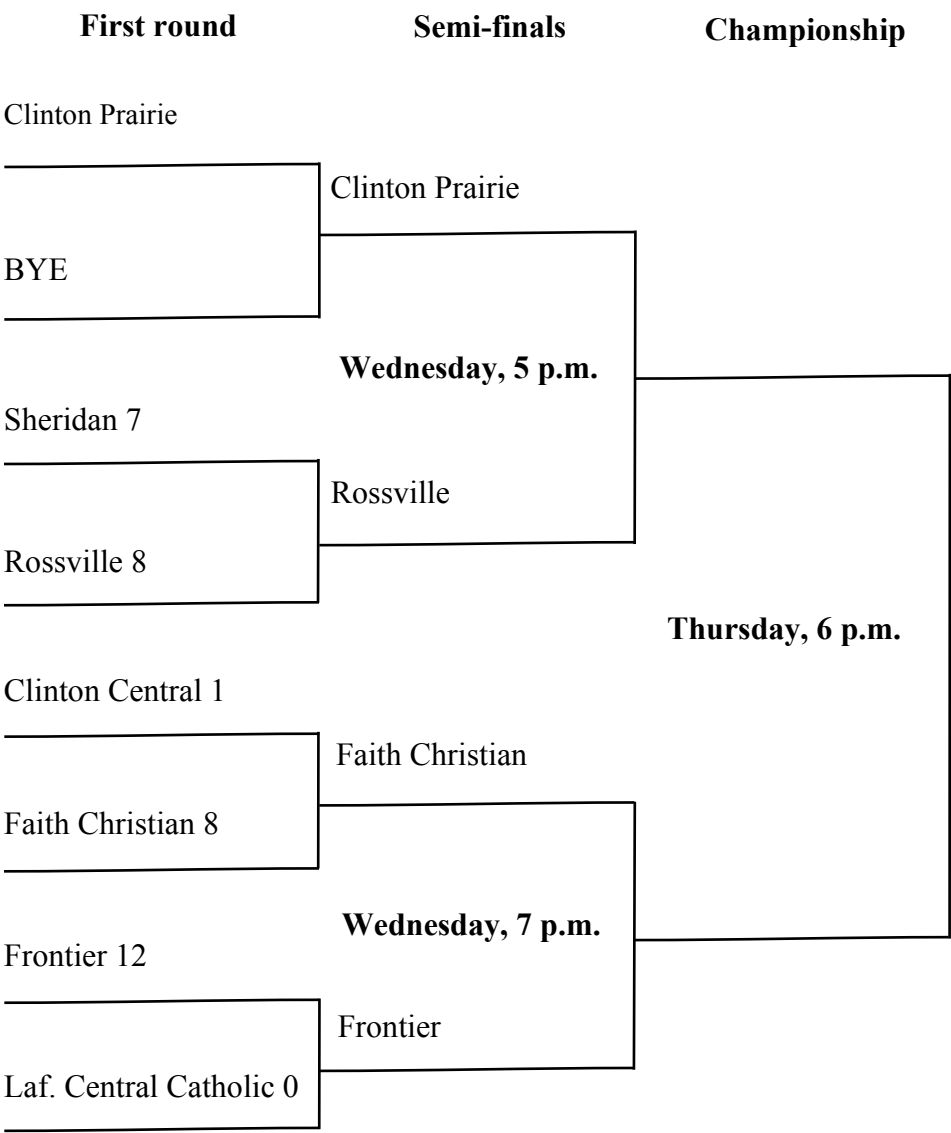
Sectional 8 - At Carmel
