Eventually there will be plans to expand the public transit system to other areas of Hamilton County including Noblesville and Fishers. But, that will be done township by township as allowed under recently amended state legislation.

Supporters stopped short of predicting passage of the referendum, but said a tremendous public relations campaign will be mounted in affected townships to persuade voters to approve of the added tax.


