HAND conducts annual meeting

HAND, the Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development, celebrated another successful year with community partners, funders, and friends at their Annual Meeting at the Delaware Township Community Center in Fishers. HAND invests in neighborhoods, provides housing solutions, and builds partnerships to improve the lives and build community in Hamilton County.

Superintendent Dr. Arrowood and student leaders from Hamilton Heights High School were in attendance and presented their proposals from the IHCD initiative “My Community, My Vision”. The purpose of the program was to engage young people in addressing quality of life issues in their home communities. The Hamilton Heights students began their research by attending HAND’s Neighborhood NOW Conference in November 2015. The students searched for ideas to combat brain drain and encourage students to return to the area post college graduation. Their

presentation included the recommendation of the following to be incorporated in Cicero: Adaptive Reuse of the NRG Plant; Drive-In Movie Theater; Bicycle Trail.

HAND also announced the launch of their campaign, #Housing4HamCo. This campaign is intended to bring awareness to the need of affordable housing in Hamilton County. HAND is committed to serving Hamilton County and partners with communities in a number of ways. advocate for additional affordable housing in Home Place; and continue to pursue the development of Blackhawk Commons in Sheridan and the Noblesville Granary

Fallen soldier to be honored by Flags 4 Fallen Veteran at Saturday’s Noblesville Mini Marathon

Richard Clark of Portland, Ind. will be participating in this year’s Noblesville Mini Marathon and honoring a soldier who died nearly two years ago in a parachute accident over Memorial Day weekend.

Sgt. Shaina Schmigel of Batavia, N.Y., died March 30, 2014 at Ft. Bragg, N.C.

Clark, a former soldier who heard about Schmigel, contacted her mother, Karie Schmigel, several months ago about running a marathon in her memory. Clark, 48, is a member of the Flags 4 Fallen Foundation. He will run the Noblesville Mini Marathon carrying an American flag with Shaina’s name and birthdate on it. Karie and her fiancé are traveling to attend the race, where Clark will present her with Shaina’s flag when he crosses the finish line.

Shaina was a member of the 82nd Airborne, to which Clark also belonged. He learned about Shaina on a Facebook page for paratroopers.

“I was the same age as Shaina when she made sergeant,” said Clark. “I also made my first jump in the Holland Drop Zone, the same as Shaina. There was snow on the ground and I remember that clearly.”

Clark started running half marathons in 2012, carrying an American flag which he would give to a stranger at the end of the race. Then he read about a Knoxville soldier who was killed by a hit-and-run driver and decided to run in his memory. Clark said when he saw Shaina’s story, he knew he had to do it for her.

“Her story made an impression on me,” said Clark, who served four years with the 82nd Airborne.

Clark will carry the American Flag while he runs and then will hand it over to a National Guard team at the finish line where it will be folded and presented to the Schmigel family.

Clark asked to share this information about why he runs and participated in Flags 4 Fallen.

“I’ve always felt that when I was a paratrooper in the 82nd Airborne Division at Fort Bragg more than 30 years ago, that I “carried a torch” for those four years, and

that torch was the American flag and what it stands for.

After 9/11 and the wars broke out I began reading about all these young souls that were lost protecting all our freedoms and I realized more than ever how fortunate I was to have carried the torch, that all of them are now carrying.

It’s the same torch, we just carried it so many years apart.

I read enough to know that almost all of the families of these fallen heroes share a common fear – that someday their children, who died so courageously, will be forgotten. I don’t feel we should let that happen.

Plan extra travel time, stay informed for holiday weekend traffic

With lower gas prices and hundreds of thousands attending a sold-out Indianapolis 500, the Indiana Department of Transportation is preparing for a busy holiday weekend on the state’s highways. Memorial Day traditionally marks the start of the summer travel season in Indiana. And whether you’re witnessing “the greatest spectacle in racing,” vacationing, visiting family and friends, or just passing through, INDOT urges drivers to plan extra travel time, to stay informed on road conditions and to drive safely.

Road work suspended
Most highway maintenance activities and construction projects will halt work during the holiday weekend to increase mobility and safety. INDOT directs its contractors to pull back barriers and barricades to the safest extent possible to accommodate the anticipated increase in holiday travel. Some restrictions will remain in place due to ongoing road construction, including:

- Northern Indiana
- Sections of I-94 in LaPorte County are reduced to two lanes in each direction for rehabilitation from U.S. 421 (Exit 34) near Michigan City to the Michigan State line. Some U.S. 421 ramps are closed with posted detours.
 - U.S. 31 is reduced to one lane in each direction for road construction between U.S. 30 and 4A Road near Plymouth.
 - I-69 lanes are shifted between Union Chapel Road (Exit 317) near Fort Wayne and State Road 8 (Exit 329) near Auburn for two bridge replacement projects.
 - I-469 near Fort Wayne is reduced to one lane in each direction between State Road 1 (Exit 6) and U.S. 27/33 (Exit 11) for road construction.
- Central Indiana
- Sections of State Road 37 from Bloomington to just south of Martinsville are reduced to one lane in each direction for Interstate 69 construction.
 - U.S. 31/Meridian Street lanes are shifted for road construction at the I-465 interchange near the Carmel-Indianapolis city line.
- Southern Indiana
- I-65 is reduced to two lanes in each direction between Eastern Boulevard (Exit

- 1) and the Kentucky state line for Ohio River Bridge construction.
- Sections of U.S. 41 near Vincennes are reduced to one lane in each direction for bridge construction, including at the U.S. 50 interchange.
- Sections of I-64 in Perry and Spencer counties are reduced to one lane in each direction for bridge construction between State Road 161 (Exit 54) and State Road 37 (Exit 79).
- State Road 237 has a temporary signal controlling two-way traffic at the Ohio River bridge in Cannelton during bridge rehabilitation.
- State Road 154 has a temporary signal controlling two-way traffic at the Wabash River bridge in Hutsonville and is closed between State Road 63 and U.S. 41 for bridge construction.

Indy 500 traffic
Race fans driving to Indianapolis 500 festivities this weekend should plan their routes to the track and designate a sober driver home. The Indianapolis Motor Speedway provides directions, transportation options and general race information at the following Web site: www.indianapolismotorspeedway.com/events/indy500/fan-info/directions-and-zones/
INDOT traffic management staff will be on duty during the race, monitoring traffic cameras and congestion, coordinating with law enforcement, and posting information to dynamic message signs. INDOT’s Hoosier Helpers freeway service patrol sponsored by State Farm will assist all weekend in keeping traffic flowing.
On Sunday, May 29, INDOT encourages through travelers to avoid race traffic on I-465 and I-65 on the west side of Indianapolis.

Drive safely
Law enforcement throughout the state, including the Indiana State Police, will be participating in the Click it or Ticket Campaign and Operation CARE, or Combined Accident Reduction Effort. Troopers will be looking for aggressive drivers, impaired drivers, and those that don’t buckle up. According to NHTSA, (National Highway Traffic Safety Administration) seatbelts reduce your risk of injury and death in a crash by 50 percent.
With the expected increase in traffic, Indiana State Police advise motorists to follow the safety tips below:

- Obey all speed limits and always use your turn signals.
- Never drink and drive. Always have a designated driver.

- Make sure everyone is buckled up and children are properly restrained in child seats.
- Watch for and expect slowed or stopped traffic when approaching construction zones.
- Make sure you are well rested. A fatigued driver is as dangerous as an impaired driver.
- Avoid following too close. Use the two-second rule. Maintain following distance in construction zones.
- Don’t text and drive.
- SLOW DOWN AND MOVE OVER for emergency, utility and highway service vehicles.
- Report suspected impaired drivers by calling 9-1-1. Give a vehicle description, location, and direction of travel. Never follow an impaired driver.





Carmel wins, sets two new records

Carmel won six events and had several more solid efforts on its way to a third consecutive boys track and field regional on Thursday.

The Greyhounds won the Lafayette Jeff regional by scoring 88 points, nicely ahead of West Lafayette's 66. Hamilton Southeastern placed third with 61 points. Westfield scored 46 to finish fifth, a point ahead of Fishers' 45 points.

Ben Veatch picked up a pair of wins for Carmel, including a record-setting performance in the 1600 run. Veatch ran that race in 4:08.96, beating the old record by over six seconds. Veatch also won the 3200 run.

Meanwhile, the Greyhounds' 4x400 relay team also set a new record while winning that event. The foursome of Keith Allen, James Griffin, Spencer Gudgel and Jalen Walker ran that race in 3:18.20. Walker also placed first in the 300 hurdles. Carmel was victorious in the 4x100 relay as well, and Bryce Sharp won the discus event.

The top three placers in each event automatically advanced to next weekend's state meet at Indiana University, along with anyone who equaled or bettered the state standard in any event. In addition to the winners, the 'Hounds also qualified their 4x800 relay team and Mitch Lipe in the pole vault, both of whom finished third. Ryan Lipe placed fourth in the pole vault, but he qualified for state by besting the standard.

Southeastern picked up a win from Ethan Bray in the pole vault, and also had state-qualifying performances from the following top three athletes: Aaron Mation (second in the 200 dash), Gabe Fendel (second in the 1600; his time of 4:10.22 was under the old regional record), Ben Wagoner in the 3200 and Madison Norris (third in the 110 hurdles). HSE's 4x400 relay team placed fifth, but advanced to state on the standard.

Westfield got second-place finishes from Martell Fletcher in the 110 hurdles and the 4x800 relay team, with Evan Manley finishing third in the 200 dash. Alec Hartman also advanced to state by besting the standard in the 800 run.

Fishers was led by Noah Rogers, who won the high jump and placed second in the long jump. Cameron Kosegi took third in the discus. Peter Werling qualified for state in the 800 run, qualifying with a state standard time - the top six finishers in the 800 all ran faster than the standard.

Noblesville's Jalen Garner finished third in the 300 hurdles, and Drew Hartmann placed third in the shot put.

Hamilton Heights' Michael DeFoe won two events, pacing the 110 hurdles and the 200 dash.

Sheridan's Tommy Glidden was part of a five-way tie for eighth place in the high jump. Guerin Catholic had two ninth-place finishes, one from William Young in the 1600 and the other from Quinn Gallagher in the 3200.

Alexander Rossi qualified highest of the five rookies, landing in 11th on the grid in the No. 98 NAPA Auto Parts/Curb Honda. This year, he's 17th in points in the Verizon IndyCar Series with a season-best 10th-place finish earlier this month at the Angie's List Grand Prix of Indianapolis on the IMS road course.

The next rookie on the grid is Max Chilton, starting 22nd in the No. 8 Gallagher Chip Ganassi Racing Chevrolet. The Englishman finished fifth in points in the 2015 Indy Lights season and is 16th this year in the Verizon IndyCar Series with top finish of seventh on the other oval race of the season to date, at Phoenix.

Matt Brabham will make history on Sunday when the Australian becomes the third third-generation driver at the Indianapolis 500, piloting the No. 61 PIRTEK Team Murray Chevrolet from the 27th starting spot. His grandfather, Jack Brabham, made four Indy starts with a high finish of

ninth as a rookie in 1961, while father Geoff Brabham was a popular competitor with 10 starts including a high of fourth in 1983.

Spencer Pigot, starting 29th in the No. 16 Rahal Letterman Lanigan/Mi-Jack/Manitowoc Honda, won the Indy Lights title last year behind six wins, four poles and 10 podium finishes. The Florida native, now living in Indianapolis, finished 11th earlier this month at the Angie's List Grand Prix of Indianapolis.

A fan favorite on Sunday is sure to be Englishman Stefan Wilson, starting 30th in the No. 25 Driven2SaveLives-KV Racing Technology Chevrolet. Stefan's late older brother, Justin, made eight "500" starts with three top-10 finishes.

The 100th Running of the Indianapolis 500 presented by PennGrade Motor Oil will be Sunday, May 29. With a crowd traveling to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway that has not been seen in recent years, longtime fans are encouraged to begin their Race Day routines at least two hours earlier than previous years.

Held at the Indiana University Natatorium on the Campus of IUPUI, the June 3-5 meet consists of prelims at 9 a.m. EDT and finals at 6 p.m. EDT. [Tickets will be on sale at the venue beginning June 2.](#)

Area standouts and USA Swimming National Team members **Claire Adams** (Carmel, Ind./Carmel Swim Club), **Zane Grothe** (Boulder City, Nev./Badger Swim Club), **Lilly King** (Evansville, Ind./Indiana Swim Team), **Cody Miller** (Las Vegas, Nev./Badger Swim Club) and **Blake Pieroni** (Valparaiso, Ind./Indiana University) are expected to swim in Indianapolis.

In addition to the local National Teamers, 2012 U.S. Olympians **Connor Jaeger** (Fair Haven, N.J./Club Wolverine), **Micah Lawrence** (Pflugerville, Texas/SwimMAC Carolina) and **Shannon Vreeland** (Overland Park, Kan./Athens Bulldog Swim Club) also are expected to compete.

The 2016 U.S. Olympic Team Trials – Swimming will be held June 26-July 3 in Omaha, Nebraska.

The Arena Pro Swim Series at Indianapolis is one of seven stops of the 2015-16 Arena Pro Swim Series. As part of USA Swimming's partnership with swimwear leader Arena, the circuit will feature a record \$350,000 in overall prize money. Swimmers may earn awards for top-three finishes in all individual Olympic events across the series. At each meet, \$1,000 will be provided for a first-place finish, \$600 for second and \$200 for third. In addition to the single-event prize money, the overall male and female winners of the season-long Series will earn a \$10,000 bonus.

For the third consecutive season, long-time USA Swimming partner BMW will award the grand prize of a one-year lease of a BMW vehicle to the highest-scoring eligible male and female U.S. swimmers.

Male and female overall Arena Pro Swim Series champions will be honored at the conclusion of the 2015-16 series based on the number of points accumulated throughout the seven meets.
