Police officer made heroic attempt to save child's life

When Carmel police officer Brian Martin arrived at the scene, just minutes after a report of a potential drowning, on-lookers directed him to the location in a retention pond where a 12 year old boy was last seen swimming.

Martin, a 10 year law enforcement vet-

eran, immediately removed his duty belt, uniform shirt and bullet proof vest and swam to the area approximately 20 yards off shore. Unable to locate the child in the murky water Martin returned to shore and removed his boots.

Carmel Firefighter Bruce Frost arrived at the scene as Martin prepared to make a second rescue attempt. Frost provided Officer Martin with a lifejacket and the veteran police officer entered the water again, this time locating the boy in an area of the pond that was approximately 8-9 feet deep.

Holding the boy, Martin swam back to shore where he and Carmel police Sargent Chris Dunlap and Lieutenant Brett Keith began CPR.

The incident took place on Carmel's west side near Fairfax Manor Drive and Union Springs Drive.

The boy was transported by ambulance to St. Vincent's Peyton Manning Hospital where six days later he died as a result of the drowning.

According to the Center for Disease Control, drowning is the second leading cause of unintentional injury death for chil-

dren ages 1 to 14 years, and the fifth leading cause for people of all ages. About one third of children who drown do so in and around the home either in a swimming pool or retention pond.

Indiana lawmakers have been unsuccessful in an attempted to pass legislation requiring fencing of retention ponds. Opponents to the legislation have stated fencing endangers children who might find a way into a fence-lined pond and then slip and begin to drown, at which point the fence would be a barrier to would-be rescuers.

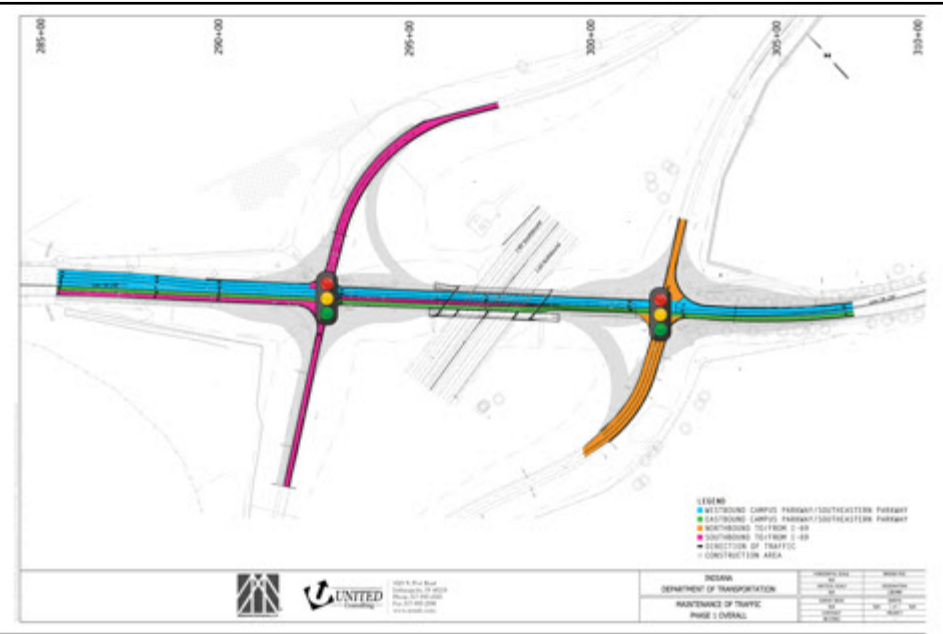

The first phase of construction on Interstate 69's Exit 210 will begin building the new ramps and will prepare to shift traffic into a double-crossover diamond configuration through the remainder of construction.

Construction starts on I-69 Major Moves 2020

Southbound construction started Tuesday night on the I-69 Major Moves 2020 project.

Interstate 69 from Exit 210 to Exit 205

Milestone Contractors plans to begin tonight patching existing pavement on southbound Interstate 69 between Campus/Southeastern Parkway Exit 210 and State Road 37 Exit 205.

Milestone expects to finish patching on northbound I-69 between Exit 205 and Exit 210 this week and begin paving a new asphalt overlay on the section next week.

Patching and paving operations require alternating lane restrictions from 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. six nights a week on Monday through Saturday nights.

One lane of I-69 will remain open at all times, and two lanes will remain open during peak daytime travel times. The speed limit on I-69 through the work zone is reduced to 60 mph and further reduced to 50 mph when workers are present.

After existing pavement is resurfaced, crews will start work to rehabilitate interstate bridges. Traffic lanes between Exit 205 and Exit 210 will be shifted toward the outside shoulders to set temporary concrete barriers and begin construction of an additional travel lane in the median.

Campus/Southeastern Parkway Exit 210

Milestone is mobilizing cranes and other equipment at the Campus/Southeastern Parkway interchange, setting temporary

concrete barrier along I-69, and widening the abutments and center pier for the bridge over I-69. To see recent photos, go to <https://www.facebook.com/INDOTEastCentral/posts/1158283770889357>. Construction of the new interchange configuration is scheduled to begin after Independence Day (July 4). The first phase will begin building the new ramps and will prepare for shifting traffic into a double-crossover diamond configuration later this summer, which is intended to improve traffic flow during widening of the bridge deck and construction of the permanent interchange improvements.

For all the success the Noblesville boys golf team has had over the past decade, it might be surprising to note that prior to this week, the Millers hadn't won a sectional championship since 2005.

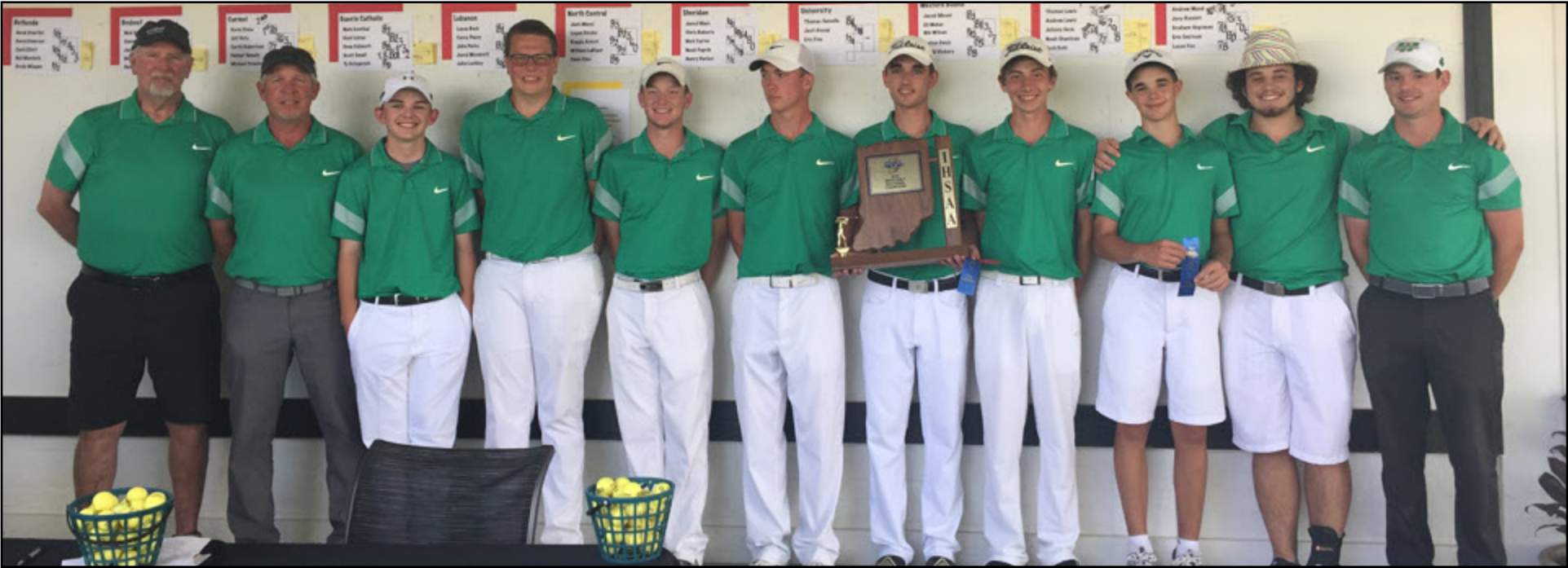
