Referendums growing in popularity, but can cause financial trouble

The referendum is growing in popularity, widely sold on the slogan "Let the people decide." Whether it's additional school funding, horse racing, mass transit taxation or trash pickup, there is increasing interest in putting such issues on the election ballot.



In this fall's election there will likely be a referendum in Washington and Clay townships asking voters if they would like to increase their local income tax (COIT) to help finance bus service to Indianapolis.

Next year there are plans for school referendums in some county school districts to supplement the school funding provided by state tax distributions.

The referendum is an easy way for state government to pass the responsibility for tax increases to voters. If higher taxes are approved, elected officials can say the increases were purely the decision of the voters.

Technically that is true, but there's more to it than that. In the case of every referendum there is a well organized group of people who want to see an affirmative outcome. In most cases be it school teachers, Chambers of Commerce or others, these folks have something to gain.

In most cases a genuine need is truly believed to exist, and we should not suspect the desire is greed. But, we

should also keep in mind that with a well organized and well financed campaign, and with usually no organized opposition these referendums are going to pass, often with little interest among the general public.

Some states have gotten themselves in real financial trouble by allowing too many issues to be decided by referendum. While it is so popular to say "let the people decide," it is more prudent to have elected representatives make most taxation decisions.

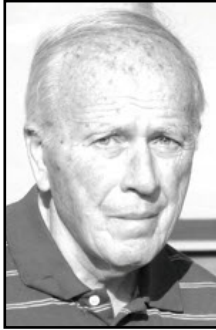
Hopefully there will be fewer rather than more issues submitted to the ballot because our representative government is based on the belief that elected officials will consider fiscal issues in the long-term best interest of the public.

John Tener on 1957 Millers

Do you remember the 1957 Noblesville High School basketball team? If you do, for those of you who lived that season, you'll remember John Tener, a member of that team.

Next season will mark the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of that 1957 adventure.



Tener has compiled a book telling the tale of the Millers from a guy who lived every second of that season.

The season that Glen Harper came to town and led Noblesville to a sectional championship.

The book is titled, "Breakthrough, the 1957 Noblesville Millers State Basketball Tournament Adventure."

Harper's Millers not only won the sectional, they won the regional and captured the first game of the semistate before being eliminated by South Bend Central, a team which went on to win the state championship.

"It's an 88 page 'book' telling the story of my most amazing senior year in high school, with special focus on the improbable basketball tournament success of my small Indiana town's high school basketball team," Tener recently told me.

"The story is drawn from numerous contemporaneous sources, including local and regional newspaper accounts, photographs, high school yearbook excerpts, later newspaper histories, personal letters, obituaries, and perhaps most enlightening enlightening contemporaneous accounts by my father, Alan Tener, in letters to his mother (my grandmother)," Tener said.

"Three of the starters on my team have passed away, as have several other important persons that played key roles in our success that year," John continued. "For most, if not all of us involved,

Four-story treehouse...

Conner Prairie's Treetop Outpost opens July 1

If you like to play in treehouses - or remember playing in them as a kid - you'll want to get to Conner Prairie on July 1.

That's the day Conner Prairie opens the Treetop Outpost. The treehouse stands four stories high, and is filled with different "experience areas," according to a press release on Conner Prairie's website.

"Surrounding the 45-foot-tall treehouse are experience areas that will allow visitors of all ages to investigate nature and its resources, dig in a re-created archaeology site, build like Hoosiers of the past, create art and fill the forest with music," the release said.

Treetop Outpost, which began construction on Nov. 1, comprises 6000 square feet. In addition to the treehouse, the outpost features "a 30-foot suspension bridge and a connecting Nature Walk that leads visitors through the woods and along the White River to a prairie lookout."

"Our goal is to help get children and families outdoors to investigate, explore, create and imagine," said Conner Prairie President and CEO Norman O. Burns in the press release. "Our focus with Treetop Outpost is to spark visitors' curiosity about how people throughout history used nature for necessity and inspiration, how we use natural resources today and how we can preserve those resources for the future."

The release said that the new exhibit "is an official Indiana Bicentennial Legacy Project as part of the Bicentennial Nature Center Network, a statewide coalition created to ensure that all Hoosier youth have access to environmental education and creative outdoor experiences within 60 miles of where they live."

Westfield begins work on thoroughfare beautification

Now that work has ended on Westfield's portion of US 31 reconstruction, the city is beginning beautification efforts along the 31 corridor.

During the four-year reconfiguration of US 31, 12 miles of road were reconstructed or built, and roughly 320 acres of ground were disturbed. The city now plans to use the reconstruction as an opportunity to pay tribute to the guiding principles established by Westfield's founding fathers, many of whom belonged to the Society of Friends.

The principles include peace, responsibility, simplicity, integrity, education, honesty and respect. Each principle will be reflected with unique colors of plants at each of the seven bridges along the 31 corridor.

"We hope that by undertaking this project we can create a landscaping along US 31 that is unique to Westfield, replaces habitat that has been altered by the corridor construction, and to pay tribute to the guid-

ing principles upon which Westfield was founded in 1834," Mayor Andy Cook said.

Eighty percent of the new landscaping material will consist of tall grass prairie, each of which will come from 40 to 60 percent different species. The areas will also include trees, shrubs, vines and perennials.

The tall grass prairie should take between three to four years to fully mature.






The northbound lanes of Keystone Parkway will be closed for bridge beam replacement beginning Monday, June 13th, 2016. Northbound Keystone traffic will be detoured via the 106th Street on/off ramps. The northbound Keystone lanes are anticipated to be closed for six consecutive nights until the demolition of the existing beam is completed, weather permitting.

The remainder of the project will be completed with single lane closures of northbound Keystone Parkway until early August 2016. These restrictions will be limited between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. and/or 8 p.m. and 5 a.m.

# Golf regionals start today

It's the regional level of the IHSAA state tournament, and opportunities to go to next week's state finals at Prairie View Golf Club in Carmel are on the line. A total of 18 teams will compete in one of the state's regionals.
