The Westfield Mayor's Yellow Tie Ball will be held on Saturday, July 23 at 7 p.m. at the Grand Park Events Center. It will be the culmination of the three-day Opening Celebration for the Grand Park Events Center. Tickets for the Westfield Mayor's Yellow Tie Ball are \$150 per person and are on sale now. The Mayor's Yellow Tie Ball has been a Westfield tradition since 2008. Attire is black or yellow tie, however, this year attendees are encouraged to wear sneakers or flats, rather than heels, as the event will take place on the turf fields inside the Grand Park Events Center. Event proceeds will benefit the Hamilton County Youth Assistance Program.

The Opening Celebration for the Grand Park Events Center, the indoor field sports and events facility, will take place from Thursday, July 21 through Saturday, July 23 and will include an indoor festival with food, games and inflatables, movie nights, musical entertainment and preview tours.

The great will be honored Sunday

It's an opportunity to touch base with some of Hamilton County's all-time basketball greats. Or, to honor some of the best ever. Or, simply to say hello to some old friends.

Sunday at 1 p.m. at Hamilton Heights High School, the 13th class of the Hamilton County Basketball Hall will be inducted.

The group will include Brad Lindsay, Joe Reitz, Jana Thompson, Mark Richards (deceased) and Dick Dellinger.

Tickets, available at the door, will be a \$10 donation to the Hall of Fame. The ceremony will include a light refreshment.

Lindsay was both an outstanding player and coach at Westfield. He averaged nearly 27 points a game both as a junior and senior. He was named Hamilton County Coach of the Year in 1999 while coaching the Shamrocks. He later coached private schools to a 1-A state championship and 2A runner-up in Texas and currently is the superintendent of schools at Marion.

Lots of folks might think of Reitz as a football star with the Indianapolis Colts, but Joe also was a great basketball player at Hamilton Southeastern and at Western Michigan.

Joe, the first Hamilton Southeastern Royal ever named to the Indiana All-Stars, scored 946 points and pulled 511 rebounds in his career at HSE. He was Freshman of the Year and Sophomore of the Year at Western Michigan, where he was named All-Academic Conference four straight seasons.

City honors its namesake, James Noble

The State of Indiana commemorated one of its Founders, James Noble in a Thursday morning wreath-laying ceremony at Noblesville City Hall.

Noble is the namesake of Noblesville, Hamilton County's seat of government.

Two hundred years ago today, on June 10, 1816, a group of 43 men gathered to decide the fate of Indiana Statehood and draft the state's first constitution. James Noble played a significant role in the founding of Indiana. "Noble's contributions to Indiana and to the nation as the State's first US Senator were significant," said State Archivist Jim Corridan.

The Indiana Archives and Records Administration, has worked with local partners that include Mayor John Ditslear and the City of Noblesville, Hamilton County Tourism, and County Historian David Heighway. The events honoring the State's founder's is an endorsed project of the Indiana Bicentennial Commission.

From the June 9 to June 29, the remaining constitutional delegates buried in Indiana will be honored. For a calendar of these events please visit <http://in.gov/iara/3162.htm>.

Three men arrested after Wednesday robbery

Three men were arrested Wednesday afternoon after a robbery at the Buckle in Noblesville's Hamilton Town Center.

At approximately 2:03 p.m. Wednesday, police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to the Buckle, a clothing store located at 13904 Town Center Boulevard in response to a report of a robbery in progress. Officers arrived on the scene a short time later and began to investigate.

Initial information from the caller alleges that two males came into the store and attempted to steal merchandise. The caller, who is also an employee of the store, alleges that he was battered by one of the suspects as he and another employee attempted to prevent the alleged crime from occurring. The caller went on to say that the suspects were able to flee the store; however, the caller was able to provide

officers with a description of the suspects' vehicle.

Officers initially established a perimeter and began to search the area for the subjects by utilizing motor and foot patrols.

At approximately 2:25 p.m., officers on the scene were advised that the Fishers Police Department had located a vehicle traveling southbound on I-69, near 96th Street,

Thompson is one of Noblesville’s all-time Lady Miller greats. During her playing days Noblesville won four sectionals, four regionals, four semi-states and advanced to the State Finals each year.

Jana, a member of the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame by being named on the Silver Anniversary team, scored 999 points while playing for the Millers.

Richards practiced medicine in Carmel from 1984 until his death at the age of 50. He competed in basketball, tennis and golf at Hamilton Southeastern and at Marian College.

Mark scored 1,174 points while playing for the Royals. He scored 49 points for a single game school record at that time. He averaged 23.8 points as a junior and 23.7 points as a senior.

Richards also was a coach. He started the tennis program at Heritage Christian and built it into a Top 10 program. He coached girls basketball for five years winning city championships in 2002 and 2003 and a 2A state championship in 2004.

Richard “Dick” Dellinger served as the “voice of the PA” for Noblesville basketball for 23 years. He knew how to incite the

crowd, while not always endearing himself to opposing fans.

Dellinger retired from teaching after 38 years at Noblesville. His teaching career began at Royalton High School after graduating from a B.S. degree from Ball State. He continued his education, earning a M.S. degree from Butler. Dick also served as a State Representative in the Indiana Legislature for 20 years.

matching the description of the suspects’ vehicle. Fishers Police Department conducted a traffic stop on the vehicle and all of the occupants were questioned by investigators of the Noblesville Police Department. After further investigation, three subjects were taken into custody and transported to the Hamilton County Jail and booked on preliminary charges.

The suspects are identified as: Anthony James White, 18, Indianapolis, who was charged with Robbery and two counts of Battery; Marquis Dominique Booker, 22, Indianapolis, who was charged with Robbery; and Brandon Anderson, 20, Pendleton, who was charged with Robbery, Possession of Marijuana and False Informing.

Two store employees reported that they were injured during the incident but both refused medical treatment.

This remains an ongoing investigation.



Duke Energy Foundation funds Hamilton County summer youth reading program

Hot summer days can melt away the facts and figures a child learns in the school year, but reading over the summer helps kids stay sharp. That's why the Duke Energy Foundation is investing more than \$21,000 in Hamilton County youth to help maintain and improve reading levels over the summer.

The Sheridan Community School Corporation's program at Sheridan Elementary School in Sheridan is one of 19 that received Duke Energy Foundation grants for summer reading initiatives. This grant is part of an approximately \$400,000 investment the Duke Energy Foundation is making in summer literacy programs.

"Without solid literacy skills, a student's educational opportunities in all subjects can be greatly diminished," said Mark LaBarr, Duke Energy community relations manager for Hamilton County. A group of kindergarten through second-grade students will work on closing

their reading gap in a two-week, intensive program that begins July 25. Instruction will focus on the seven major areas that improve a child's reading ability: phonemic awareness, phonics, decoding, fluency, vocabulary, comprehension and spelling.

Facts on reading and education

- During the summer break, low-income students can lose more than two months of reading achievement.
- Approximately 14 percent of Indiana students did not pass the IREAD3 test administered in the third grade.
- A child who is not reading at grade level at the end of the third grade is four times more likely to drop out of high school.

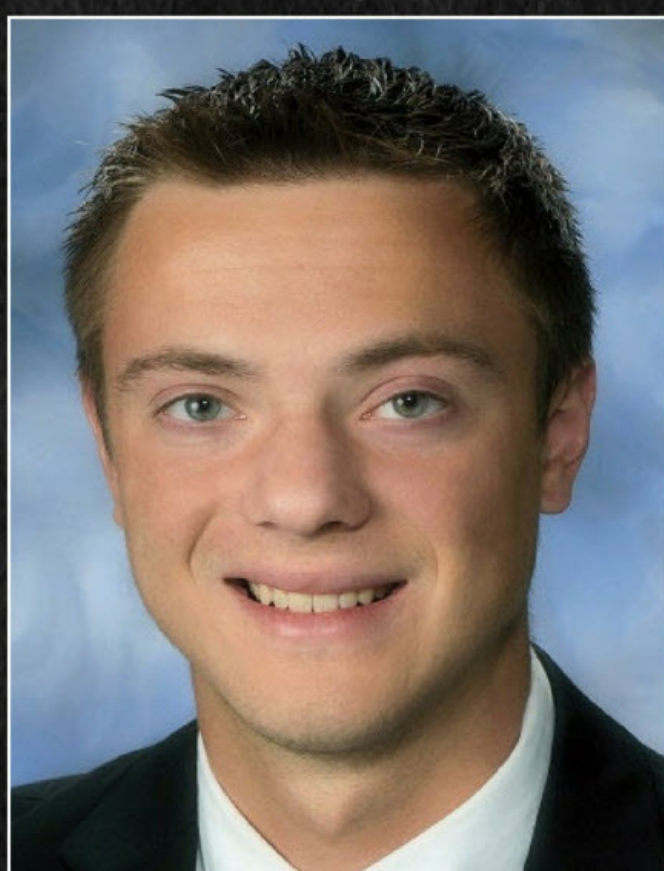

Boys golf regionals

‘Rocks hang on, go back to state

There's a thin line in IHSAA golf tournaments between winning and not advancing.

That line was as tenuous as ever at Thursday's Lafayette regional at Battle Ground Golf Club. Westfield found itself almost caught in that line, but managed to reel itself in and secure a spot in next week's state finals at Carmel's Prairie View Golf Club.

The defending state champion Shamrocks placed third behind champion Harrison and runner-up Zionsville, with the top three teams advancing to state. The Raiders scored 302, with the No. 8-ranked Eagles and No. 2-rated Westfield both scoring 303. Zionsville placed second on the fifth man score. Both teams were just ahead of fourth-place Crown Point's 306.

Third-ranked Carmel finished fifth with a 309, but will get a man on to state: Kevin Stone was the first of five individuals to advance to next week's gathering at Prairie View.

With four ranked teams and two others receiving Honorable Mention (Crown Point and Chesterton) in the coaches poll, the field was going to be a crowded one. In the end, Harrison managed to scramble to the front; the Raiders were helped by a medalist performance from Cole Bradley, who shot a 71 for first place.

Second-ranked Westfield got two golfers in the individual top five. Andrew Lewis is tied for third with a 73, while Thomas Lewis tied for fifth with a 74.

"It's always typical up here in Battle Ground at the regional," said 'Rocks' coach Jon Hoover. "We see it every year up here. It's so close, and there's always good teams getting ousted. We watched it very close at the turn, on the back nine. We were just a hole away from winning it and we're a hole away from not making it out."

But in the end, Westfield qualified for state for the fifth year running. The Shamrocks have built a quick tradition in boys

golf, having won state in 2013 and 2015, with a runner-up finish in 2014.

Meanwhile, Carmel found itself frustrated for the second year in a row at Battle Ground. The Greyhounds will have representation at state from Stone, however, as he finished second individually with a score of 72.

Stone said he "played solid" for his round.

"I only made a couple bogeys today," said Stone. "I think I made two bogeys and two birdies, so I was pretty consistent all day."

Stone said it was "sad the team won't be advancing, but hopefully I can represent Carmel pretty well at the state championship."

"We had a tremendous season," said Carmel coach Chard Reid. "We won three invitationals. We finished top three in every invitational except here and at Trophy Club. The regular season was outstanding. Guys played really well, they got better throughout the year, and I thought we were in a pretty good place coming into today. But you got to do it every day in the post-season."
