Boys golf regionals

Royals, Millers' Parker Deakyne advance to state

Just as it had been in some of the Thursday IHSAA boys golf regionals, Friday's Muncie Central regional at The Players Club in Yorktown saw razor-thin margins for winning and advancing to the state fi-

Hamilton Southeastern will be back at state, which takes place next Tuesday and Wednesday at Carmel's Prairie View Golf Club. The Royals finished as runners-up at The Players Club, with only Bishop Chatard ahead of them. Both teams scored 306; the Trojans won on the fifth man score.

Yorktown secured third place, and the final advancing spot to state, with a 307. Mount Vernon was fourth with a 309, which shows how close the regional was. Noblesville finished sixth as a team, but advanced an individual, Parker Deakyne, to state.

The meet was delayed by three hours due to persistent thunderstorms that rudely showed up a little before sunrise. That made a long day already longer; Southeastern was on the bus to go to The Players Club at 5:30 a.m., "but we've been up since way before that," said HSE coach David Young.

"It's hard to just cool your jets and pick right back up, but they really did a great job," said Young.

Southeastern played consistently, toughing out the fatigue and the wet conditions. Cedric McAree was the Royals' low man, finishing with a 74. That score tied him for fifth individually. Drew Alexander followed that with a 76, and Jake Hutmacher scored 77.

"From looking at the scores at least, there's obviously an advantage to the later tee times, once the course actually dried out more," said Young. "But I think we handled that well "

Southeastern earned a spot at state for the eighth time in school history, and their upcoming appearance will stretch their state-qualifying streak to four. The Royals placed fourth at last year's state meet, and are focused on improving on that this year.

"That's our focus," said Young. "We got fourth last year, so there's absolutely no reason why we shouldn't be better than that this year."

As usual, the presence of so many good teams and only three state-qualifying spots available means that many good teams were shut out of advancing to state. One of those teams was Noblesville, which carded a 313 to finish sixth - again, that should tell even the most casual golf fan just how tough this regional is.

It was disappointing for the Millers, who were coming off their first sectional championship since 2005 just four days before. But Noblesville will have a golfer at state: Parker Deakyne shot a 74, tying with





chemotherapy and radiation. His battle with his cancer led to a male mastectomy and a break from his early racing career to focus on his health and recovery.

In 2015, after his long fight with Stage 3 Squamous Cell Carcinoma and the result of a male mastectomy, Niblack decided he was ready to return and continue in his pursuit to race. He returned to Skip Barber School of Racing where he competed in the Skip Barber Summer Series and won the Summer Series. Niblack also attended the Allen Berg Racing School in September 2015 where he went through intensive training and successfully completed the course and gained his SCCA Pro Competition license. After receiving his license Niblack raced in the West Coast Formula Mazda Championship and placed 3rd.

Niblack then signed with Top Kart USA (McLaughlin Motorsports) to compete in the 2016 Pro Mazda Championship Series. Recently, in March 2016, Niblack attended an advanced driving course at Seat Time American Racing School at Charlotte Motor Speedway, Charlotte North Carolina where he began practice and testing to work toward gaining his ARCCA license.
