



Sheridan Schools buses receive 100 percent passing rate

nity Schools had its annual bus inspection and is proud to announce it received a 100 percent passing rate.

The Indiana State Police Commercial Vehicle Division inspects all buses, including white activity buses in the state of Indiana at least once a year. This inspection includes all aspects of the bus, including cleanliness of the interior/exterior, checking for holes in seats, and making sure the bus is mechanically safe for transporting students. During inspection, a bus can pass with a 100 percent rating, be ordered repaired, which means a small problem has been found but will not adversely affect the safety of the students and allows the bus to run on a 30 day temporary inspection sticker, or be placed totally out of service, which means no students can be transported until the problems are fixed and the bus is re-inspected.

Holcomb received a standing ovation from the delegates. The Superintendent race has been dominated by Jennifer McCormick since she will continue to make gains as we move announced in January. Dawn Wooten, McCormick's sole opponent, gave a passionate speech full of applause lines that had the delegates cheering for her conservative positions, but it wasn't enough to sway their votes. McCormick won the nomination on the first ballot as was expected. The truly contentious portion of the convention was the race for the Attorney General nomination. State Senator Randy Head, former Attorney General Steve Carter, Assistant Attorney General Abby Kuzma and Elkhart County Prosecutor Curtis Hill all were contenders. The rules of the convention are that a candidate must win support from a majority of the delegates to be named the nominee. If no candidate wins a majority the candidate with the fewest votes is eliminated from contention and the delegates vote again. This process is repeated until there is a clear winner. When Randy Head was removed from contention after the second ballot, he endorsed Curtis Hill vaulting Hill to an easy win over Steve Carter on the third ballot. The Democrats hold their convention this coming weekend and the state is moving into full general election mode. This year the rhetoric will be contentious, colorful and sometimes a little heated. Democrats are going to try to shift the conversation away from Indiana's economic growth and towards wages and social

Range Line Road will remain open, but removal of existing pipe and storm limited to one lane in each direction. structures, and existing pipe capping and Resurfacing along Range Line Road should take place later in the week. There will be limited access with short term closures of the side streets in the area when piping is being placed.



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Boys golf state finals...

Westfield leads, HSE 2nd, McAree goes 7 under

It was a long, long day on the Prairie for the state's best high school golfers Tuesday, as rain wreaked havoc on the first day of the IHSAA boys golf state finals.

But it would be worth it for the two Hamilton County teams that are playing at Prairie View Golf Course in Carmel.

Westfield put itself in excellent position to defend its state championship, surging ahead to the lead after shooting a threeunder par 285 in its first round. Hamilton Southeastern is currently in second place with a three-over par 291, with Cedric McAree turning the course on its head with a spectacular and record-setting round of golf.

McAree lit Prairie View on fire with a round of 65, which ties a course record. That's seven under par - yes, SEVEN under par. McAree made seven birdies on the day, and had no bogeys.

"I struck it beautifully, didn't make a lot of mistakes," said McAree. "I kept the ball in good spots all day. It was probably one of the best rounds of my life, but I don't want to think about that. I just want to think about our team and I don't want to celebrate today. I want to celebrate tomorrow."

Jacob Hutmacher finished his first round with a 74, while Drew Alexander and Will Kirchmer both carded 76s. Southeastern coach David Young credited his team with managing the course well, and also

with doing a good job of handling the adverse weather conditions.

"We picked up right where we left off," said Young. "We didn't have any lag time after those two rain delays, especially the first one, over four-and-a-half hours."

The nasty weather threatened to overshadow the first day of state. After that long morning delay, everyone got back on the course around 3 p.m. Things seemed to be going fine, but then a lightning delay halted play about an hour later.

Finally, play resumed for good around 4:45 p.m. The first round got over in twilight at 9:35 p.m., which might be the latest finish for an IHSAA state golf round. That's a bit of history no one wants to ever repeat.

The Shamrocks, of course, are looking to repeat as state champions. Westfield was led by Thomas Lewis, who fired a fourunder par 68. Johnny Deck was also in the red with a one-under par 71, and Andrew Lewis played to an even 72. Noah Shanteau scored 74.

"We're happy with getting three-under par today," said 'Rocks coach Jon Hoover. 'Today's a position day, getting ready for Round 2. Hopefully we've got a little bit of a cushion built up, because anything can happen in this game."

Two individual players were at state as well. Noblesville's Parker Deakyne shook off a slow start to shoot a 77 in his first round. Deakyne birdied his final hole of the day.
