History, service clubs...

Golden K was Noblesville’s 3rd

Part 2

Editor’s Note: Following is Part 2 of an article written in the Sept. 29, 1988 100th anniversary edition of the Noblesville Daily Ledger. Giving a history of service clubs in Noblesville, the article was written by Sharon Trisler.

Noblesville’s third Kiwanis club was chartered March 2, 1988.

The **Noblesville Golden K Kiwanis**, with 33 members, received its charter from Kiwanis International that night at the Noblesville Southeastern Public Library.

Robert Anderson, lieutenant governor of Kiwanis’ Sycamore South District and a member of the Noblesville Sunrises Club, was instrumental in getting the club going. He garnered support from his home club and from Noblesville Noon Kiwanis and Carmel

Golden K Kiwanis and organized the new organization’s first meeting.

Noblesville Golden K met for the first time on Sept. 30, 1987, with six prospective members. Sixteen weeks later, the group officially organized with 29 members and elected officers.

Kedrick Fisher is charter president.

One of the service projects the club has undertaken this year is the purchase and donation of computerized systems that allow deaf people to communicate by telephone. The system has a keyboard for sending messages and a visual display for receiving them.

Noblesville Golden K donated a system to Katie Breedlove, and along with the Carmel Golden K, gave one to Sherry Crusenberry. Both girls are students at the Indiana School for the Deaf.

The Noblesville club raised money for the purchases through the sale of popcorn and snow cones at the county fair and unpopped popcorn in the spring at various locations in Noblesville.

The club meets at 10 a.m. Wednesdays at Northlake Apartments clubhouse. Membership is open to men and women 55-and-older.

Rotary International was celebrating its 50th anniversary 33 years ago when the first club in Noblesville was chartered.

The **Rotary Club of Noblesville** received its charter on April 4, 1955, with 23 members. The club was sponsored by the Sheridan Lions Club. Charter officers were Wyman Moon, president; Arthur Roy Duncan, vice president; Bernard Pickett,

Hinkle Masonic Lodge is a secret worth keeping

During the height of the Civil War a new Masonic Lodge was organized in Deming, an unusual time and place for a new lodge. It was named the Hinkle Masonic Lodge for its proximity to Hinkle Creek, and its membership was made up partially of Union Army soldiers. The sword of one, Brother Haskett is displayed in the vestibule.

The lodge, organized in 1863 and chartered in the spring of 1864, is still

in business with 150 members. It is the oldest lodge in Indiana still housed in its original building. It is remarkably well preserved with the impressive lodge hall on the second floor above a dining and kitchen area.

I went to one of their regular breakfasts Saturday morning. Breakfast at the Hinkle Lodge is a slice of rural Americana, so unlike the modern meeting halls or chain restaurants along the busy highways just a few miles south in Noblesville, Fishers or Carmel. The menu consists of scrambled eggs, pancakes, biscuits and gravy, bacon and sausage. There is no stated price, a contribution will do, and non-members are welcome.

I was there with an old friend, Matt Snyder, to pick up his chainsaw which he had loaned to the lodge members to cut back some pesky brush and shrubs. And, partly I went because I'm a history nut, and had never been in the historic lodge. And, of course, I like a good breakfast.

After breakfast with friendly folks and a look around the building, we picked up the chainsaw and started home. A brief escape into some of Hamilton County's beautiful countryside, that was my Saturday morning venture.

Some of our readers probably wouldn't know where to find the Hinkle Lodge. It's a mile east of 31 on 226th Street, but don't tell everybody. It's a secret worth keeping.

We all held onto his hands and rubbed his shoulders, shoulders that often, during, his life, had the weight of the world on them.

Dad had not had an easy life. His mother died during childbirth. He was adopted by the Hart family, raised on a mountain in the back roads of Kentucky, and he knew what it was like to be poor.

He married my Mom when they were just sixteen years old. He came to the Promised Land of Indiana when they were eighteen. I have the letters that he wrote to my Mom while he was looking for work in New Castle. He worked for just a few cents a day in a factory and many hours of overtime to afford to bring Mom to be with him.

They eventually came to Noblesville, where he worked as a supervisor at Firestone for thirty-five years. They bought a house in 1952 and they both worked to pay off the mortgage in just six years. My Mom still lives there today.

Dad never complained about the long hours, in a hot factory, breathing in chemicals which probably resulted in the COPD from which he died.

Dad always had a smile on his face.

You see, Dad knew he was rich. Oh, not rich with money in the bank, but a family that loved hm. There was plenty of food on the table. There was heat in the house during the winter. He had a closet from which to pick more than one shirt. He had shoes that did not have holes in the soles.

He provided wisdom and faith and love that would last through generations to come. So much "after".

I only wish a few more generations could have known him. Leah and Aiden never got to sit on his lap and hear him laugh. Emily took them to the cemetery this past week for a visit at his grave. She told them stories about him. Those stories will be told over and over so that they too can know the love and wisdom and faith of their Pop Pop. The legacy of man well loved.

treasurer; Don Wood, secretary and Robert McIntyre, Jack Barker and Boyd Sturdevant, directors.

Charter members who still are in the club are Donald Chance, Kenneth Chance and Howard Ramsey. Today, the Rotary Club meets at 6:15 p.m. each Monday at Lutz's Steakhouse.

In the club history published in 1980 in observance of Rotary International's 75th anniversary, Herbert L. Garrand wrote that the late Ken Biddle, a Sheridan Rotarian, was the "spark plug" behind the extension of the Rotary movement to Noblesville. The Noblesville club formed March 23, 1955, and chartered less than two weeks later.

Since then, the Noblesville club has sponsored the Carmel Rotary Club, which received its charter in 1972, and the Noblesville Midday Rotary Club, which received its charter 12 years later.

Noblesville Rotary Club has sponsored numerous projects over the last three decades, among them horse shows, home shows and all-star basketball classic that involved students from Hamilton and Madison counties.

Proceeds from the shows have helped fund scholarships and have aided crippled children and adults, community funds and projects and youth programs.

One of the projects highlighted in the 1980 history of the club was Rotary's presentation of U.S. flags to all Noblesville schools. Rotary donated flags with 49 stars in 1959, and a year later, after Hawaii was admitted to the union, replaced those with 50-star flags.

The club has sponsored the local soccer program, Junior Achievement, the Boys & Girls Club of Noblesville and Tri-County Opportunity School. It has purchased uniforms for several members of the high school band and funded fireworks for high school football games.

Through the Rotary Foundation, the Noblesville club has funded fellowships for college students studying abroad, youth exchange programs for high school students and group study exchange teams for young businessmen and professionals.

Rotary has been active in community projects during the last year. Among the club's recent projects are:

*Clothe the Child. The club purchased warm clothing for 16 children in the Noblesville area who had been without winter clothes.

*Polio Plus. The club raised sufficient funds to immunize 10,000 children against polio and four other debilitating childhood diseases.

*Scholar recognition. The club provided a plaque for the outstanding male and female scholars at eighth grade graduation.

*Group study exchange. Rotary sponsored a local businessman on a 12-week exchange tour of Norway.

In 1987, Rotary built and sailed a scavenger scow in the first Noblesville on the River festival's raft race. Although the club did not finish first, it did finish.

Noblesville Rotary and Noblesville Midday jointly sponsored a speech contest for high school students, an event that had been a project of the evening club before the noon club was organized.

Current officers are Jim Carter, president; Frank Kinzer, president-elect; Harry Gradeless, secretary, and Bob Riggs treasurer.

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



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Judith Faye Williams

Hamilton County Airport Authority announces first full-time airport director

While we had our ups and downs, our players embraced the work it took to get better and compete.

We played 11 players on both sides of the ball with the varsity group and more than that with the young players that attended the camp. We got the opportunity to evaluate the value that each and every player on our team could bring.
