

We all held onto his hands and rubbed his shoulders, shoulders that often, during, his life, had the weight of the world on them.

Dad had not had an easy life. His mother died during childbirth. He was adopted by the Hart family, raised on a mountain in the back roads of Kentucky, and he knew what it was like to be poor.

He married my Mom when they were just sixteen years old. He came to the Promised Land of Indiana when they were eighteen. I have the letters that he wrote to my Mom while he was looking for work in New Castle. He worked for just a few cents a day in a factory and many hours of overtime to afford to bring Mom to be with him.

They eventually came to Noblesville, where he worked as a supervisor at Firestone for thirty-five years. They bought a house in 1952 and they both worked to pay off the mortgage in just six years. My Mom still lives there today.

Dad never complained about the long hours, in a hot factory, breathing in chemicals which probably resulted in the COPD from which he died.

Dad always had a smile on his face.

You see, Dad knew he was rich. Oh, not rich with money in the bank, but a family that loved hm. There was plenty of food on the table. There was heat in the house during the winter. He had a closet from which to pick more than one shirt. He had shoes that did not have holes in the soles.

He provided wisdom and faith and love that would last through generations to come. So much "after".

I only wish a few more generations could have known him. Leah and Aiden never got to sit on his lap and hear him laugh. Emily took them to the cemetery this past week for a visit at his grave. She told them stories about him. Those stories will be told over and over so that they too can know the love and wisdom and faith of their Pop Pop. The legacy of man well loved.

The club has sponsored the local soccer program, Junior Achievement, the Boys & Girls Club of Noblesville and Tri-County Opportunity School. It has purchased uniforms for several members of the high school band and funded fireworks for high school football games.

Through the Rotary Foundation, the Noblesville club has funded fellowships for college students studying abroad, youth exchange programs for high school students and group study exchange teams for young businessmen and professionals.

Rotary has been active in community projects during the last year. Among the club's recent projects are:

*Clothe the Child. The club purchased warm clothing for 16 children in the Noblesville area who had been without winter clothes.

*Polio Plus. The club raised sufficient funds to immunize 10,000 children against polio and four other debilitating childhood

*Scholar recognition. The club provided a plaque for the outstanding male and female

scholars at eighth grade graduation. *Group study exchange. Rotary sponsored a local businessman on a 12-week exchange tour of Norway.


