Neal takes readers on a ‘Road Trip’ of Indiana history

For Indiana's Bicentennial a new condensed history entitled 'Road Trip, A Pocket History of Indiana' is on bookstore shelves this summer. The author is Andrea Neal, an accomplished writer with deep Hamilton County roots. The book, an easy and interesting read, is a publication of the Indiana Historical Society Press.

In the 247 page paperback, Neal presents the highlights of Indiana history in such a way that the reader comes away with the feeling they have completed a course in the state's 200 year journey in just a couple of hours.

Three events in Hamilton County figure in the book. Neal points out that an 1820 state-appointed commission charged with find a site for a state capital met at William Conner's home to begin a detailed search of central Indiana, finally deciding of the present site of Indianapolis.

A section is devoted to the founding of Roberts Settlement in Jackson Township. Free Blacks from North Carolina settled there in 1830s to escape the fear of persecution. A photo of the historic Roberts Chapel is included.

And, the rise and fall of D.C. Stephenson's powerful Ku Klux Klan of the 1920s is reviewed along with a photo of the former county jail. Stephenson was held there while being tried in Hamilton Circuit Court for murdering his girlfriend. His conviction marked the downfall of the Klan statewide.

Neal, currently a history and English teacher in Indianapolis, is the daughter of Jim and Georgianne Neal, long-time Hamilton County residents now living in Marion County. Andrea Neal comes by her writing interest and skill somewhat naturally. The Neal family was involved in newspaper publishing in Noblesville for generations.

Andrea began her career in journalism with UPI news service after graduation from Brown University. She was with the Indianapolis Star for several years, serving as a reporter, columnist and editorial board member. She then entered teaching several years ago at St. Richard's Academy. She has two adult sons.

Ms. Neal dedicates her 'Road Trip' to "Mom, Dad and Dede, three of the proudest Hoosiers I know." (Dede is Andrea's sister.)

The dancing should not be lip synced as it will be harder to edit to properly fit the song. Audio will not be included as “Can’t Stop The Feeling” will be played over the entire video. Lastly, we ask that participants have fun and if possible showcase their favorite part of Noblesville or their business/organization.

The appointments will fill recent vacancies and will not generate additional staffing.



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
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Catharine J. Parker

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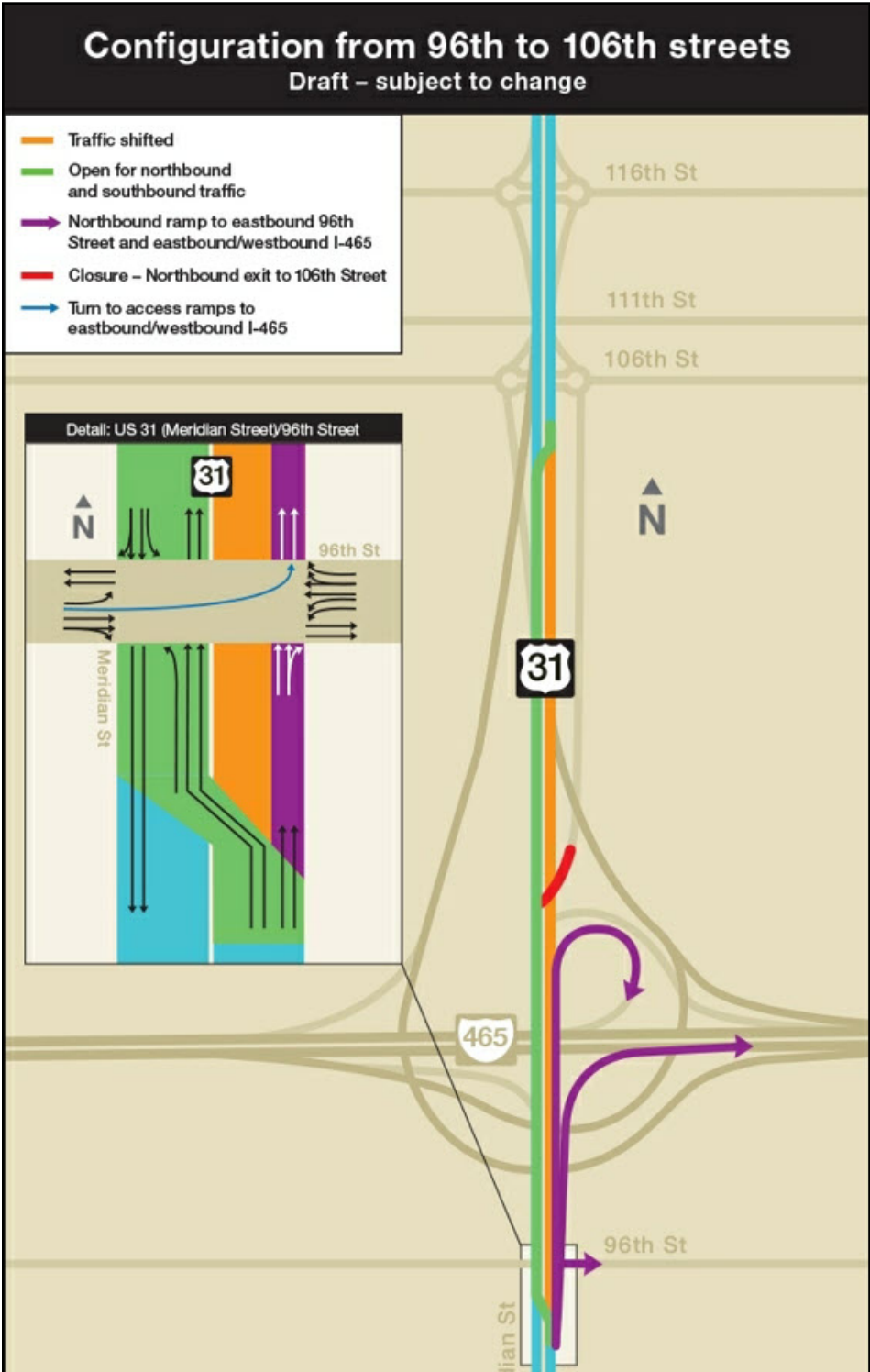


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I-69 construction officially begins today

The Indiana Department of Transportation will join state and local officials at 2:30 p.m. on Wednesday, June 22, to officially kick off construction on 15 miles of Interstate 69 in Hamilton and Madison counties.

The \$92 million project, part of Governor Mike Pence’s Major Moves 2020 interstate widening program, will hit full gear in the coming weeks. Milestone Contractors will shift traffic to begin widening I-69 and build new ramps for a double-crossover diamond interchange at Campus/Southeastern Parkway (Exit 210).

Weather permitting, Olio Road will be closed from 1 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. on Wednesday, June 22, at the bridge over I-69 between Olivia Way and Tegler Drive/141st Street. The detour for local traffic follows Campus/Southeastern Parkway, Bergen Boulevard and Tegler Drive.

Meridian Street traffic shifts near 96th Street

On Tuesday evening, crews shifted traffic on northbound Meridian Street just south of 96th Street. Motorists wishing to access either eastbound or westbound I-465 from northbound Meridian Street now must use the right two lanes of the roadway.

Those wishing to continue north on Meridian Street will remain in the shifted northbound lanes in the current configuration. See the illustration above for an enlarged view.

REMINDER: Northbound Meridian Street ramp to 106th Street closed

On Saturday, crews closed the ramp from northbound Meridian Street to 106th Street. This closure will last approximately one week while crews perform pavement work. Access to 106th Street and northbound US 31 remains available via the ramps from eastbound and westbound I-465. The ramp from southbound US 31 to 106th Street remains open.

Message boards are placed along US 31/Meridian Street at 96th Street and 106th Street to alert motorists of the closure, and to direct them to use 116th Street as an alternate route.
